Robbie Burns Day – January 25th


Robbie Burns Day (or Rabbie Burns Day) is named after a Scottish poet who was born on January 25th in 1759. The day celebrates Burns's contribution to Scottish culture. His best-known work is Auld Lang Syne. The day is celebrated by the reading of his poetry, toasting him and hosting Burns Suppers on or near the date of his birthday.

The traditional Burns Supper begins with a soup course. This is usually a classic Scottish soup like Scotch broth, potato soup, Cullen skink (a thick Scottish soup made of smoked haddock, potatoes and onions) or cockaleekie (a soup dish consisting of leeks and peppered chicken stock). The highlight of the dinner is the serving of the haggis—a traditional Scottish pudding comprised of the heart, liver and lungs of a sheep diced with onions, oatmeal, suet, spices and salt, which has been cooked in a sheep's stomach.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

Over the last couple of years, social justice movements have brought equity issues back to our attention. I bring this up now as many schools in the Lower Mainland, Henderson included, will observe Black Excellence Day January15th. The Day was created by the Ninandotto Society to acknowledge and celebrate Black history and learn about Black stories, Black art and Black people and a day to stand in solidarity with Black Canandians. The date January 15th was selected to honour the impactful civil rights leader, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who was born on this day. We will continue our learning into February which is Black History Month.

January 27th is the International Holocaust Remembrance Day and January 29th is the National Day of Remembrance of the Quebec City Mosque Attack and Action Against Islamophobia.

These events highlight the importance of ongoing work and intentional focus on the issues of racism and discrimination within our schools and our broader communities. At the Board level, several important actions have been taken to further racial awareness and redress issues of colonialism and systemic racism that exist within our larger society.

As a District, we have an intentional focus on equity within our work. As a District we have an equity statement:

The VSB will create an equitable learning environment where every child can experience a deep sense of belonging and is free to pursue pathways of learning in ways that are authentic to themselves. The VSB will achieve this by:

 having students see themselves and their communities in the curriculum and in the staff throughout the District;

- prioritizing student needs by making informed decisions and engaging in open communication with rightsholders and stakeholders; and
- actively fighting systems of oppression through relationship building, ongoing communication and transparency.

The VSB commitment to equity will be informed by humility and accountability.

At Henderson we work to ensure all staff and students feel safe, valued, and included. As a school community we strive to not only embrace and celebrate our diversity but work towards equity. We know that representation is important, and we are fortunate to live and work in a diverse community with a diverse staff. We know that representation matters. Students want to see role models with whom they connect and see themselves represented. We have made a conscious effort to share books with diverse characters, written by diverse authors, that act as windows, mirrors and sliding doors. Through diverse stories students gain a better understanding of themselves and others. They see different ways of being and not just one perspective, the dominant culture, as the

'normal or right way' they need to strive to be. Students learn there are many ways of being and all of them are acceptable, normal and of value. When we don't have the opportunity to learn about each other, fear, misunderstanding, and hate can take root. But the more we learn about each other, the more familiar we are with each other's stories, we are more understanding, empathetic, and supportive of each other. The more we all support each and every one of us, the better equipped we are to dismantle racism, oppression, and discrimination in our society.



Thank you for all you do and will continue to do to support and nurture the children in our care to value all human life. We will need to continue to work together to uplift each other, to obtain true equality, and heal as a society.

As we look to instill the skills of critical thinking, empathy, and compassion in our children, we want to be able to talk to them about topics that might be difficult for us or complex, to say the least. It is important that our discussions include first-hand accounts and stories from Black, Indigenous, and people of colour. We need to read these books by diverse authors from their perspectives to deepen our understanding and empathy for their experiences and histories. We want to make sure that we are not unintentionally perpetuating stereotypes and tokenism. Part of our discussion should also include questions about how we see people of colour portrayed in the media. We also need to acknowledge that we all have our own biases, based on our own lived histories. Students need to know about their own family histories. We need to be able to discuss the contributions and challenges of not only the cultural groups we identify with, but also those that make up our community. These

discussions need to be conducted in age-appropriate ways and go deeper as our students grow older, but we also know these discussions need to start early.



January 29, 2025, marks the beginning of this year's Lunar New Year celebrations for the Year of the Wood Snake. The term Lunar New Year refers to the first day of the New Year that is associated with the cycles of the moon. This holiday is traditionally a time to honour household and heavenly deities as well as ancestors. It is also a time to bring family together for feasting.

What is the Chinese Lunar Calendar?

The Chinese Calendar is a lunisolar calendar. It integrates the

revolution of the Earth around the Sun and the movement of the Moon around the Earth. A month begins on the day of the new moon or invisible moon and ends on the day before the next new moon. The full moon is either on the 15th or 16th of the month. A Chinese year can have 12 or 13 lunar months.

Lunar New Year is traditionally celebrated in China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Macau, Singapore,

Indonesia, Malaysia, Korea, Thailand, Vietnam, Cambodia, Mauritius, and the Philippines. It is also celebrated in Australia, Canada, and anywhere people from these Asian countries now call home.

Traditions, customs, and ways of celebrating this holiday vary depending on where families live and have lived. Often, families gather on New Year's Eve for a large family meal. It is also traditional for every family to thoroughly clean the house, in order to sweep away any ill-fortune and to make way for incoming good luck. Windows and doors are decorated with red coloured paper banners with couplets of good fortune, happiness, wealth, and longevity. Other activities include watching traditional dance (Lion Dance), lighting firecrackers, and giving money in red paper envelopes.

2025 is the Year of the Wood Snake. The sign of the Snake is the sixth of the 12 Chinese zodiac animals to arrive in the great race. The snake is associated with wisdom, charm, elegance and transformation. 2025 is predicted to bring wisdom, adaptability and a sense of transformation. A rare occurrence, the Wood Snake year is believed to bestow unique energies on each Chinese zodiac sign. People born in the Year of the Snake are believed to be intuitive, sensitive, extremely competent, funny, diligent, imaginative, sympathetic, wise, persuasive and passionate, strategic and intelligent.

Recent/upcoming years of the Snake are: 1953, 1965, 1977, 1989, 2001, 2013, 2025 and 2037.

Kindergarten Registration for Children Born in 2020

All kindergarten applicants are required to apply to their English catchment elementary school. This includes families who wish to apply for choice programs (Early French Immersion, Montessori, Indigenous Focus School, Early Mandarin Bilingual, Nootka Fine Arts) and/or a cross-boundary placement.

The **priority** registration period for kindergarten opened on **November 1, 2024 and closes at 4 pm on January 31, 2025.** Students who apply within this priority period will be accommodated <u>before</u> late applicants.

Applying for kindergarten is a 2-step process:

Step 1: Completion of an online application form

Step 2: Verifying documentation.

- Contact your English catchment school office to set up an appointment to bring your supporting documentation.
- Bring supporting documentation to your English catchment school office during your scheduled appointment.

Supporting documents needed:

- 1. Proof of residence in Vancouver
- 2. Child's birth certificate
- 3. Immigration documentation (if applicable)
- 4. Immunization records
- 5. Court orders/documents (if applicable)



Apply Online

If you want to apply for a District program or cross-boundary, you must <u>first apply to your English catchment elementary school</u>. Applications for District programs and cross boundary placements will begin to be accepted in early 2025.

In the event there are more in-catchment applicants than available space* at the school, the following process will be used to prioritize enrolment:

Kindergarten Applications Received Between November 1 and January 31

- 1. **In-catchment** kindergarten applicants with siblings in attendance at the school (and who will be attending next year) will be placed first.
- 2. The names of all other in-catchment registrants will be entered into a **random draw** for the remaining kindergarten spaces.
- 3. Students who cannot be accommodated will be placed on a waitlist in the order in which their name was drawn.
- 4. Between January 31 and the second Friday in June students on the ordered waitlist will be accommodated as space becomes available.

Kindergarten Registrations Received AFTER January 31st.

In-catchment kindergarten students who apply **after** January 31 will be accommodated if there is space. If there is no space their names will be added to the bottom of the existing waitlist. **Note**: There will be **no priority** given to registrants with siblings if they register after January 31.

Applications for Choice Programs

The district offers a variety of choice programs including French Immersion, Mandarin Immersion, Fine Arts, Aboriginal Focus School, International Baccalaureate and Montessori. Further information on Choice programs can be found here.


If you are planning to apply for Choice Program(s) you still need to register for kindergarten at your Neighbourhood catchment school first. The online application process for Choice Programs opens on January 7th, 2024, and closes on February 5, 2025, at 4:00 pm.

There will be a district supervised draw to select applicants for the available program space. Offers for program spaces will be made by late February. You will be given a formal offer of a space in a Kindergarten choice program or an indication of where you sit on the waitlist.

Applications for Cross Boundary Enrollment

Families who wish to apply to a school outside of their catchment area, known as cross-boundary, will **must** register their child at their neighbourhood catchment school first.

Applying for cross-boundary is a separate online process and runs from February 1-28. Cross boundary applications will only be considered after all in-catchment students have been accommodated. More information can be found on the district website, under <u>cross boundary registration</u>.
