Core Assets

Each of us possess a unique set of skills and abilities. For most, they have developed over many years after dedicating much time and energy to them. Sometimes we use the word 'talent'. What does this word actually mean? Is it something we are naturally born with or is it something that we spend a lot of time and energy on because we enjoy it? Consider the term 'asset' instead. Dr. Michele Borba describes assets as positive qualities, character traits, and unique abilities that help us to thrive.

The acronym TALENT can help us uncover the core assets in our children:

T — **Tenacity.** The child shows determination and perseverance to succeed at the task involving the asset.

A — Attention. The child is easily absorbed in the task and focuses longer when compared to other strengths areas or assets.

L — Learning. The child learns quicker and easier when using the core asset.

E — Eagerness. The child is motivated and energized to be an active participant in the task, and doesn't need adult prodding or rewards.

N — Need. The child is possessive about the asset: "It's MY thing." The asset is a confidence booster, relaxer, or fulfiller of a positive need.

T — Tone. The child sound excited, proud, or joyous when talking about the asset.

Keeping Kids Home When Sick

Thank you to those families who read, signed, and returned our form describing when to keep your child home if they are unwell. The seasonal illness season has been really affected elementary schools in Vancouver and will likely continue through the remainder of the winter season. As a reminder, we have posted the information here again:

WHEN SHOULD I KEEP MY SICK CHILD HOME FROM SCHOOL?

Things to consider if your child feels unwell:

- 1. The protection of your child. Without proper rest a child may have a hard time fighting an illness or be open to other illnesses.
- 2. The ability of your child to actively take part and learn at school.
- 3. The school staff cannot care for a sick child and give them the support that they may need.
- 4. The protection of other children.

Please keep your child home if he/she:

- Has a fever.
- Is too sick to take part in all normal school activities.
- Has a suspected or known communicable disease (i.e. strep throat, chicken pox, measles or any other undiagnosed rash).
- Keep your child home until they cannot infect others or as told by a health care provider.
- Is vomiting or has diarrhea. It is recommended that students be symptom free at least 24 hours before returning to school.

Please let the school know your child's symptoms, as per the schools call back procedures.

If the school finds it necessary to send your child home because of illness, please make sure you have arranged an emergency contact if you are not available. <u>Inform your school of these arrangements.</u>

**Remember- report cards are simply a snapshot of what your child knows, can do and understands at a certain point in time.


Suggestions for talking to your child about his/her report card:


