Graduation Requirements – Grades 10, 11, and 12 Courses

Courses and Credits

Required credits 52 credits (13 courses)

Elective credits 28 credits (7 courses minimum)

Total minimum credits to graduate= 80*

*Of the 80 credits (20 courses), at least 16 credits (4 courses) must be Grade12 level (not counting CLC 12), at least 4 credits (1 course) must be an Applied Skills or Fine Arts elective, and at least 4 credits (1 course) must be Indigenous focused.



Graduation Requirements – Provincial Assessments

- 1. Grade 10 Numeracy
- 2. Grade 10 Literacy
- 3. Grade 12 Literacy (F.Y.I. U.B.C. Admissions states that grade 12 students must obtain a minimum mark of 3 Proficient on this assessment to gain admission. Achieving less than that will not necessarily get your offer of admission revoked, but it will be reviewed.)
- 4. Grade 12 French Literacy for French Immersion students only
- -students must attempt all questions on each assessment
- final mark will be either 1 (Emerging), 2 (Developing), 3 (Proficient), or 4 (Extending)
- all marks above are "passing"



Career Life Education (Grade 10) and Career Life Connections/Capstone Project (Grade 12) (grade 8 reference only)

- O 4 credits will be awarded for the successful completion of the CLE course typically completed in grade 10
- O 4 credits will be awarded in total for successful completion of the CLC course and Capstone project typically completed in grade 12
- O Capstone Project a project on a topic you are passionate about may or may not be career related
- O Career Education 8 and 9 which are taught over Microsoft Teams at Van. Tech. prepare students for CLE 10 and CLC 12

INDIGENOUS COURSE GRADUATION REQUIREMENT (grade 8 reference only)

ALL STUDENTS MUST MEET THIS REQUIREMENT BY TAKING **AT LEAST** ONE OF THE FOLLOWING COURSES:

ENGLISH FIRST PEOPLES: LITERARY STUDIES AND WRITING 11 (also fulfills Grade 11 English Language Arts Graduation Requirement, and admission requirement to any post-secondary institution)

B.C. FIRST PEOPLES 12 (also fulfills senior Social Studies Graduation Requirement)

CONTEMPORARY INDIGENOUS STUDIES 12 (also fulfills senior Social Studies Graduation Requirement)

ÉTUDES AUTOCHTONES CONTEMPORAINES 12 (also fulfills senior Social Studies Graduation Requirement and French Immersion Program Requirement)

ENGLISH FIRST PEOPLES 12 (also fulfills Grade 12 English Language Arts Graduation Requirement, and admission requirement to any post-secondary institution)

Colleges (grade 8 reference only)

- Dogwood required (complete grade 12). Douglas can be short by one course.
- Certificate (1 year), diploma (2 years) and sometimes undergraduate degrees (4 years)
- 1st come, 1st serve application (admission requirements for Open Enrolment Programs)
- Competitive or Limited Enrolment programs have different requirements. Please research individual programs.
- For many university-bound students, doing a two-year university-transfer program in a college (then entering university in third year) is a superior path to entering first-year university directly from grade 12.
- * Langara is the largest university transfer college

VSB Career Programs (grade 8 reference only)

(typically completed in grade 12 and applied for in grade 11— see Career Programs page on VSB website — let counsellor know if you'd like an interview with one of the District Career education teachers in grade 10, 11, or 12.

Youth Train in Trades and Dual Credit (partnership between a post-secondary trades program and the VSB) — available for Grade 12 year with successful application — many including Aircraft Maintenance Engineer, Automotive Collision Repair, Automotive Service Technician, Baking & Pastry Arts, Carpentry, Cook Training, Hairdressing, Metal Fabricator, Commercial Painting, Plumbing, Health Care Assistant

School Based Programs – similar to YTT and DC but not affiliated to a post-secondary trades program – CISCO IT, Enhanced Trades, Fashion Design, and Tupper Tech

Youth Work in Trades (Secondary School Apprenticeship) – requires a signed agreement with employer that you must find yourself

Universities (grade 8 reference only)

- Universities all have their individual requirements which vary from program to program. Make sure you look at each university admissions website as requirements change constantly.
- Undergraduate degree (4 year Bachelor's), graduate (Master's or Doctorate), post-graduate programs (Education, Law, Medicine)
- Admission can be competitive. Have a plan B.

Second Language 11 or 12 (for Regular, Flex, or Summit)

- options offered at Van. Tech. are French, Spanish, or Mandarin
- Spanish or Mandarin can begin in grades 9, 10, 11, or 12. (French begins in grade 8.)
- not required for basic graduation, admission to post secondary, or trades training
- still recommended for students who have historically achieved high marks in second language courses and who may apply directly to a first-year University program directly from grade 12.

Challenge Exams/Courses

Delta School District hosts language challenge exams, deadline is end of October – keep an eye out for applications

French, Japanese, Korean, Mandarin, Punjabi, Persian, and Spanish – grade 11 and 12 final exams offered.

(the following is for grade 8 reference only—may change by 2029)

SFU - Accepts challenge courses for admission average calculation which means it can be one of the approved Gr. 11 or 12 courses on their lists.

UBC- Cannot be used as one of the approved grade 11 or 12 courses in the calculation of admission average.

Online Courses

Not all post-secondary schools accept all online courses or providers, and some have policies about how close to completion courses must be in order to be used for an admission average.

Online learning has a high sign-up rate but a low completion rate. Students with a minimum B (Proficient) average in all academic courses and with a solid record of independent, unsupervised homework completion stand a better chance of success.

For most students, we recommend taking courses—especially graduation requirements—at school for the most supportive, meaningful and engaging experience.

Half-Semester Electives

*Courses denoted with an asterisk are half-semester courses (similiar to the Art/Drama rotation in grade 8).

*If students choose one of these, they must choose any other asterisked course to pair with it in a period, and which they will take in the other half of the semester.

Electives listed with no asterisk are full-semester courses, so they stand alone in the period and are paired with no other course.

Elective Options – Modern Languages

French 9 — a second year course — requires passing French 8 (ex-French Immersion students in a higher grade of French may take the next French course up next year as long as they pass their current French course.)

Spanish 9 – a first year course

Mandarin 9 – a first year course



MASIA12

LS12 focuses on countries in East, South, and Southeast Asia through the lenses of human and physical geography, history, economics, and political science, to aid in the understanding of the diverse cultures and regions within. The self-motivated learner will examine various conflicts and movements that have helped shape Asian identities through the 19th to 21st centuries, as well as topics such as industrialization, colonialism, imperialism, urbanization, migration patterns, and environmental issues, with field study opportunities to Chinatown and the Dr. Sun Yat Sen Gardens, the Nikkei National Museum and Cultural Centre, as well as a cultural potluck lunch to supplement the course.



BC First Peoples 12

MBCFP12

BC First Peoples 12 is open to all Grade 11 and 12 students. This course examines the history and culture of BC's aboriginal peoples from before the arrival of Europeans to the present day. The course also explores the continuing impact of colonialism, institutional racism, and ethnocentrism, and how First Nations peoples have resisted and adapted to a changing environment. Aboriginal cultural expressions of art, literature and film are another area that will be explored in-depth. *This course will be offered in alternate years starting 2021/2022*.
