# 1. Welcome and Acknowledgement

## 2. PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - Mr. Tony Romano

- We have approximately 235 students this year. Students are now in their homeroom classes. In May staff devised tentative classes for Sept. with the goal to have positive learning environments for all students.
- The following criteria was used to build this years classes:
  - Learning styles and strengths
  - Friendships (at least one friend)
  - Class size regulations (stipulated by the Ministry of Education)
  - A balance of social, emotional and behavioural needs
  - A range of learning needs with a balance of students requiring learning assistance or special education services in each class
  - A child's physical and social maturity (especially in combined classes)
- In September VSB gave us a revised organisation which included many split/blended classes as our previous plan did not meet requirements, mainly class size composition. (teachers are only required to have so many designated students in one classroom).
- Blended/split classrooms arise for various reasons; small student enrollment, class size regulations (stipulated by the Ministry of Education), or intentional educational design. Teachers in this type of classroom meet the education needs of their students by:
  - Differentiated Instruction: Adopting differentiated instruction; tailoring lessons to fit individual needs, abilities, and learning styles. This benefits both grades, as students can work at their own pace. Higher-achieving students are challenged with advanced material, while struggling students receive additional support.
  - Collaborative Learning: Students from different grades can engage in peer teaching or collaborative learning. Older/more advanced students may help explain concepts to younger/less experienced students, reinforcing their own understanding. This cross-grade interaction enhances communication, leadership, and teamwork skills.
  - Curriculum Integration: Focusing on integrated learning; subjects are taught in themes that apply to both grade levels. For example, a social studies lesson might explore a broad topic like ancient civilizations, with younger students focusing on foundational ideas and older students diving into more complex aspects. This helps align lessons across grades while ensuring that each student is challenged appropriately.
  - Development of Independence and Responsibility: Split classrooms often require students to become more independent and self-directed in their learning.
     Teachers may be focusing on one grade level at times, students in the other

- grade will learn to work independently on assignments or projects. This fosters time management, responsibility, and self-motivation.
- Flexibility in Pacing: Split classes allow for greater flexibility in terms of pacing.
   Some students excel in certain subjects, moving ahead of their grade level,
   while others need more time to grasp the material. Teachers can group students
   by ability rather than by grade, providing more customized learning experiences.
- Positive Social and Emotional Development: Split classrooms often create a unique community where students of different ages develop meaningful relationships. Older students may take on mentorship roles, while younger students learn from their peers. This mixed-age environment can foster a supportive, inclusive atmosphere, promoting empathy and social growth.

## Challenges and Solutions:

 While split classrooms offer many benefits, they do come with challenges; balancing the needs of different grade levels and ensuring that each group receives adequate attention. Teachers often address these challenges by using strategies such as rotating groups, station-based learning, or project-based learning to ensure that all students receive the appropriate level of instruction.
