## **Principal's Message**

Dear Students and Families,

We hope you all had a restful, relaxing and rejuvenating Spring Break.

On Tuesday, April 15th, students will meet with their homeroom classes during Flexible Instructional Time (FIT) to self-reflect on their thinking, communicating, personal and social core competencies and set goals for future learning and growth. This is a continuation from the reflection and goal setting that we started with students in November, and students will repeat this activity again in June, building the life-long skills necessary to set a learning target and then work towards it. The Core Competencies are integrated throughout all areas of learning in the British Columbia's K-12 curriculum, and all students now have the opportunity to engage in core competency self-reflection and goal setting throughout the school year, building on their learning and growth from year to year.

On Friday, April 25th, Mid-Semester Written Learning Updates for Semester 2 will be published for students and families. If students and families have any questions about how learning is going, you are always welcome to connect with teachers and counsellors. When reviewing as a family, here are helpful questions to get conversation started:

We also invite you to join us for the upcoming Parent-Teacher Conferences on Wednesday, May 7th, taking place virtually through Teams, with the opportunity to book appointments starting on Monday, April 28th. ### **Daily Absences**

Parents/guardians are to report all absences by email at <a href="mailto:uhillswitchboard@vsb.bc.ca">uhillswitchboard@vsb.bc.ca</a>. Emails should be sent using a parent/guardian email address and should provide the student's first and last name, student number, grade, date(s) of absence, time of absence or periods of missed classes, and reason for the absence. For extended absences parents/guardians must email the student's counsellor. A student should also email their teachers directly. It is the student's responsibility to make up any work that is missed, regardless of the reason for the absence. Exceptions to this may be granted due to unforeseen circumstances. If a student becomes ill while at school, or has an appointment during school time, students must sign out at the office. Students will only be released with parent/guardian permission. Students who are ill should not come to school, and if they attend school and are deemed to be unwell, parents/guardians will be contacted to pick up their child.

A reminder that MyEducationBC (MyEd) is the student information system for the Vancouver School Board. A Student/Family Portal Account has been created by the district for all students at University Hill Secondary School. This account is a shared account where students and parents can access student schedules, daily/class attendance, course grades and learning updates. 

Capacity Café is a unique opportunity for caregivers, parents, and guardians to hear about and learn from the lived experience of youth.

In a Capacity Café, adults sit around a circle with youth where a moderated discussion unfolds. When sitting around the Capacity Café circle, youth are given the opportunity to share their thoughts, views, and observations on various topics, speaking to youth lived experience. Some of the topics include stress management, substance use, and relationships.

The Capacity Café is intended to be a youth-friendly environment where youth are invited to talk openly about the issues they consider to be important to them and their peers. Through Capacity Cafes, SACY aims to forge intergenerational connections by helping caregivers, parents and guardians understand and appreciate life from a youth's perspective and be better equipped as youth-allies.

## What is Reclaiming Connections?

Reclaiming Connections brings parents and caregivers together for 10 weekly gatherings, with a focus on understanding the importance of attachment and connection for preteens (age 8-12) and teens (age 13-17).

Caregivers come together in **groups of** 8-12 with two facilitators for 1.5 hours each week. Knowledge keepers and Elders are welcome at each gathering, which occur in-person or virtually.

The group promotes **cultural connectedness** and is **shaped by Indigenous voices** to ensure relevance by and for each community's particular culture, needs, and history.

### Reclaiming Connections

Drawing on Indigenous Knowledge & Cultural Resilience to Strengthen Relationships Between Youth, their Parents, and their Circle of Caregivers

### What do Parents and Caregivers Do in Reclaiming Connections?

- Drawing on each caregiver's cultural knowledge, explore ideas and strategies to support our children and take care of ourselves
- Build understanding of our child's and our own relational needs, feelings, and behaviours
- Discuss ways of responding to challenging behaviours and intense emotions
- Watch role plays that show common challenges and engage in reflection exercises



### Shaping Reclaiming Connections

Reclaiming Connections is shaped by Indigenous families, mental health professionals, and researchers.

Through mutual dialogue and partnership with all levels of community, we continue to gather information about how to make the program stronger and ensure cultural sensitivity and safety.

Information gathered belongs to each community; and with consent, new knowledge will be shared broadly to support learning.



### Understanding Our Connections with Adolescents

Becoming a teenager is a big transition for both young people and their kinship. Many parents and caregivers may find it difficult connecting with their youth. However, teenagers continue to need relationships and connections with their caregivers and kinship as they get older.

In Reclaiming Connections, we find new ways of understanding and strengthening relationships with our children to support them in navigating life's journey.
