# Options

- Home school
  - Register as a home schooler at any public school.
  - The school may loan you some educational resources.
  - Upon request the school will evaluate your child's progress in relation to other peers.
  - No supervision or instruction will be provided by the school.
  - Parents may follow any curriculum they wish.
  - The graduation program (grades 10-12) can NOT be completed via homeschool.
- Distributed Learning (online classes) through Vancouver Learning Network.
  - Classes taught remotely by certified teacher.
  - Curriculum followed.
  - Graduation may be completed.

# Which school will my child attend?

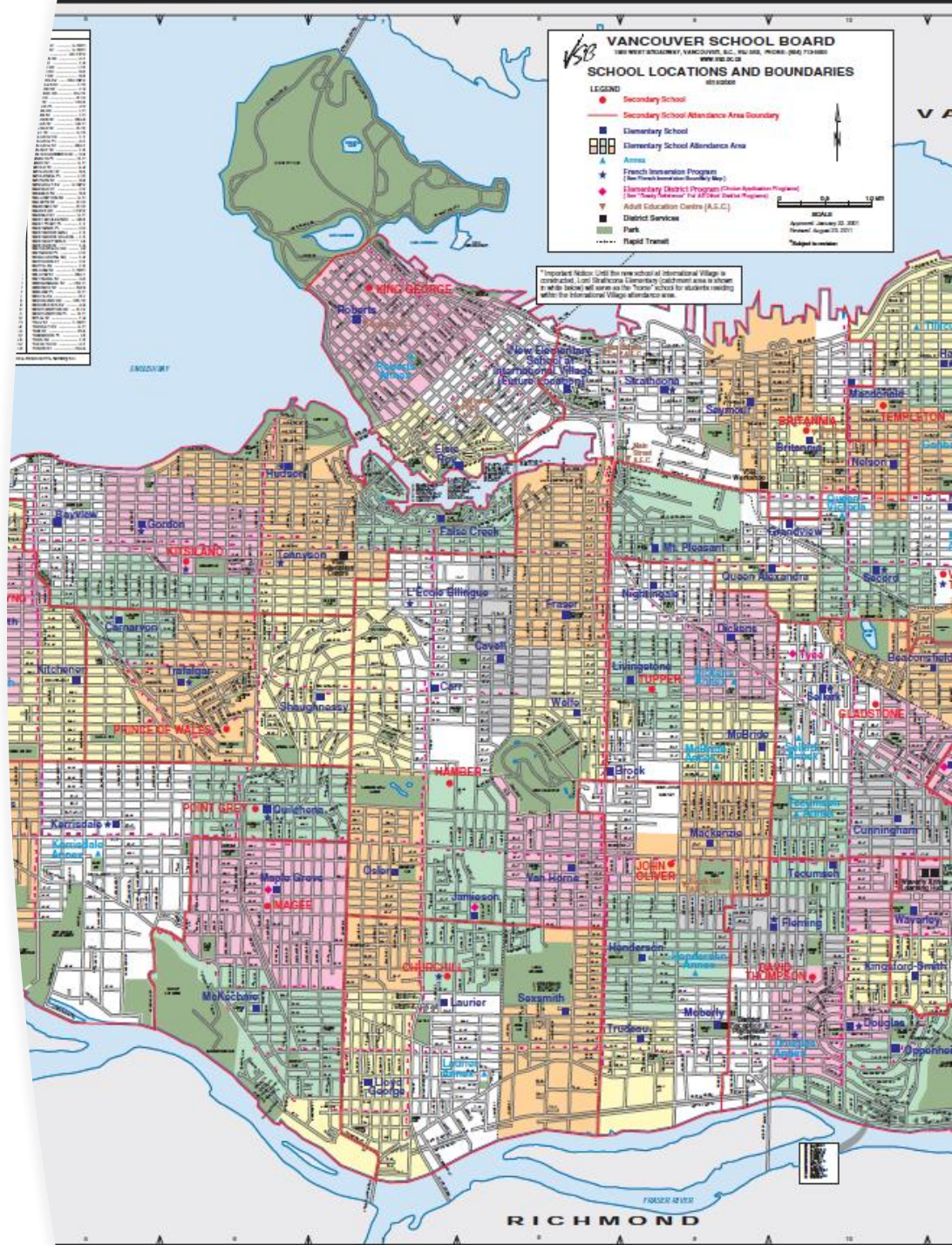
Children are assigned to their catchment schools.

The colours on the map to the right show elementary catchments.

The red lines show high school catchments.

Your address determines your catchment.

If the school is full, your child will be assigned to the closest school with space.





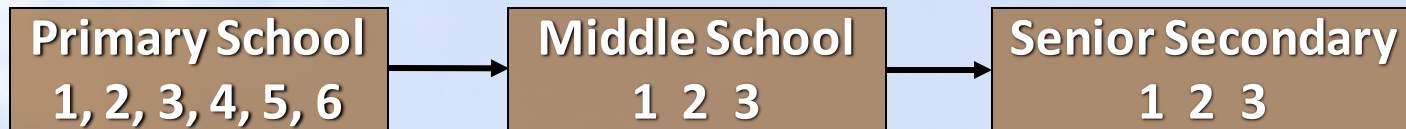
# What grade will my child be in?

-Grades are determined by year of birth, so for 2020-21:

<u>Year of Birth</u>	<u>Grade placement</u>
2007	Grade 8
2006	Grade 9
2005	Grade 10
2004	Grade 11
2003/02	Grade 12

# How does my child graduate?

- Only grade 10, 11 and 12 courses count toward graduation.
- Most grade 10, 11 and 12 courses are worth 4 credits.
- Your child must pass a total of 80 credits to graduate.
- Some courses are required (52 credits); everyone must take them.
- Some are elective (28 credits): your child chooses which ones to take.
- **Some of the work students have successfully completed in their prior countries can be transferred for credit towards the BC diploma.**

**ELECTIVE CREDITS**

Students must earn 28 elective credits. These credits can be for:

Additional Grades 10, 11 or 12 Ministry Authorized courses, external credentials, Board/Authority Authorized courses, post-secondary credits and/or independent directed studies.

<b>Total</b>	<b>28 credits</b>
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**OVERALL TOTAL GRADUATION CREDITS REQUIRED 80 credits**

- Of the 80 credits needed for graduation, at least 16 credits must be at the Grade 12 level, including English 12 and 12 other credits. These may be from Required Courses or Elective Credits.



What grades do students usually complete the required courses in the graduation program?

- As the child progresses through the grades, there are fewer required courses and more elective courses.

# Elective courses

- Most schools have a wide selection of elective courses.
- Students may get elective credit for their home language ability if they attended school in their home language in their old countries

Students must earn at least 28 elective credits.	Minimum Credits

**\*Of the 80 credits needed for graduation, at least 16 credits must be at the Grade 12 level, including a Grade 12 Language Arts course and 12 other credits. These may be from Required Courses or Electives courses.**

# Can my child graduate if she or he is much older?

- Yes. However, children may not start secondary school if they are already 19.
- If your child has not completed graduation requirements by the age of 19, she or he will go to Adult Education.
- In many cases, Adult Education is also recommended for students who are 18.
- An Adult Education Dogwood diploma is exactly the same as a regular secondary Dogwood diploma.



# Must my child take and exams to graduate?

- Yes.
  - Students write provincial exams in Numeracy and Literacy.
    - One Numeracy exam and one Literacy exam will be written in grade 10;
    - And, one Literacy exam will be written in grade 12.
    - These exams do not count toward class marks
      - The results will appear on students' transcripts.
      - Students do not need to pass these exams in order to graduate.
        - They only need to write them.





# How will my child enter a Canadian university?

- It does not matter which high school your child graduates from.
- It does not matter how old the child is when applying to university.
- Canadian universities consider:
  - marks,
  - types of courses taken,
  - and sometimes extra-curricular activities to determine entrance.

# Here are some of the elective courses a student might take in grade 12 to qualify for entrance to a Canadian university

Many Canadian universities will look at a broad range of information in their admissions process, including high school courses and grades and a student's personal profile. Some of the recognized Grade 12 courses used for admissions to universities may include the following:

# What about skilled trades or other careers?

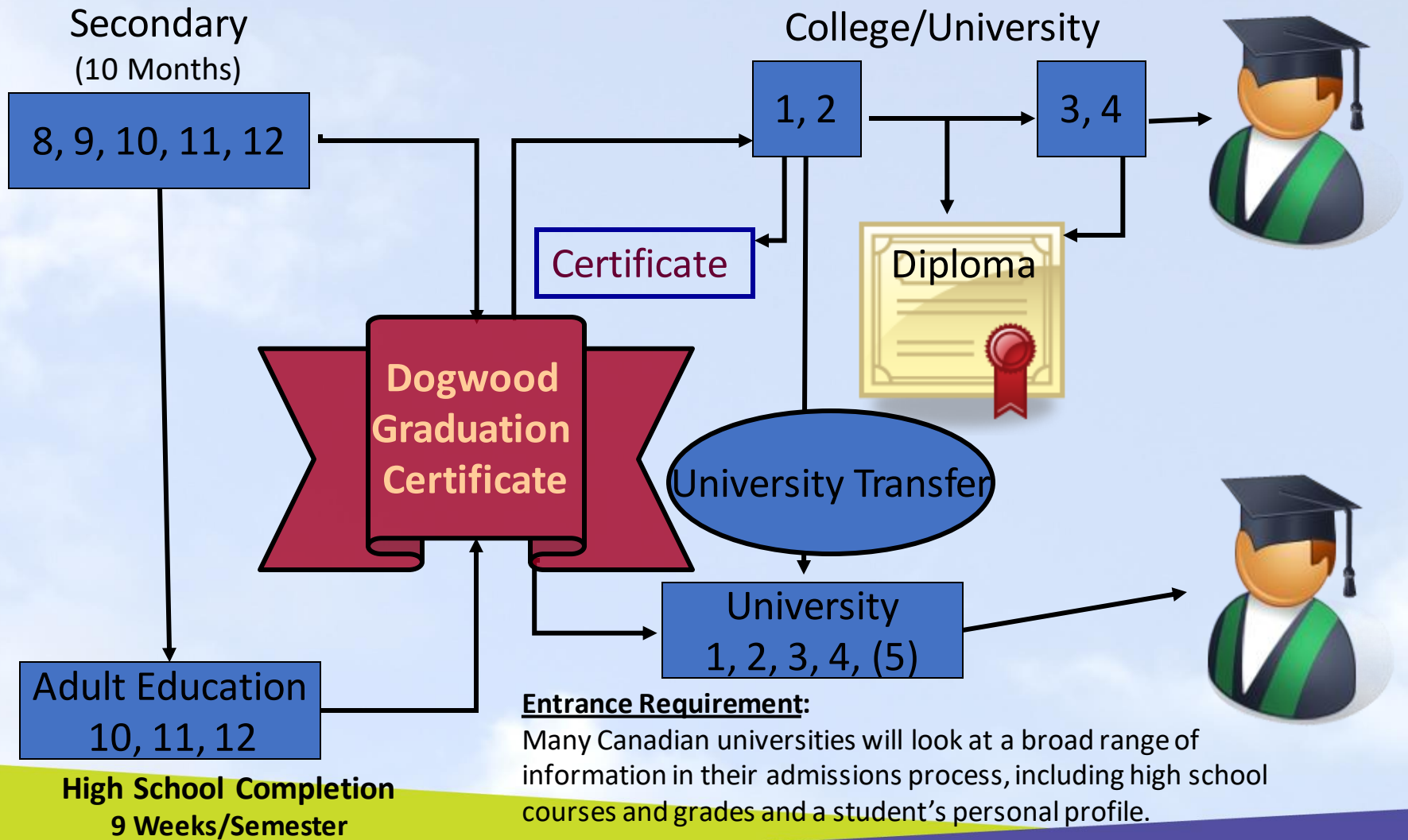
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- The VSB has excellent trades and work experience programs where students can begin their training in skilled trades like carpentry, mechanics, hairdressing, auto body repair and many more:




# How will Covid-19 affect my child's high school education?

- The Provincial Health Officer has ordered that high school students must learn in groups of 120 students per semester.
  - It may be far fewer.
  - The VSB is currently reorganizing high school timetables so that students learn in a cohort of lower numbers than they would in a typical year.
  - There may be an online component to some of the student's classes.
  - The final plan for instructional delivery will be communicated at the end of August.
  - School may begin later than September 8.
- School attendance remains mandatory.
- Any of these rules or plans may change by September!

# What safety procedures are in place to mitigate Covid-19

- Smaller than typical cohorts of students.
- Class organizations that promote physical distancing.
- Enhanced deep cleaning of classrooms and school areas.
- Any staff or student with symptom of illness must stay home.
- Hand hygiene stations.
- Regulated movement of staff and students.
- Limited access to non-school people.
- Masks required in common areas in high school.



School will likely be in a "quarter system"

- Students will take 2 classes every 10 weeks. Each class will be two hours.
- One of the two classes will be attended in person for two weeks.
- The other of the two classes will be online for two weeks.
- Only half the class (about 15 students) will attend at the same time.
  - Each day the class will run twice; once for the first 15 students, once for the second 15 students.



# What options are there if I am not ready to send my child to school?

- Home school.
  - Register at your catchment school.
  - You will be able to borrow resources.
  - No participation in any school activities, nor instruction from teachers.
  - Grade 10 11 and 12 home schooling will not count for graduation.
- Distributed learning (online school)
  - Take classes through the Vancouver Learning Network.
  - G 1- 12 options.
  - Grade 10 11 and 12 classes DO count for graduation.
