() Emergency Preparedness Drills

Over the past few weeks, students successfully participated in several emergency drills, including a lockdown drill, fire drill, and earthquake drill. They followed instructions attentively and demonstrated that they know how to respond appropriately in the event of an emergency.

During our earthquake drill, we practiced the safety procedure "Drop, Cover, and Hold On," which helps students understand how to protect themselves during seismic activity. These drills are an important part of our school and district's commitment to emergency preparedness. They allow us to review and update our response plans and supplies to ensure we are ready to act effectively in the event of a real emergency.

Musqueam Day – Honouring Strength and Justice

Every year, Musqueam recognises November 1 as Musqueam Day—a holiday that honours the strength and determination of Musqueam ancestors in their pursuit of justice and the protection of their inherent rights. This date marks the landmark Supreme Court of Canada decision in *R. v. Guerin* (1984), which centred on the Shaughnessy Golf Course lease and affirmed Musqueam rights in the case. It stands as a powerful reminder of the importance of Indigenous advocacy and legal recognition. Halloween

With Halloween just around the corner, excitement is building as students and families begin planning costumes for our annual Halloween parade on **October 31**. We love seeing the creativity and spirit this event brings to our school community!

As you prepare, please keep in mind that costumes should be fun, respectful, and school-appropriate. We kindly ask families to avoid costumes that may be culturally insensitive or that mimic racial or ethnic groups. Additionally, costumes that promote or normalize violence—including those with weapons or violent props—are not permitted.

Also, Halloween is a time for spooky thrills and imagination. But the holiday also brings some extra risks for children and teens. Did you know that child pedestrian injuries are more likely on Halloween than on any other night of the year. Help keep Halloween fun and safe for your family with these tips.

- Always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds. If trick-or-treating doesn't start until after dark where you live, consider checking with your town or park district for Halloween activities offered earlier in the day. Research shows that evenings from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. are the riskiest times of day for child pedestrians.
- **If your older children are trick-or-treating alone**, plan and review the route that is acceptable to you. Agree on a specific time when they should return home and get flashlights with batteries for everyone.
- Talk with kids about the risk of distracted walking. This includes text messaging, talking on or looking at the mobile phone and listening to music.
- Cross the street as a group in established crosswalks. Most (62%) child pedestrian traffic fatalities occurred mid-block, rather than at intersections. Make sure kids know not to cross the street between parked cars or out of driveways or alleys.
- **Don't assume cars will stop just** because they have the right of way. Motorists may have trouble seeing trick-ortreaters.

- **Stay on well-lit streets and always use the sidewalk.** If no sidewalk is available, walk at the far edge of the roadway facing traffic. Only go to homes with a porch light on and, ideally, a well-lit pathway.
- Remember: it's about having fun; injuries are never fun.

The Van Tech ChOrD (Choral Outreach and Development) program is an exciting new initiative designed to build a musical bridge between our feeder elementary schools and the vibrant choral community at Vancouver Technical Secondary.
