

KIND MIND MONTH





Students from Division 8 learned about prominent Black leaders in Canada and after some research, shared their findings with these informative posters.


Learning About Indigenous Ways

STUDENT LEARNING SURVEY


The Provincial Student Learning Survey is unique in its scope, size and usefulness to schools. It gathers information from parents/guardians/caregivers, teachers, and students on topics related to school environment, safety, and achievement. The information is used for planning in individual schools and provides a district and provincial perspective.

Early in **2025** the Student Learning Survey will be administered to students in grades 4 and 7, their parents/guardians/caregivers, and all school staff. We encourage parents/guardians/caregivers to participate in this survey, as the results are important in identifying and celebrating current strengths, as well as determining where the school needs to focus improvement. The surveys contain standard questions for the province – in addition, questions from the school and/or district that focus on local conditions or issues may be included.

The survey can be completed electronically and can be accessed on the Internet at https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/education-training/k-12/support/student-learning-survey. Any computer or mobile device with an Internet connection can be used, and access to the e-survey is simple and secure. The survey can be accessed through the link and by clicking on Take the Survey. On the login page, click on the Parents icon, and then select the school district and school name where your child attends school. Provincial, District and School Reports for previous years can be viewed at the same site under the *Results* section.

Spring Celebrations Observed in Our Community

The more we learn about each other, the more we can build positive relationships and a stronger community. Last Newsletter we shared about Ramadan which has started and ends on March 28th. Below are some upcoming holidays.



HOLI (March 14th)

Holi is an ancient Hindu festival, which later became popular among all Indian communities as well. Holi marks the arrival of spring after winter. It signifies the victory of good over evil and is celebrated as a day of spreading happiness and love. The celebration starts on

the night before with Holika Dahan, where people perform rituals in front of a bonfire, praying for their inner evil to be destroyed, just as Holika was killed by fire. The carnival of colours beings the next morning, where people come out on the streets to play with colours and drench each other with coloured water!



Nowruz (March 20th)

Nowruz, meaning "new day," marks the first day of spring with over 300 million people taking part in the celebration of the vernal equinox. Nowruz is a holiday marking the Persian New Year and the first day of spring. Originating more than 3,000 years ago, the 13-day festival symbolizes renewal and harmony with nature. It begins at the exact moment of the Northern Hemisphere's vernal equinox, typically between March 19 and 22.



QING MING FESTIVAL (April

4th)

The Qingming Festival pays respect to the ancestors and celebrates the warming weather of spring. It's a time for honouring the past with a spirit of celebration

that includes space for both reflection and renewal. This day is also referred to as the Pure Brightness Festival or as Tomb Sweeping Day. It is observed quietly among families by visiting gravesites of relatives and enjoying time outdoors, sharing stories of ancestors. This festival takes place every year on April 4th or 5th on the first day of the fifth solar term of the Chinese calendar.



UGADI, GUDI PAWDA, CHAITRA NAVRATRI (April 9th to April 17th)

The Hindu Festival. Celebrated as Ugadi (Yugadi), the festival marks the beginning of a New Year according to traditional calendars followed by the Hindu community. Ugadi formed by

combining two Sanskrit words – 'Yuga' and 'Adi' - means new beginnings. While the day has a special significance for the people of Telangana, Andhra Pradesh, and Karnataka who celebrate the day as Ugadi, people in Maharashtra and Goa celebrate the festival as 'Gudi Padwa'. It is also celebrated as 'Chaitra Navratri' in some parts of the country. The first day of the Hindu lunisolar calendar's month of Chaitra is celebrated as Ugadi.

People celebrate Ugadi to mark the fresh beginnings and the joys of the upcoming year. Ugadi symbolizes that people should bask in the goodness of life and celebrate all flavours in the New Year. The festival also celebrates the onset of spring, which symbolizes relief from the harshness of the winter weather.

Celebrated over nine days to mark the beginning of creation, it is believed (according to Hindu mythology) that Lord Brahma started the creation of the universe on Ugadi. The festival celebrates the nine forms of Durga, and the first day (Chaitra Navratri) is dedicated to celebrating the beginning of mankind. Indian mathematician Bhaskaracharya had identified Ugadi as the beginning of the new year, new month, and a new day in the 12th century.

People deck up in colourful clothes. Clean their homes and decorate it, gift each other with new clothes and relish on lip-smacking dishes throughout the festival. Orange signifies energy and happiness.



VAISAKHI (April 14th)

Vaisakhi/Baisakhi is a long-established spring harvest festival for Sikhs and Hindus in Punjab. For Hindus it also

marks the beginning of Hindu solar New Year. For Sikhs, it commemorates the creation of the Khalsa Panth, the

transformation of the Sikhs into a family of soldier saints, which was founded in 1699 by Guru Gobind Singh. A Nagar Kirtan, a parade to celebrate the occasion, is usually held on or near this day and along the parade route people of all ages walk together, happy, joyous and sing hymns for the Guru Granth Sahib, the Sikh Holy Book. The parade procession is led by traditionally dressed Panj Piaras. The Guru Granth Sahib will be carried in the procession in a place of honour. Food is donated and handed out along the route of the procession. Everyone, all faiths and all people are invited to participate and eat in community.





PASSOVER (evening to evening April 12th to 20th)

Passover commemorates the Biblical story of Exodus – where God freed the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. The celebration of Passover is prescribed in the book of Exodus in the Old Testament (in Judaism, the first of five books of Moses are called the Torah). The holiday is often celebrated for eight days (seven in Israel), and incorporates themes of

springtime, a Jewish homeland, family, remembrance of Jewish history, social justice and freedom – including recognizing those who are still being oppressed today. All of these aspects are discussed, if not symbolically represented, during the Passover seder. The Passover Seder plate is a special plate containing 6 -symbolic foods eaten or displayed.



Good Friday (April 18th) EASTER (April 20th)

Easter commemorates the Resurrection of Jesus; Easter also celebrates the defeat of death and the hope of salvation. Christian tradition holds that the

sins of humanity were paid for by the death of Jesus and that his Resurrection represents the anticipation believers can have in their own resurrection. Easter is the most important Christian festival of the year. The Bible says that Christ died on the cross on a day called Good Friday and was resurrected and came back to life on Easter Sunday.



Easter Eggs & the Easter Bunny These are

modern traditions! Originally during Easter, churches did not allow the eating of eggs in the week before Easter. So, many people saved the eggs that were laid and decorated them to make them Holy Week eggs, that were then given to children as aifts.



During Victorian times, the tradition was adapted by making satin covered cardboard eggs filled with Easter gifts!

The first chocolate eggs appeared in the 19th Century in France and Germany. The chocolate was bitter and hard! As chocolate making

techniques evolved, hollow eggs like the ones we have today were developed and chocolate eggs quickly became a favourite Easter tradition. During the 19th Century, it is thought the idea of the Easter Bunny also became common. Rabbits usually give birth to a big litter of kittens, so they became a symbol of new life. The legend has it that the Easter Bunny lays, decorates and hides eggs as they are also a symbol of new life and hence began the

Bunny lays, decorates and hides eggs as they are also a symbol of new life and hence began the Easter Egg Hunt! This Easter Bunny tradition however is not followed in all countries that celebrate! In Switzerland, eggs come from a cuckoo and in parts of Germany by a fox.

Parent Advisory Council (PAC)






