Course Planning Process & Timeline

- * Course Planning is done every **February** with Counsellors
- * Research is important, more so each year. Consider consulting and discussing with the following people:
 - family friends teachers
 - older students school counsellor
- * The **Course Planning Guide** is a valuable resource to use for learning about courses. There are detailed descriptions for each option. You can access this document **online on our website.**

Course Planning Process & Timeline

- Assembly presentation for Grade 9 students: <u>Tues. Feb. 13, FIT</u>
- Course Planning Form completed, signed, submitted:
 - Fri. Feb. 23
- Choices reviewed by Counsellor and discussions with students as needed:
 <u>Feb. to May</u>
- Student schedules randomly built based upon course requests:
 <u>May to Aug.</u>
- Timetabling conflicts resolved from June through to September for courses in both Semester 1 & 2 next year.

Course Planning Process & Timeline

... continued

- Select courses based on your own interests. Choices are assorted randomly by computer into timetables.
- Students don't select their teachers
 - period of day or semester when courses are scheduled
 - which other students are in your classes.
- Making changes to courses initially selected will be limited, and if requested late, may not be possible due to course conflicts or courses being full.

Post-Secondary Planning: An Introduction

There are different types of post-secondary institutions (PSIs):

- * Vocational/trade/technology schools/institutes
- * Private institutions
- * Colleges
- * Universities

There are different types of qualifications/certifications:

- * Certificates a year or less
- * Diplomas one to two years
- Associate Degrees two years then transfer to a university to complete the degree
- * Degrees a Bachelor degree takes 4 years of full-time study

There are different admission requirements and standards for each program.

Post-Secondary Planning: Some Details...

Usually, the most competitive programs to enter are at universities with a few exceptions. University admission in Canada is *usually* based on:

- Admission Average of Marks may consider 4-6 subjects at the Gr. 12 level and may consider Gr. 11 marks for early admission and to replace 'missing' Gr. 12 marks. These are usually the traditional 'academic' courses (English, Math, Sciences, Languages, Social Sciences, AP courses), but may include Fine Arts.
- * **English 12 (**English 11 for early admissions or 'missing' English 12)
- * Additional Language credits (UBC Language 11; SFU Beginner Language 11)
- * **Pre-Calculus 11** completion (Foundations of Math 11 & 12 may satisfy for some programs; Pre-Calculus 12 required for others)
- * Broad-based Admission Process essays, portfolios, videos, interviews, etc...

Please start your research early to avoid disappointment later...

Post-Secondary Planning More Details...

Science Degree Programs Usually require Chemistry 11, Physics 11, Pre-Calculus 11 & 12 and two Science 12 courses.

Engineering Programs *Usually* require Chemistry 11 & 12, Physics 11 & 12, Pre-Calculus 11 & 12.

Business Degree Programs Usually require Pre-Calculus 11 & 12 + supplemental application materials.

Ontario Universities For Science, Engineering and Business programs, Calculus 12 is often required.

Post-Secondary Planning: More Details...

Broad Based Admissions

This refers to additional considerations, beyond marks, that are taken into account for admission decisions. Here are some examples:

Fine Arts Programs – usually include a portfolio, audition or written submissions.

Business Degree Programs – often require information about leadership, volunteering, community work, references, and may have a video submission or video interview.

UBC – for all programs, students are required to write a number of paragraphs that refer to life experiences, community involvement, leadership, volunteering, and to provide references.

The Graduation Program

To graduate in BC, students will require **80 credits total**, with a minimum of 16 credits at the grade 12 level. There is a 4-credit requirement for an Indigenous-focused course, which is made available at P.G. in Gr. 11 or 12 in English or S.S.

Graduation Checklist – Minimum Requirements

To graduate, the BC Ministry of Education requires students to complete 80 credits in Grades 10, 11 and 12. Sixteen credits will be at Grade 12 (+ CLC 12), and at least 28 will be elective credits. Our full-semester courses are all worth 4 credits. The chart below details specific course requirements under the current Graduation Program.

* A Grade 10 Graduation Numeracy Assessment is required. It will be independent of any specific Math course and reported separately on student transcripts.

** Grade 10 and Grade 12 Graduation Literacy Assessments are required. These assessments are independent of specific Language Arts courses and will be reported separately on student transcripts.

Course Selection Requirements for Students entering Grade 10

Eight (8) courses will be selected for next year + CLE 10 online

- * off-timetable or on-line courses will be additional 10th , 11th courses, etc...
- Generally, students will have:
 - * 6 core courses (Math, English, Science, Social Studies, P.H.E.; Career Life Education 10 is online)
 - * 1 Second Language, Skills or ELL course
 - * 2 other Electives (note: this may vary)
- Students will enter course requests on-line and submit a signed Course Planning form to me by Friday, February 23, 2024

Grade 10: Core Courses

The following courses are required for graduation:

- * an English 10 Combination
- * Social Studies 10
- * a Mathematics 10
- * Science 10
- * Physical & Health Ed. 10
- * Career Life Education 10 (online)

Grade 10: Mini Courses

The following courses are a part of the Mini 10 program:

- English 10 Combination + Social Studies 10

Additional Grade 10 Requirements

Provincial Assessments -- required for graduation

There are two Provincial Assessments. Both are independent of specific courses and will not impact marks in any course. They will be reported separately on a student's academic record, or transcript. These are usually scheduled in November and January:

* Provincial Numeracy Assessment

* Provincial Literacy Assessment



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English 10 is a graduation requirement and is offered in the following combinations:

Literary Studies 10 + Composition 10 (MLTST10 + MCMPS10)

- * Lit. Studies: literary analysis of poetry, short stories, novels plays
- * **Composition:** explores literature to improve writing skills with focus on a particular theme, genre, or author, including First Peoples narratives.

Literary Studies + Creative Writing (MLTST10 +MCRTWR10)

- * Lit. Studies: literary analysis of poetry, short stories, novels plays
- Creative Writing: focuses on the study and practice of various forms of writing

Literary Studies 10 + New Media 10 (MLTST10 + MNMD10)

- * Lit. Studies: literary analysis of poetry, short stories, novels plays
- * **New Media:** critical thinking and exploration of new media platforms, and development of media literacy.

Science 10 & Social Studies 10

Pages 18, 19

Science 10 -- required for graduation (MSC--10)

Science 10 is the gateway to Chemistry, Physics, and Biology which are standalone courses in grades 11 and 12. Big ideas include the following:

* Genes are the foundation of diversity in living things

* Chemical processes require energy as atoms are rearranged. Energy is conserved and can be transformed

* The Big Bang Theory can explain the formation of the Universe

Social Studies 10 -- required for graduation (MSS--10)

Canada in the 20'th Century: Canadian identity, Canada in the world community, Canadian global citizenship, Canadian government.

Mathematics 10

Page 13

Foundations of Mathematics & Pre-Calculus 10 -- required for graduation (MFMP-10)

This course leads to Pre-Calculus Math 11 or Foundations of Math 11 which are required for further studies in Math and university-level studies.

or...

Workplace Mathematics 10 -- required for graduation (MWPM-10)

For those who have found Math 8 and 9 challenging, this course leads to Workplace Math 11, which satisfies graduation requirements. This is adequate for entry-level employment, *some* college and trades programs, but not for university-level studies.

*one Math 10 courses is required for graduation

Career Life Education 10 Health & Physical Education

Pages 6 & 17

Career Life Education 10 -- required for graduation (MCLE-10), online

There are three main areas of study in Career Life Education 10:

* **Personal Development** - goal setting, life-long learning, grad. requirements

* **Connections to Community** - identify and explore economic trends and their impact on communities, workplaces and career opportunities.

* Career Life Plan - explore careers, employability skills, opportunities after grad.

Physical & Health Education 10 -- required for graduation (MPHED10)

This course focuses on personal health goals, fitness concepts, and skills acquisition through individual, dual and team sports. This course also includes training in CPR and AED.

English Language Learners (ELL)

Page 8

Student placement in ELL levels for next year is decided in May/June. For now, by default, you will select the next higher level. Promotion decisions are based on:

- English language proficiency.
- Comprehensive assessments of students' reading, writing, speaking and listening abilities throughout the year.
- The professional judgement of teachers in both regular and ELL classes.



Skills / Learning Strategies

Page 4

Learning Strategies 10 (YLE--OA)

To assist students in achieving their full potential in all academics.

* Students receive one-to-one assistance where skills and concepts are clarified, re-taught and reinforced. There are also mini-lessons, covering topics such as:

- organization time management
- study skills learning and test-taking strategies
- * Classroom adaptations can be recommended.

* "**Skills**" blocks are assigned in consultation with teachers, resource team, counsellor, student, and parents. This usually takes the place of an additional language, but may displace an elective.

Note: this is a 4 credit course in Gr. 10 – 12.

Electives: Modern Languages

Page 14

French 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 - students build proficiency communicating in French; speaking, listening, reading, and writing are emphasized each year. Topics vary at each level and focus on accurate communication through an authentic cultural context. French 8 is a beginner course for those who have never taken French at school.

Beginners' Japanese 11 - an intensive introductory course with an emphasis on listening, speaking, reading, writing, and non-verbal communication. Students learn Hirogana, Katakana of the Japanese writing system. Topics include greetings, introductions, counting, daily routines, hobbies, basic conversational skills.

Japanese 11 - continuation of Beginner Japanese 11 with an emphasis on listening, speaking, reading, writing, with more attention on oral presentation. Many topics are covered including Japanese media, and environmental issues.

Electives: Applied Design, Skills (Pages 6-8) & Technologies

Foods 10 (MFOOD10) - this course alternates as Course A and Course B from year to year. Course A: focuses on food, culture and the culinary aspects of special celebrations; Course B: focuses on food preparation techniques and the relationship food plays with self, family, and different cultures.

Clothing & Textiles 10 (MTXT-10) - learn basic hand and machine sewing techniques, fabric study, First Peoples' practices, embroidery, knitting and crochet. Choose textile projects based on stylistic, environmental and ethical factors.

Information Technology 10 (MCSTU10) - introduces students to foundations of computer science, intermediate programming skills, and focus on the big ideas of computing- abstraction, design, recursion, concurrency, simulations, and the limits of computations. Please see the guide for more details...

Woodwork 10 (MWWK-10) - introductory course that builds on skills learned in Woodwork 9, but is also appropriate for beginners. Students learn and demonstrate safe woodworking practices on a variety of hand tools, portable and stationary power tools. Basic joinery, design and wood finishing also introduced.

Electives: Fine Arts

Page 11

Art 10 (MVAD-10) - course for beginners and seasoned art students focused on drawing, painting, printmaking, mixed media, ceramics and sculpture.

Ceramics & Sculpture 10 (MVAC-10) - this course focuses on building skills in modelling, casting, carving and construction in a variety of materials, including clay, soapstone, wood, plaster and more.

Graphic Design 10 (MVAM-10) - focuses on visual literacy and image development skills. Topics include poster design, illustration and publication design, using Adobe Indesign, Photoshop and photography.

Art Studio Cohort 10 - 12 (MVAST10) - intended for students with a strong interest in art and design, including those developing portfolios for post-secondary applications. Students in this course are expected to be enrolled in another Fine Arts course.

Electives: Performing Arts - Music

Page 15

Beginner Band 10 (MMUCB10--1) - no experience necessary as students will learn the basics of playing and musicianship. Students will be able to select an instrument from a large variety of concert band instruments.

Symphonic Band 10 (MMUCB10) - best for students with at least one year of playing a band instrument. Continued emphasis on musical development while learning a wide variety of music. Includes concerts and other music related activities.

Jazz Band 10 (MMUJB10) - students also need to be enrolled in a band or strings class. Students will be placed in a jazz band grouping that reflects their playing ability. **Note: Jazz Band is an off-timetable class,** offered one morning before school and one afternoon after classes, per week.

Electives: Performing Arts - Music

Page 15

Junior Strings 10 (MMUOR10--2) - open to students in grades 8-10, including those new to Strings. Students will learn bowing techniques, orchestral ensemble, and performance skills.

Senior Strings 10 (MMUOR10) - PG's most advanced Strings ensemble and builds on skills learned in Junior Strings. A wide variety of music will be learned with continued emphasis on musical skill development.

Senior Concert Choir 10 (MMUCC10) - large performing choir singing a range of music (early classical to pop and gospel), and building skills developed in Junior Concert Choir as well as further developing vocal production, music reading, and general musicianship. New singers are welcome.

Chamber Choir 10 (MMUCH10) - audition required, and students should be co-enrolled in either Concert Choir 10, Band 10 or a Strings 10 course. Commitment, positive attitude and musical ability are vital to this ensemble. A variety of music will be chosen for performances. This is an off-timetable class.

Electives: Performing Arts - Drama

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Drama 10 (MDRM-10) - this course continues development of improvisation skills, vocal projection and stage presence. Greater attention will be given to the development of character both improvised and scripted.

Theatre Production 10 (MDRD-10) - this is an on-timetable course intended for students interested in production aspects of theatre: set design, computer drafting, lighting projection, sound scenic painting, invention and innovation. If you are taking this course this year, please make note of this to your counsellor.

Junior Breezeway Theatre Company 10 (MDRTC10) - the focus of this course is performance. Students will perform in 2 productions and will be exposed to all aspects of theatre including production, directing, writing, crew side and performance side. This is an off-timetable course, running Tuesdays 3:30 -5:30 pm.

Summer School: Completion Courses

- * Completion courses at the Grade 10 level and above can be taken at Summer School. A completion course is a full 4 credit course that counts towards graduation.
- Taking a completion course is only recommended for students who have a strong foundation in the subject area they intend to study.
- Please note: In-person Summer School courses are done very quickly and are fast paced, 3-1/2 hours per day for 5 weeks, July 2 – August 2.
- * Taking two Summer School courses is **not recommended** as it fast paced and demanding of most of your time.

- * Register yourself for Summer School when it opens later this Spring (late April/early May).

On-line Courses

- Some courses can be taken on-line and there are several online providers including the Vancouver Learning Network.
- Success in on-line courses depends on your organization, self-discipline, effective problem-solving and commitment to invest your time outside of school.
- Point Grey cannot track your progress in an on-line course it will be up to you to keep track of deadlines, book test times at the on-line school's appointed test site and ensure the course is completed by the assigned end date.
- * If you wish to take an on-line course, it will be **in addition to your 8 courses** on timetable at Point Grey.
- You must have permission from your parent/guardian, complete and submit the "Letter of Intent to Enroll in an On-Line Course" form as soon as you are committed to taking an on-line course.


Instructions for selecting courses

<u>Step 1</u>


- Log into your account using your student number and password. If you are unable to get into your account do the following:


✓ Click on Top Tab "My Info"




On the left-hand side of the screen, you will see a tab called "Requests"- click on this
