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SPRING FUSION

It's safe to say Tupper's arts programs are some of the best in Vancouver, and there's no better place to see them than at the Seasonal Fusions. This year's Spring Fusion was a tour de force of visual arts, drama, music, and dance. Here begins my review.



Before the Show

When my father and I entered the foyer, we were met with a charming atmosphere. A selection of student performers were playing Looking around we saw works by Visual Photography students: and drawings of recipes for their favourite foods, photographs of odd corners of this city, charcoal stencils echoing prominent Indigenous artists, and much more. In the hallway, a Business class selling delightfully was cheap paintings. My father and I bought one for each of us (my dad buying the most expensive one). Once my friend Nate and their band completed a jam session, we headed into the auditorium to wait for the show to begin.

Jazz Band


The student-led Jazz Band consisted of a pianist, drummer, a guitarist, and a bassist. They first played "Nuevas al turas", an original composition by the pianist Hayden Cohen. The piece was a wonderful demonstration of the pianist's knowledge of jazz, with two solos by the pianist and the guitarist. Then, they played a rendition of "Black Nile", a classic jazz standard by Wayne Shortier which was performed snappily and enthusiastically. The band was an excellent way to start the show.



Choir

The choir performed four pieces. They began with a traditional hymn called "Come and Find the Quiet Centre" about how even in this busy life you find peaceful places within yourself. It was soft, slow, ambient, and wistful. The next was an arrangement of "Blackbird" by the Beatles, a personal favourite of mine. It was accompanied by Tomas Schwichtenberg on piano. The arrangement cleverly utilized interplay between different voice ranges to create new textures of sound. After that was a piece by Estonian composer Part Uusberg called "Musika", about the power music has on us. While I could not understand the words, I heard the message quite clearly. Finally, the choir performed a Bulgarian polyphonic chant Dedo" "Ergen traditional a. courtship ceremony. It was bombastic and thrilling, with each syllable coming at you like a flurry of punches. m the}$ choir segment was a wonderful demonstration of the musical range and power of the human voice.





Drama

After the choir, we proceeded with SCT TV, the Drama segment of seasonal Fusions. This year's Fall Fusion was directed by, among others, yours truly, so I know what the process of designing and performing it is like.

The whole show is structured like a television broadcast, as denoted by its name. Two cheesy well-dressed hosts introduced, and lead us out of, each segment.

The first segment was the Red Rover World Championship, where the two teams are quite serious, and the fans are quite rowdy. We were informed that there was a hooliganism incident in the 90s that soured the game's reputation. There were many funny lines, such as (and I'm slightly paraphrasing here):

Reporter: So, what is your plan for this match?

Captain: We're gonna win.

Reporter: ...can you go into any further detail?

Captain: By a lot.

Dance


The final section of the show was Dance, which showcased the numerous dance performers and troupes that operate in our school. Starting us off was Semester 2 Dance with "Sway", a contemporary dance inspired by the ballroom. The lighting was a dark red and the dancers were dressed well, running to and fro across the stage and swaying along with their partners. After that was the award-winning (and I do mean that - it placed 1st at the Footloose competition) hip-hop dance trio performance "Purple", performed and created by Christa, Aliza, and Ahwee. Even though only two performers could make it, you could tell the passion and artistry the performers had for dance.

The Dance Club was next with a medley of R&B songs. While the Dance Club is open to anyone, those that sign up still have lots of talent, which could be easily seen in this bouncing and lively multi-song choreography.

Everything Everywhere all at Once star Ke Hue-Quan received his first academy award (and nomination!) for his performance of Waymond Wang in EEAAO. Hue-Quan started out as a child actor, performing in films such as Indiana Jones and the Goonies. Unfortunately, after starring (with acclaim) in these films opportunities grew fewer. Roles got smaller, and eventually Quan stopped working altogether, until he made his ultimate comeback from EEAAO. I was moved by his emotional and genuine speech - it was heartfelt trials, and his story of tribulations and journey of perseverance in Hollywood was touching. A well-deserved win- and I don't think it was just me who was getting teary eyed.

Everything Everywhere all at Once steals the award show

The film Everything Everywhere all at Once walked away from the show with 7 wins, from its 11 nominations. The film revolves around a middle-aged Chinese immigrant who goes on the ultimate adventure when she learns that she can save the world by jumping into different universes and multiverses, connecting with all the lives she could have led. If you've watched this film, you know how amazing it is - emotionally moving as well as captivating with its action-packed sequences and fun visuals. If the seven awards haven't convinced you to watch it already, take it from me; it is absolutely a film everybody should see.





Brendan Frasers "best actor" win

One of the most memorable moments of the night was Brendan Frasers "best actor" win for his performance as Charlie in Darren Aronofsky's latest film "The Whale." Though I haven't seen the film itself, I was still very happy about Frasers win. He has the ultimate Hollywood comeback story. Fraser starred in an array of hit films in the 80's and 90's, but work began to dry up for the actor and eventually he stepped out of the spotlight. Frasers performance of Charlie was his return to film, his win and gratitude was a moving moment.

Something even more wholesome is that Ke Huy Quan and Brendan Fraser both won an academy award this year, and in 1992 they had both been in a movie, Encino Man (1992) together! Their careers have come full circle from starring in many films in the 90's, to disappearing from the spotlight, then having the ultimate comebacks. I think everyone in the audience and watching from home was rooting for them.

Michelle Yeoh being the first Asian American actress to win best actress

Michelle Yeoh won her first academy award for her performance as Evelyn in EEAAO. Her performance was unforgettable, but the notable moment is the fact that Yeoh is the first Asian American woman to win the academy award for best actress.

In the film industry, representation of women has always been scarce - not to mention even slimmer for women of colour. In all, there has only been three women to win best director: Kathryn Bigelow (The Chloe Locker, 2010). (Nomadland, 2020), and Jane Campion (The Power of the Dog, 2021). In 2002, Halle Berry was the first and only black woman ever to win best actress - the rest have all been white women (excluding Michelle Yeoh). This is an ongoing issue in the film industry: representation of minority groups. However, that topic is a whole other article!

Yeoh's speech was touching, as she stated "Thank you. Thank you. For all the little boys and girls who look like me, watching tonight, this is the beacon of hope and possibilities.



This is proof that dreams, dream big and dreams do come true. And ladies, don't let anybody tell you you are ever past your prime. Never give up."

Michelle Yeoh's win is not only deserved, but also important. As we continue into the 21st century, representation of women, especially POC in film is something that I hope will become more recognized.





Jimmy Kimmel's (mostly civil) hosting & the show as a whole

I was pleasantly surprised by Jimmy Kimmel's hosting of the Oscars, as the program has had a rocky couple of years. Of course, there were some expected jokes about last year's infamous slap, but overall, the show ran smoothly. "Good Riddance" by Gracie Abrams

"Right now" is the closing song on the album. She opens the song with "look at me I feel homesick", which tells you almost exactly what the song is about. Abrams wrote this song on tour for her second EP "This Is What It Feels Like" last spring. This song is the feeling of leaving home and missing the comfort with every fiber of your bones, but you finally feel like yourself.

The last line on the album is "I feel like myself right now", which shows even after grieving the relationship and leaving the comfort of home, healing and change will make you feel whole and like yourself.

"the record" by boygenius



You hit play. Suddenly you hear an a cappella harmonized song (Without You Without Them). It sounds like it was recorded in a stairwell or a church. You feel like you are back with musical theater kids during break on rehearsal day.

Then you hear the dramatic bass drop of "\$20" - a transition that does not go unnoticed - and Julien Bakers soft and raw but harsh voice on vocals.

The album goes on with songs alternating between Phoebe Bridgers, Lucy Dacus, and Julien Bakers voices. Some songs feature mostly one voice while the others are on background vocals and harmonies. Other songs are in the form of duets and trios. Each song is as heart wrenching as the last. Even the "love songs" hold a bittersweetness to them.

When three of the most brilliant song writers of their generation form a super group you expect it to be powerful, but this album exceeds all expectations. The headline of the Rolling Stone album review "The Debut Album From Boygenius Is Even Better Than Everyone Had Hoped". Dacus, Bridgers, and Baker create magic anytime they all are in a room together and this record is not the expection.

The song "Not Strong Enough" stands out to me a lot. The lyric "I don't know why I am/ the way I am" refers to living with a mental illness. Knowing your brain is wired in a way that often makes it hard to do simple task. Like changing clocks set to a different time. "Not strong enough to be your man/ I tried I can't" is the hook of the first chorus. This line elucidates the is the feeling everyone around you is shouldn't waste there time dealing your warped mind. But in the second verse "I tried/ I can't" is replaced with "I lied/ I am just lowering your chorus expectations". Each creating juxtaposition expanding on living mental illness and how often thoughts and feelings can differ quite a lot day to day.

The bridge of this song is simply repeating the phrase "Always as angel/ Never a god." mixing the savoir complex and self-hatred of the song together. Continuing the theme of contrasting emotions co-existing that you hear throughout the whole record.

A lot of this album is actually about Bridgers, Baker, and Dacus' friendship. The track "Lenard Cohen" was written after a car ride back to LA after a writing trip. "On the onramp you said if you love me you will listen to this song" refers to Bridgers playing a six minute song going the wrong way on the highway. Baker and Dacus didn't tell her she was going the wrong way because they could tell the moment was more important than getting lost.

"Lenard Cohen" also features the line "I might like you less now that you know me so well". This line has made me stop and think a lot. I think it's ironic because a few track earlier in "True Blue" Dacus sings, "It feels good to be known so well.". Although these lines seem to cancel each other out I believe they can co-exist. It's hard to hide from yourself when the people around you know exactly what you are thinking and doing. While at the same time being understood is a completely underrated feeling.

Track 11 "Anti Curse" was written after Baker went swimming in the ocean during high tide after Bridgers told her the waves would be too high. "out of my depth at a public beach/ I never listen/ I had to see for myself". The song is about what you think about in those situations were you feel close to death.

I find it very interesting how so many story's told in "the record" simply happened on writing trip. I think there's a "being present in this moment" tone that adds depth and brings the themes and stories together. Reflecting in the moment vs. looking back to older experinces.

The album closer "Letter To An Old Poet" sends full tears streaming down my face. It references "Me and My Dog" from their self-titled debut EP. I think of this song as a part two. The lyric "I wanna be emaciated" turned into "I wanna be happy". It's proof of self-growth and the perfect way to end the album. If you listen to the EP and the record back to back you can clearly see that Bridgers, Dacus, and Baker have grown and changed together but separately.

The last line on the album is "I can't feel it yet, but I am waiting". I think this is refencing the rest of the song being about letting go and being ready to be happy and ready to heal. You are not there yet but being ready is ready.

You can find this album on all streaming platforms. I would highly recommend listening from start to finish. These songs in their specific order tell a story, It was written to be heard from start to finish. There is also transitions between songs that make sense to be heard together. What can I say- the boys are geniuses.

You should also check out "the film" directed by Kristen Stewart that is a short film/music video/album visualizer which you can find on YouTube. Boygenius is also coming to Vancouver on July 28th at the PNE forum. You can find tickets on their website and maybe I'll see you there.

HIDDEN STORIES BEHIND FAMOUS PHOTOS

Afghan girl

Steve McCurry's "Afghan girl" appeared on the cover of National Geographics in 1985, stunning the world with sharp green eyes and a solemn stare. The subject of this famous photo, Sharbat Gula, was said to be 12 at the time, taking refuge in a camp located in Peshawar - on the Afghanistan-Pakistan border. McCurry's intentions were to simply capture the tragedies individuals faced during the Soviet-Afghan war.

Years and years after this photo was published McCurry had set out to find her once again. Gula's identity had remained unknown up until 2002, when she was found after multiple false leads and refugees claiming to be her. She had been found amidst the mountains on the Afghanistan-Pakistan border. In that time a rare moment had occurred in which her photo, now aged, had appeared once again on the front of National Geographics. One of the few people ever featured twice. At the age of 45, Gula was gifted a home by the Afghan government, as well as a \$700 payment per month for medical treatment and living costs.



The vulture and the little girl

Kevin Carter was a photographer, member of the Bang-Bang club - a group of photojournalists that had captured countless murders, famines, and many violent encounters in South Africa. However, this was not only caused by the treatment of black people by white people, there were ethnic groups within regions Africa had also clashed with. Upon witnessing such horrors Carter and his team eventually became emotionally detached and desensitized to it all, often resorting to drugs for solace.

After accepting a new assignment in Sudan - in the midst of a famine - Carter had shot "The vulture and the little girl," which had led to many questions and concerns regarding the little girls' survival. New York Times published an editor's note stating that "She recovered enough to resume her trek after the vulture was chased away." Whether she had made it to the feeding center remains unknown. Upon receiving the Pulitzer prize for this photograph, Carter had ended his life due to the pressure, trauma, guilt and grief he carried throughout his photography career.

THE WILLOW PROJECT

If put in place the Willow Project will cause irreversible damage to the environment.



The Willow Project will release an additional 9.2 million metric tons of cordon pollution into the atmosphere each year. This amount of cardon is roughly equivalent to the pollution that 2 million gas-powered cars on the road will generate. The Willow Project would permanently scare the North Slope of Alaska in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska. This would jeopardize the health and traditional practice of nearby Indigenous communities and harm wildlife habitat of polar bears, migratory birds, and other Alaskan species.

The Biden administration approved the company behind the Willow Project "ConocoPhillips" plans to use "thermosyphons" to freeze the melting permafrost. Refreezing the permafrost will allow a stable ground for the project to sit on and extract fossil fuel from.

Thermosyphons have been in use for decades to protect critical infrastructure in Alaska, including communication towers and the Trans-Alaska pipeline system.

Alaska Environment Research and Policy Center State Director Dyani Chapman said in a statement, "It's absurd that as our tundra is melting because of climate change, ConocoPhillips plans to use 'chillers' to re-freeze tundra so it can drill for oil that will, in turn, make climate change even worse,".

During Biden's 2020 presidential campaign, he vowed to end new oil and gas drilling on public lands and water. This drilling pause was struck down in 2021 by a federal judge, since then the Biden administrative has opened up several areas for new drilling.

The Willow Project is an oil drilling project by ConocoPhillips and would be located on the plain of the North Slope of Alaska. The project was going to include five drilling pads for a total of 250 oil wells. It was approved by the Trump administration in 2020, but when the Biden administration agreed to the project it was reduced to three drill pads.

The Willow Project will industrialize thousands of acres of habitat for animals like threatened polar bears and caribou into a noisy oil field. This project could drive Steller's Eiders sea ducks, Bowhead whales and Southern Beaufort Sea polar bears closer to the brink of extinction.

Alaskan Native groups believe that the will support Willow Project them in receiving funds for health care and education. Alaskan lawmakers say that the project will create jobs, boost domestic energy production, and lessen the country's reliance on foreign oil. But Native groups, city officials, and tribal members that are closer to the site of the Willow Project are deeply concerned about the health and environmental impacts of a major oil development.

Nuiqsut Mayor Rosemary Ahtuangaruak and two other Nuigsut city and tribal officials wrote a letter to Interior Secretary Deb Haaland saying that their village would face the brunt of health and environmental impacts from Willow. "Villages get some financial benefits from oil and gas activity but experience far fewer impacts than Nuigsut," the letter reads "We are at ground zero for the industrialization of the Arctic."





In 2022 the global energy-related carbon dioxide emissions went up by 0.9% from 2021, reaching a new high of more than 36.8 billion tons.

If the Williow Project produces as much oil over thirty years as is expected, the consumption of that oil would release the equivalent of 277 million tons of carbon dioxide into the air.

The Willow Project will cause serious harm to the earth and the people. If you want to help you can find petitions online or you can email your local government official. If you can't do either of these things the best next thing you can do is spread awareness by informing friends and family about the Willow Project.

BLACK SWAN REVIEW

"I just want to be perfect," -Nina
"Perfection is not just about control. It's also about letting go." - Thomas



Black Swan, a film by Darren Aronofsky, is a psychological thriller and emotionally haunting film about a ballerina who strives to be perfect. Since watching this film, I haven't been able to get it out of my thoughts. The film follows Nina, (Natalie Portman) a young, beautiful woman who strives to be an outstanding ballet dancer. Her ballet company is putting on a production of Swan Lake, and Nina gets the part of both the white and black swan. Still living at home, she feels suffocated by her mother (Barbara Hershey) and is trying to navigate that complicated relationship while Lily (Mila Kunis), another talented dancer, is seemingly trying to take Nina's place as the Swan Queen. As time passes, Nina works herself hard, becoming obsessed with the role. She starts losing herself, and nothing is as it seems. In the end, Nina achieves perfection, but at what cost?

Black Swan (2010) was directed by Darren Aronofsky, a well-known and critically acclaimed director. He is known for his psychological thrilling and disturbing films.

A major theme throughout all his work is the terror, and the dark side of the human experience. Some of his movies include Requiem for a Dream (2000), The Fountain (2006), The Wrestler (2008), Noah (2014), Mother! (2017), and The Whale (2022). Darren Aronofsky's work on Black Swan is fantastic. We as the viewer never quite know what is happening with Nina, what is grounded in reality versus what isn't. Aronofsky has succeeded in making a film that is beautiful and terrifying all at once.

I was blown away by the acting in Black Swan. Natalie Portman's performance is phenomenal, she is alluring, and you can feel Nina's every struggle. Portman won an Academy Award for best actress at the 2011 Oscars of her work on this film, which is very well deserved. Lily, played by Mila Kunis, is the main antagonist (at least in Nina's eyes). There is a juxtaposition between these two characters. Nina is timid and unsure, while Lily is everything she isn't: seductive, charming, bold, confident. She is the black swan that the dance director wants Nina to be.

Nina's hatred is rooted in insecurity and jealousy. Thomas (Vincent Cassel) is the manipulative ballet director, and Erica Sayers (Barbara Hershey) is Nina's dark and controlling mother. Winona Ryder plays Beth, a retiring and bitter dancer. In all, the cast is excellent, and the characters well-developed. You could write for hours about analyzing each of them and their significance in the film.

There are so many areas technically where Black Swan flourishes. The screenplay, effects, music, the cinematography, the overall tone. Andrews Heinz, Mark Heyman, and John McLaughlin wrote the screenplay, which showcases the evolution and anatomy of an artist obsessed with their craft. The visual effects are jarring but also terrifying. There is a lot of use of reflection and mirrors, as well as more grotesque effects, like when Nina pulls out a feather from her back (gives me the shivers just thinking about it). Another visual to note is when Nina 'transforms' into the black swan (with wings) in the final act of the film. These visually compelling shots are key to the film and will stay with the viewer. The film score stands out, as the music is hauntingly beautiful.

Crescendos are used affectively, and the soundtrack transports you into the world of ballet. The last thing I wanted to point out was the cinematography. The camerawork really stood out to me. It feels so personal, like you are right there with Nina, living her own personal hell. We are sucked into her psychosis. This is portrayed through lots of movement in the camera (it almost has a mind of its own) spinning, shaking; there is a lack of control. The cinematography displays Nina's drive for perfection and how it consumes her.

In all, Black Swan is a fantastic film. Themes of good vs. evil, the price of perfection, and mental illness explored. Much like one of Shakespeare's tragedy's, Black Swan does not have a happy ending, but provides the audience with a real and raw ending, fully driving down the obsession with being perfect. Strengths lie in the overall tone, acting and technical aspects. I wanted to end by saying that this film had a low budget. Aronofsky and his crew were able to create a brilliant and compelling film, making Black swan a staple in modern cinema today- and one of my new favourites.
























WRITING COMPETIION
