### Chicks in Division 1

Chicks hatched in Division 1 and kindergarten students are writing and drawing about what they see. Early writing, using letter sounds to write the words (invented spelling or sound-out spelling) is the single best way for children to become confident and independent writers and good spellers. I have tried to capture the essence of the texts produced by our youngest writers as they take on the science genre by observing the chicks in their classroom. At the Kindergarten level any sound-letter correspondence – even one letter to represent each word – is a strong step towards becoming a writer. So, (unlike the chicks) our kindies are flying!
