All Set to Continue Learning Together in 2025-2026!

It is wonderful to see all the students and families return to Henderson. We are looking forward to learning with you. If you are new to our community, we welcome you and hope you enjoy it here as much as we do. The staff is looking forward to working together with parents and the community to continue to provide great learning opportunities that enable Henderson students to thrive emotionally, socially, intellectually, and to build strong relationships. We want the students' learning to nurture their natural curiosity, creativity, and critical thinking.

Over the first two weeks of school students continue to work on Social Emotional Learning (SEL) skills and reviewing school routines and expectations. As we transition into our new classes, students will learn their new entry and exit locations. Having students lined up and distributed around the school has helped us begin each day smoothly and efficiently. All eating of snacks and lunches will be done in the classroom or the activity room, where we can continue to practice good hygiene and eat lunch with fewer distractions. **Students need to arrive each day with their snack and lunch**. Please **try to avoid coming** to the school during the day with the intent to drop off lunch, as it is disruptive. If you must, please drop the lunch off at the office and we will ensure it is delivered to your child. We thank you for your support.

This year our school inquiry question is: What educational practices, strategies, programs and school-wide common language might we implement to increase students' skill development to better self-regulate and thus be more equipped to engage in learning in literacy, numeracy, and well-being? Also, we will continue our work on the district goal: To increase knowledge, acceptance, empathy, awareness and appreciation of Aboriginal histories, traditions, cultures and contributions among all students. We will explore how we can make First Peoples teaching and learning more authentic.

All our classes will be working hard on these goals in addition to all the other areas of the curriculum and core competencies.

Each month, a Newsletter will be prepared to highlight students' achievements, informing parents and caregivers of the latest educational developments and announcing upcoming events. A lot of time and energy goes into the composition of the monthly school newsletter, and we greatly appreciate the effort it takes to read it. It is often emphasized in research that student success in education is dependent on their parents' strong commitment and involvement. Parents being informed of the school's year-round activities and projects is one way of showing interest in their children's school life. This year we are continuing to be environmentally responsible by posting newsletters, calendars and important updates on our website. We will also be emailing out the links to all parents/caregivers/guardians that have provided an email address. And our Code of Conduct is: Be Safe. Be Fair. Be Kind



School Forms and Fees



There will be several important forms sent home in September, these include forms that request emergency contact numbers, pertinent health issues, neighbourhood field trip permission and media permission. These forms need to be returned to your child's classroom. Please make sure all of the emergency phone numbers are correct. If information changes throughout the year, please update the school immediately by calling the office. The school must be able to always contact parents. We sent out information on school fees and how to pay them online in June. School fees for all ages are \$35.00, agendas for Grades 2 to 7 students are \$8.00. You will be able to access and pay fees online shortly. Please be on the lookout for more information in the following days.

Please do not send money to school. We will be collecting fees through School Cash Online.

School Cash Online is a secure system that allows parents and community members to pay school-related fess safely, quickly and easily online. The system puts all of the school fees available to your student online for purchase, keeping you informed of your child's activities and needs. We will post items through the system and assign the relevant fees to your student. You can then choose to purchase these fees online with one of three different methods, including credit cards. You can also stay informed and keep track of which school fees require your attention. The system strictly adheres to Canada's privacy and anti-spam legislation and meets the latest industry standards for payment security. You are now able to register – a simple process that takes only a few minutes – by visiting https://www.vsb.bc.ca/page/5030/online-payment or visiting our website at https://wsb.schoolcashonline.com and following directions to the School Cash Online page. You will need your child's usual first name, last name and birth date to register.

Lunch Time

Our lunch break time this year is 12:10 pm to 12:55 pm. Division 1 to 9 and 15 to 21 will be eating first and then going out to play. Intermediate classes will eat in their classrooms and primary classes will eat in the Activity Room. Divisions 10 to 14 will play first and then eat in the Activity Room once the first group is finished. This will help prevent overcrowding in the Activity Room. This plan worked well for us in past years.

Please send a packed lunch with your child. Students will eat their lunch in their classrooms or the activity room. If students would like to go home for lunch, it can provide a pleasant break in their school day. Students who are going home for lunch should be picked up at 12:10 from the office and are to be back at school, and report to the office by 12:55. Please make sure your child's teacher knows at drop off if this is going to happen. If older students are going home unaccompanied by an adult, we request a note of permission on the day they are going home and the student is expected to sign out and in at the office, going directly home and coming back directly to school.



When packing lunch, we want you and your child to think about your child's health: Is the lunch nutritious? And we want you to think about the environment: Is this lunch going to provide a lot of waste for the landfill or recycling? This year we want to cut down on our waste and spend less time having to pick up the waste that is littered on our school grounds!

The Food4School Program is available to help children who require nutrition services at school. The program does not provide for special diets. If you would like to learn more about this program, please contact us in the office.



MPORTANT SAFETY ALERT



Please do not send tree nuts to school. Please avoid all nut products in your child's lunches.

This year we have students in our school with severe and life-threatening allergies to peanuts and/or tree nuts, shellfish and eggs. Because of the seriousness of these allergies, we are asking you to refrain from sending food including these products to school for snacks or class parties. We are asking that our lunchrooms and classrooms be a **nut allergy - awareness zone**. Due to shared tables, computer equipment and art supplies in the classroom, as well as the ease with which food residue is transferred from one student to the other, we would like to keep our classrooms "allergy aware." Our goal is to make school a safe place for all our students. We appreciate your cooperation and understanding. If you have any questions, please contact the school.

Student Valuables at School



Parents are reminded that there is **no VSB insurance coverage** for student belongings. Students who bring iPods, cell phones and other devices do so at their **own risk**. These items are to be kept off and in back packs during the school day, unless being used under supervision of a staff member for lessons. When personal items are brought to school, they can easily get lost, broken or misplaced. Please keep this in mind, especially with collector cards and electronics.



IT is TIME to PLAY!



Studies show that students who are engaged in regular physical activity perform better in class. ParticipACTION reports that Canadian kids need to sit less and move more! With this information in mind, we are continuing to ask students to head outdoors at recess and lunch so they can run,

play and be active during their breaks! Please make sure that your children are dressed for all types of weather as they will be going outside on most days. For more information please visit the ParticipACTION site. We have two scheduled breaks in our day for students to eat and exercise. Please make sure your child has healthy food each day and is dressed to play outside. We expect all students to be outside every day. If it is cold or raining out,

they should be wearing a jacket. During rainy days we have many puddles and mud around the school. It would be a good idea for students to have rain gear for playing outside (rain jacket, rain boots and even rain pants!) You might also want to send an extra pair of sweats and even runners to keep in their classrooms "just in case" for those muddy, wet days. We will only call for 'Inside Days' when the weather is extremely bad. Students should be dressed for going outside every day, rain or shine!

- We will only call for 'Inside Days' when the weather is extremely bad. Students should be dressed for going outside every day, rain or shine!

Please make sure your child arrives to school on time each day. We find when students are frequently late, it takes them longer to settle into the class routines and they miss important messages at the start of the day.

Student Safety and Traffic

Please do not send your children to school before 8:45am and please pick them up at 2:57 as we have limited supervision from 8:45 to 8:55 am and from 3:00 to 3:15 pm. You are responsible for your child after you pick them up. If a student wishes to play on the school grounds at 3:30, they must be accompanied by an adult or have gone home and received permission from a parent/guardian before returning. It is the parents'/guardians' responsibility to supervise play after 3:15 pm.



We encourage families to walk or bike to school to reduce automobile congestion. Students can bring a lock and secure their bikes in the bike storage area. Please go over the traffic safety rules with your children. With the "back to school" excitement, children can forget these important pedestrian rules. If you are dropping children off, please make sure that it is on the school side of

the street as it is safest. If walking to school, please do not walk through the staff parking lot/ driveway—use the path.

The staff parking lot is only for VSB employees and school deliveries. Do not enter or drop off your child in this area. The staff parking lot is not open to the public and only staff are allowed into the lot.

It can be dangerous as vehicles back up and small children are difficult to see. If you or your child is riding an electric scooter or bike, please make sure you dismount when you arrive at the school grounds and walk your

scooter/bike to keep all the other pedestrians safe.

Safe Arrival

Reporting Student Absences:

Student safety is of paramount importance in the Vancouver School District. Ensuring student safety is a shared responsibility. In order to assist schools, we ask parents to notify the school of student absences. If your child will be absent from school, please phone the school to report this absence as early as possible. Parents should leave a message on the dedicated answering service by calling 604-713-5159 ext. 36. Messages will be received before the office is open. School offices are busy places; consistently notifying the school in advance of your child's absence will significantly improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the Safe Arrival Morning Routine.

Student Sign In/ Sign Out Procedure

It is important that your child arrives on time to start school each morning with his/her peers. The morning routine helps your child stay connected to his/her classmates and sets a positive tone for the day. Currently, it also helps maintain our Health and Safety protocols. When your child is late for school, it not only disrupts his/her learning, but also the learning of his/her classmates. Please do your best to ensure your child arrives to school on time each day. If you are going to be late, please contact the Safe Arrival number and let us know. When your child arrives at school, please ensure he/she/they signs in at the office. Any time you are bringing your child in after 9:00 am we need you to check in at the office. Your child will need to enter the east side of the school.

When you pick up your child during the school day, please ensure that you have contacted the school in advance, and that you sign them out in the school office with either Ms. Fether or Ms. Kroll. If you do not sign out your child, they will be unaccounted for, the school will identify your child as a 'missing' student and will commence a search of school grounds. If the school staff do not locate the child, and are unable to reach a parent promptly, the school will call the Vancouver Police Department. Therefore, clear communication is essential for ensuring the safety of your child and to prevent unnecessary searches.

Remembering Terry Fox-Keeping His Dream Alive



This year marks the 45th year that the Terry Fox Run has been held in communities across the country. For those of us who followed Terry's journey or had the good fortune of meeting him, we could not help but be inspired by this remarkable individual. He is a Canadian Hero, for in him and through his actions, we saw courage, a sense of purpose, empathy, persistence, resilience, compassion, determination, imagination and positivity. Terry exemplified the values we want our children to exhibit. When he was challenged in his life, he could have felt sorry for himself, but instead he thought of helping children who faced the same disease that he faced. He could not bear to see their pain and so he wanted to help find a cure for them. He inspired us to take on his Marathon of Hope. He wanted to raise one million dollars for cancer research and in his name that goal was passed. Each year more money is added to that total and researchers continue to make advances in treatments.

Bedtime Routines A Part of School Readiness

Learning is hard work and requires a lot of energy. Children who are more rested are better prepared and ready to learn at school. Some children will need extra sleep to adjust to the new routines and demands of school. Although some children need less sleep and others need more, most feel and act better when they go to sleep at a regular bedtime. Most children need between 10 and 12 hours of sleep per night. Children often become cranky, impatient or have a shorter attention span when they are not getting enough sleep. A routine bedtime helps to set regular sleep patterns and good sleep habits. 
