Lodging



The cedar cabins house 10 guests per cabin (9 grade 8 students and 1 leadership student per cabin).

These heated, lighted cabins offer bunk-style beds complete with 2-piece bathrooms and great views of the forest and camp property.

Please be advised that Camp Jubilee does not provide bedding and all guest are responsible for bringing their own bedding (sleeping bag/blankets & pillow), towels and toiletries.

Food

Nut Policy

Our professional catering staff are able to accommodate a number of special diet requests such as vegetarian, vegan, gluten intolerant and celiac. Special diet meals are organized by pre-arrangement at no additional charge.

Although we can accommodate most dietary restrictions, we suggest that those with severe allergies or severe diet restrictions bring their own meals. A guest fridge and microwave is available for your use.

DO NOT BRING NUTS!

This includes: Peanuts, Almonds, Hazelnuts, Cashews etc.

Camp Jubilee has been identified as a "nut managed" camp. We regularly encounter campers/guests who have life threatening allergies to nuts. In an effort to ensure their personal safety during their stay at Camp Jubilee, we prepare and serve meals which are free of nuts and nut products. We also request that all visitors and staff **DO NOT** bring nuts or products containing nuts to camp. Items brought to camp containing either of these will be confiscated and removed.



Activities

A Camp Jubilee staff member will lead all groups in the activities

Voyageur Canoe

A large canoe, which holds up to 15 students while steered by a Camp Jubilee program instructor. Students will be instructed how to safely participate in canoe activities, learn basic paddling skills and explore Indian Arm.

Archery

Students will learn how to correctly hold and fire a bow and arrow. Archery develops coordination and concentration.

Activities

High Ropes

Elements built from cables, logs, and ropes are suspended 30 feet above the ground. They are designed to present a physical and emotional challenge to the participants. Develops confidence while overcoming fears.

Kayaking

Indian Arm is a perfect kayaking location. Each kayaking session will begin with a safety presentation followed by learning basic paddling and exploring Indian Arm. Personal floatation devices will be worn.



Activities

Shelter Building



Students will learn about building an emergency survival shelter. They will have the opportunity to build a shelter for their group. An instructor will give them tips for surviving the elements.

Low Ropes

The low ropes course is a series of separate elements. Each element presents the students with a specific challenge. Students plan and execute as a team in order to reach their goals

Packing

Packing

Pack clothes that are appropriate for all types of weather including rain, sun, or wind. Please bring water shoes (or old shoes that can get wet) as they will get wet when doing kayaking.

Some optional but useful items you may want to include while packing: disposable camera, favourite stuffed animal, book, etc. We also encourage parents to pack old clothes for their children to bring to camp. Please do not send clothes that would not be suitable to wear to school.

If possible, mark your child's name on all items as Camp Jubilee will not be responsible for lost items.

First Aid & Medication

 All staff at Camp Jubilee have Basic First Aid and CPR training and at least one staff member has Occupational First Aid Level 2 or higher. All medication will be placed in a lockable cabinet for your exclusive use.

Access to Emergency Services

- Camp Jubilee provides an emergency boat to Deep Cove as well as a trained operator if a guest/staff requires transport out of camp to visit a walk-in clinic or hospital. Our camp is also coast guard and helicopter reachable. Lions Gate Hospital is the closest medical facility.
- **Please note:** Camp Jubilee staff are not permitted to administer any medication including over the counter drugs such as ASA or cough syrup. Please provide your own medication. Parents should send these items with their child and give school staff written permission to dispense.
