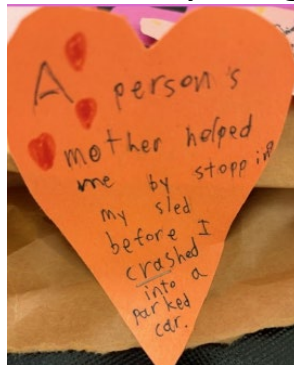

Upon calling the Safe Arrival/Absence reporting phone line, you will be asked to leave a message and will require the following information:

- First & last name of your child (please spell the last name)
- Grade
- Division
- Reason for absence
- Date & length of absence



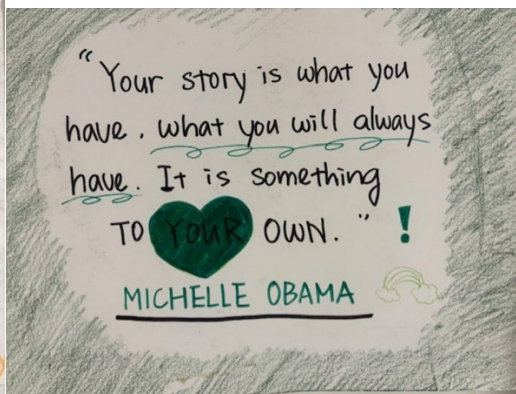
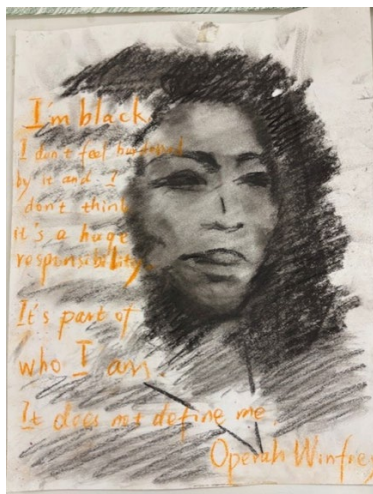
## Late students:

# Dr. Anderson Ruffin Abbott

Born April 7, 1837, Toronto  
Died December 29, 1913, Toronto

Dr. Anderson Ruffin Abbott was the first Canadian-born person of color to graduate from medical school, making him an important figure in both African American history and medicine. During the American Civil War, he served as a surgeon with the Union Army, helping treat soldiers. His work affected many people, especially in the Black community, though exact numbers are unclear.

Dr. Abbott became well-known within African American and medical communities, even though he wasn't widely recognized outside those groups. He broke down racial barriers in medicine, which inspired other Black professionals to pursue careers in medicine and other fields.

His achievements were groundbreaking at a time when racism was widespread. As one of the few Black doctors during the Civil War and later in Canada, Dr. Abbott showed that Black people could succeed in fields that were mostly for white people. His work helped push for racial equality in healthcare and inspired future generations to make

### WHO WAS MARY ANN SHADD?

She was an educator, publisher, lawyer, abolitionist that was born in Wilmington, Delaware. She was born on October 9th, 1823 and passed away to stomach cancer on June 5th, 1891. She was the first of 11 children in a family of abolitionists.



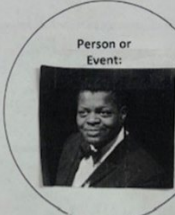
### WHAT DID SHE DO?

She was the first Black woman in North America to edit and publish a newspaper, The Provincial Freeman. The first edition of The Provincial Freeman appeared on 24 March 1853, an anti-slavery newspaper. She advocated for women's rights and the abolition of slavery and emigration of African Americans to Canada.
