## SPEC/Gardening

SPEC (Society Providing Conservation Education) led free garden lessons to Thunderbird students. The School Garden Program strives to connect children to their local food systems, classmates, the natural world, and their community. Students in the program learn through inquiry, teamwork, communication, observation, and learning to build empathy for all the creatures in the garden, while developing basic gardening skills with hands-on work.

## Girls Lunch Hour Soccer

It is being taught by Carrie Serwetnyk, a former forward with Canada's women national soccer team from 1986 to 1991.

Soccer is a very active and physical sport that inspires players to exert themselves in a fun, socially engaging and healthy environment. Some girls, however, are too intimidated to play on their school fields. They don't always enjoy competing with boys, who can be overly aggressive and dominate play. Equal Play gives girls the opportunity to play with their female peers in a positive and encouraging environment. The program is designed to:

1. improve girls' physical activity and fitness levels and their sense of well-being;
2. increase girls' physical literacy and set them up to make healthy lifestyle choices;
3. empower girls, increasing their self-confidence through the playing of a physically engaging sport;
4. provide girls with an opportunity to be part of a sports league particularly girls who otherwise would be unable to play a sport outside of school, due to financial, cultural or other constraints;
5. mentor girls, giving them an opportunity to gain leadership, teamwork and social inclusion skills, as well as the confidence to become sports leaders. While girls and women account for about

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$47 \%$ of registered soccer players in Canada, less than 1\% of paid leadership positions are held by women.

Our hope is that girls who take part in the program will be able to apply the skills they've learned to other aspects of their lives.

Student and Family Affordability Fund
Approximately $\$ 4.8$ million will be distributed to schools throughout the District. Based on school size and community make-up, schools will receive between $\$ 15,000$ and $\$ 100,000$ to support the following priorities:
(Thunderbird received $\$ 30,000$ )

## Food and nutritional support for students and families.

- Provision of nutritional snacks, food hampers, gift cards for families to use to purchase food at a local grocery store.
- Provide learning opportunities which engage students in the purchase and preparation of meals to support learning about healthy eating and nutrition.
- Support students with passes to purchase food provided through sitebased cafeteria programs.


## Supporting families and offsetting costs.

- Support student needs for clothing, shoes, transit passes, glasses, dental work, etc.
- Offset costs to families for field studies, sport activities, graduation activities, cultural activities or events, and other educational activities/opportunities.
- Waive fees charged to families related to school courses and activities such as culinary classes, additional supplies for shop programs, instrument and equipment rentals, etc.
- Provide opportunities to engage in after school-based programs and activities such as sporting activities, homework clubs, and fine arts activities at no cost to families.

Expanding access to vegetarian options as part of the lunch program to support cultural, religious, and dietary needs of students.

The remaining funds will be distributed centrally to support fine arts opportunities and experiences for students which would normally be borne by families, Indigenous cultural, nutritional, and learning

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opportunities and experiences organized by the Indigenous Education Department and support existing community partners to expand access to nutritional food and learning experiences.

The school plans to offset the heaviest cost to parents which are fieldtrips and graduation ... \$20 per head for fieldtrips, camp (largest parent cost). Also, funds will be available for food security and clothing, through gift cards. Some fund will be used to bring in educational experiences that otherwise would not be affordable to the school and would require parent support (teachers are looking into this). Additionally, all students will receive a pink shirt from the school for Pink Shirt Day.

Chair's Report
J. Iverson provided the following report:

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c. Upcoming PAC Initiatives \& Deadlines
i. Bottle drives scheduled for January 9-13 and April 17-21 (Earth Week). Proceeds will be deposited into the PAC's Return-It account. B. Toews will speak to Mr. Lai about how students may support the drives.
d. PAC contributed $\$ 145$ ( $\$ 5 /$ student) to the school to subsidize increased costs for grade 7 hoodies.

Fundraising Initiatives
A. Yeung said she has called various Spirit Wear vendors (including Action) and is waiting for responses.

A Yeung said the Purdys fundraiser page is ready. Next steps are emailing school the order form for printing and adding form to flyers. Information will be distributed next week. Order deadline is November 25. Orders will be sent home around December 7. B. Toews will add a standing order reminder to his newsletter. PAC will need volunteers to package orders. Action item: add volunteer reminder to December PAC agenda.

Other fundraising ideas: hot chocolates sales after school (B. Toews and A. Yeung will discuss), English Bay cookie dough sales.

School could host a bake sale if baked goods are made by a commercial bakery.
