TO MAKE A FAMILY

Families are their children's first teachers. They are knowledge keepers and respected teachers of culture, heritage, language and values. The Early Learning Framework honours what families do to nurture their children's growth and development in their home environment.

Families support their children when they live and learn together by these four elements that are the foundation of the Early Learning Framework (BC ELF: A Guide For Families, p.3).

ACTIVITIES

Let's Play! Activities for Families 2019: I am Thankful (p.27)

This experience provides an opportunity for children to share their gratitude with others.



Create an environment to share experiences: Bring out an album of family pictures or draw a picture of your family. Tell your child about someone you love, and share an experience you treasured with that person. Talk about how thankful you are for having that person in your life; how much fun you have spending time with them; sharing, playing, and eating with them. How does that person make your heart feel?



Guide your child to take 3 slow breaths, in and out and feel thankful. This encourages them to be mindful and reflect on their experiences.

Through this experience, children will learn to:


- Reflect on themselves and how they feel
- Communicate thoughts and experiences using different forms of expressions






