

ENGLISH 10 IS A GRADUATION REQUIREMENT AND IS OFFERED IN THE FOLLOWING COMBINATIONS: LITERARY STUDIES 10 + COMPOSITION 10 (MLTST10 +MCMPS10)

LIT. STUDIES: LITERARY ANALYSIS OF POETRY, SHORT STORIES, NOVELS, PLAYS

COMPOSITION: EXPLORES LITERATURE TO IMPROVE WRITING SKILLS WITH A FOCUS ON A PARTICULAR THEME, GENRE, OR AUTHOR, INCLUDING FIRST PEOPLES NARRATIVES.

ELECTIVES: MODERN LANGUAGES

(PAGE 14)

French 8 (MFR--08) -introductory course to develop a foundation so you can begin to understand French and express yourself and have basic conversations in French about friends, family, school and activities. Students may participate in fieldtrips with a focus on theatre, food, and film as well as exploring your own cultural identity and the Francophone culture.

French 9 (MFR--09) -build on your strategies so that you can understand more French and express yourself and meaningful conversations in French. Students will read and share media and participate in field studies with a focus on theatre, food, and film as well as exploring your own cultural identity and the Francophone culture.

French 10 (MFR--10) -gain more appreciation for cultural diversity through an exploration of Francophone culture, deepen your ability to express yourself in French and have more meaningful conversations, communicate with accuracy, through an authentic cultural context and share media orally and in written form.

ELECTIVES: MODERN LANGUAGES

(PAGE 14)

French 11 (MFR--11) –continued exploration and understanding of the Francophone culture and their own, students will continue to increase their ability to communicate in oral and written forms, read, interpret media, expand writing, having meaningful, varied conversations. Field studies at Cinamatheque.

French 12 (MFR--12) – students will have the opportunity to keep polishing their French language skills and continue to express themselves with more depth, duration and clarity. Students will continue to explore Francophone culture and creative works, read authentic texts, explore a novel, and will attend a full day film study at Cinamatheque.

ELECTIVES: MODERN LANGUAGES

(PAGE 14)

Beginners' Japanese 11 (MBJA-11) -intensive introductory course, emphasizing listening, speaking, reading, writing, with more attention on oral presentation. Many topics covered including Japanese media, and environmental issues.

Japanese 11 (MJA--11) – continuation of Beginners' Japanese 11 emphasizing listening, speaking, reading, and writing. More emphasis is given to oral classroom activities. Kanji and new vocabulary structures will continue to be taught. Japanese media, sports heroes, foreign exchange students, part-time jobs, and the environment are topics throughout the course.

Japanese 12 (MJA--12) designed for students who were successful in Japanese 11 and want to learn to communicate in complex Japanese. The emphasis is on incorporating the four skills at an advanced level. Kanji will continue to be taught and further developed. Students will spend a lot of time reading authentic Japanese texts and expressing thoughts on various topics in both verbal and written forms.

ELECTIVES: APPLIED DESIGN, SKILLS & TECHNOLOGIES

(PAGES 6-8)

Foods 10 (MFOOD10) - this course alternates as Course A and Course B as it is a combined class. Course A: focuses on food, culture and the culinary aspects of special celebrations; Course B: focuses on food preparation techniques and the relationship food plays with self, family, and different cultures.

Clothing & Textiles 10 (MTXT-10) – introduced to basic hand and machine sewing techniques, fabric study, First Peoples practices and principles of design, environmental and ethical factors of textiles choices, altering patterns, upcycling /recycling, and other arts and crafts techniques.

Information Technology 10 (MCSTU10) - introduces students to the foundations of computer science, intermediate programming skills, and the big ideas of computing- abstraction, design, recursion, concurrency, simulations, and the limits of computations. Please see the guide for more details.

Woodwork 10 (MWWK-10) – is an introductory course appropriate for beginners or those who took WW 9. Students learn and demonstrate safe woodworking practices using a variety of hand tools portable and/or stationary power equipment. Basic joinery, design and wood finishing will also be introduced.

ELECTIVES: FINE ARTS

Art 10 (MVAD-10) -drawing, painting, printmaking, mixed media, ceramics, and sculpture for the beginner and/or the seasoned art student alike. Students are encouraged to develop their skills, play with materials, and practice the various disciplines in a fun and interactive environment.

Art Studio Cohort 10 (MVAST10) –intended for students with a strong interest in art, design, and architecture and wanting to develop a portfolio. The cohort will consist of students in grades 10-12 who will develop a supportive arts community and provide a more in-depth study of contemporary art, art materials, and methods. Includes community interaction through field trips and guest speakers. See the guide for more information.

Ceramics & Sculpture 10 (MVAC-10) - focus on skill development and experimentation in ceramics and sculpture with an increased focus on self-expression. Topics of instruction include: modeling, casting, carving, and construction. Materials include clay, wood, soapstone, plaster, and more.

Graphic Design 10 (MVAM-10) – Builds on practical knowledge of Graphics 9 while introducing visual literacy and image development skills. Creative thinking and visual problem-solving are introduced and further explored. Adobe Indesign and Photoshop, poster design, darkroom photography, illustration, and publication design are all taught.

ELECTIVES: PERFORMING ARTS-BAND

(PAGE 15)

Beginner Concert Band 10 (MMUCB10--1) - no experience necessary as students will learn the basics of playing and musicianship. Students will be able to select an instrument from a large variety of concert band instruments.

Symphonic Band 10 (MMUCB10) – this is PG's most advanced concert band. The symphonic band will play more music concerts and will be involved in a tour. A wide variety of music will be learned, emphasizing musical skill development.

Jazz Band 10- Off-Timetable (MMUJB10) - students must also take Symphonic Band or Strings. Students are placed into Jazz A, B, C, or D in September according to their playing ability. This group meets once in the morning and once after school each week.

ELECTIVES: PERFORMING ARTS-BAND

(PAGE 15)

Junior Strings 10 (MMUOR10) - for students who are beginners and those with some experience playing the violin, viola, cello, and double bass. Students will learn bowing techniques, orchestral ensemble, and performance skills.

Senior Strings 10 (MMUOR10) – advanced strings ensemble building materials learned in Junior Strings. Senior Strings is a fast-paced class with a high emphasis on musical skills. Strong musical background and competency in the instruments are stressed. Performance with the ensemble is an essential part of the class. Concerts, district festivals, retreats, workshops, and tours are part of the course.

Senior Concert Choir 10 (MMUCC10) - large performing choir welcomes all singers. Building on skills learned in Junior Concert Choir, the group sings a range of music including early classical to pop and gospel, while learning vocal production, music reading, and musicianship.

Chamber Choir 10 Off Timetable (MMUCH10) – strong musical background in singing recommended for students with a strong interest in music and willingness to commit to rehearsals outside of class time. The ensemble will perform at school events, concerts, and other activities such as district festivals, retreats, workshops, and tours.

ELECTIVES: PERFORMING ARTS- DRAMA

(PAGE 16)

Drama 10 (MDRM-10) - this course provides instruction on improvisation skills as well as individual and small group work in short scripted scenes and plays. Emphasis on public speaking and building performance confidence.

Theatre Production 10 (MDRD-10) - this is an on-timetable course intended for students interested in the production aspects of theatre: set design, computer drafting, lighting projection, sound scenic painting, invention, and innovation.

Theatre Production 11 On-timetable (MDRD-10) - this is an on-timetable course open to grade 10 students who took Theatre Production last year. It is a continuation of skills developed in Theatre Production 10, and students would be expected to support the Drama 9/10 classes and/or Acting 11/12 class. Topics include-- lighting, sound, scenic painting, set design, and computer drafting.

Junior Breezeway Theatre Company 10 Off-timetable (MDRTC10) – with a focus on performance, students will be expected to perform in two productions. Students will be exposed to all aspects of theatre, from the production, directing, writing, and crew side to the acting and performing side. The musical theatre genre will also be introduced. The class meets Tuesdays from 3:30 -5:30, with weekly rehearsals based on availability and need.
