Safety Awareness Corner

Awareness without action is worthless.

The temperature drops, the wind picks up, and like clockwork you're sniffling and sneezing again. Great, you've got another cold -- or is it winter allergies...? Do you know the difference?

Allergies

- Nasal secretions are watery, clear
- Itchy eyes and throat
- Symptoms persist for weeks

Colds

- Nasal secretions are discoloured
- Chills and body aches
- Symptoms are usually gone in a week

So, what do you do about allergies?

- If possible, avoid the allergens. Stay inside if wind is whipping up damp leaves and you're allergic to mold.
- 2. Wash away allergens. Wash hands and face frequently.
- Wash bedding often. Most bedrooms are havens for pet dander and dust mites.
- 4. Get better bedding. Start your search online with "allergy bedding".
- 5. Try saltwater nasal irrigation.
- 6. Get more moisture: water, tea, water rich fruits and veggies.
- 7. The air needs moisture too. Aim for 30-50% humidity.
- 8. Take allergy medication.

You're not alone with winter allergies. More than 40 million Americans are allergy-prone yearround. If you aren't getting the relief you need with lifestyle changes or over-the-counter medication, it may be time to talk to an allergist.

Pink Shirt Day – February 22nd

Do you know how Pink Shirt Day started? It has its roots in Nova Scotia and was started by two incredible high school students.

David Shepherd, Travis Price and their teenage friends organized a high-school protest to wear pink in sympathy with a Grade 9 boy who was being bullied for wearing a pink shirt. They took a stand against bullying when they protested the harassment of a new Grade 9 student by distributing pink T-shirts to all the boys in their school.

"I learned that two people can come up with an idea, run with it, and it can do wonders", says Mr. Price, 17, who organized the pink protest. "Finally, someone stood up for a weaker kid."

So, Mr. Shepherd and some others headed off to a discount store and bought 50 pink tank tops. They sent out messages to schoolmates that night, and the next morning they hauled the shirts to school in a plastic bag. As they stood in the foyer handing out the shirts, the bullied boy walked in. His face spoke volumes. "It looked like a huge weight was lifted off his shoulders," Mr. Price recalled.

The bullies were never heard from again.

February is Black History Month

During Black History Month, Canadians celebrate the many achievements and contributions of Black Canadians who, throughout history, have done so much to make Canada the culturally diverse, compassionate, and prosperous nation it is today.

People of African descent have been a part of shaping Canada's heritage and identity since the arrival of Mathieu Da Costa, a navigator and interpreter, whose presence in Canada dates back to the early 1600s.

The role of Blacks in Canada has not always been viewed as a key feature in Canada's historic landscape. There is little mention that some of the Loyalists who came here after the American Revolution and settled in the Maritimes were Blacks, or of the many sacrifices made in wartime by Black Canadian soldiers as far back as the War of 1812

Few Canadians are aware of the fact that African people were once enslaved in the territory that is now Canada, or of how those who fought enslavement helped to lay the foundation of Canada's diverse and inclusive society.

Black History Month is a time to learn more about these Canadian stories and the many other important contributions of Black Canadians to the settlement, growth and development of Canada, and about the diversity of Black communities in Canada and their importance to the history of this country.

Recognizing Black History Month

The commemoration of Black History Month dates back to 1926, when Harvardeducated African American historian Carter G. Woodson proposed setting aside a time devoted to honour the accomplishments of African Americans and to heighten awareness of Black history in the United States. This led to the establishment of Negro History Week in 1926. Celebrations of Black history began in Canada also shortly thereafter. During the early 1970s, the week became known as Black History Week. It was expanded into Black History Month in 1976.

In December 1995, the House of Commons officially recognized February as Black History Month in Canada following a motion introduced by the first Black Canadian woman elected to Parliament, the Honourable Jean Augustine. The motion was carried unanimously by the House of Commons.

In February 2008, Senator Donald Oliver, the first Black man appointed to the Senate, introduced. It received unanimous approval and was adopted on March 4, 2008. The adoption of this motion completed Canada's parliamentary position on Black History Month.
