We hope that last week's informal learning update conferences provided meaningful opportunities for families and teachers to engage in productive conversations. These meetings are designed to answer two key questions: "Where is my child currently in their learning?" and "Where are they headed this year?" Many teachers approach these conferences through a goal-setting lens, and we hope that students—especially our older and more independent learners—were active participants in these discussions. After all, these conversations center on their learning, their goals, and their growth. Student voice and agency are essential components of our educational approach.

We deeply value the partnership between home and school in supporting each child's learning journey. If you have any questions or concerns throughout the year, we encourage you to reach out directly to your child's classroom teacher. Looking ahead, our first formal learning update (formerly known as report cards) will be sent home on **Wednesday, December 17th**, just prior to the winter break. This timing allows families to review the report and connect with teachers if needed before the holidays begin.

As we settle into October, we have begun our annual safety drills, which include fire, earthquake, hold and secure, and lockdown procedures. These drills are a vital part of our commitment to student safety. Teachers and administrators ensure students are well-prepared and understand the importance of remaining calm and following instructions during these exercises.

As the seasons change, we hope all our LEB students and families are staying warm and well.

#### **Halloween Reminders for Families**

As Halloween approaches, we'd like to share a few important reminders regarding costumes and treats at school.

We understand that some of our LEB students enjoy dressing up for Halloween, while others may choose not to participate—and both choices are respected. Costumes are entirely optional.

To help ensure a safe and inclusive environment for all students, please note the following guidelines:

- **No props, weapons, or masks** should be brought to school. These items can be easily misplaced or misused, and masks may pose safety concerns, especially for younger students who may find them frightening or have difficulty seeing through them.
- Costumes should be culturally respectful and appropriate. We encourage families
  to consider how costumes may be perceived by others and to avoid cultural
  stereotypes.
- After trick-or-treating, we kindly ask that Halloween treats remain at home. Excessive sugar consumption can make it difficult for students to focus and engage in learning.

#### Counsellor's Corner – Laura Robertson

Hello L'École Bilingue Families,

I hope you are all settling well into the routines of fall, and finding ways to find balance and manage stress in these busy times. I wanted to share some resources and ideas around helping your child develop growth mindset.

A growth mindset is the knowledge that we can get better at something through effort, practice, and learning from mistakes. It means understanding that our abilities aren't fixed—they can grow over time. For example, instead of saying "I'm just not good at math," a child with a growth mindset might say, "I'm still learning math, and I'll get better if I keep trying." Even the simple use of the word "yet" can help shift a child's thinking. Instead of saying, "I'm not good at skateboarding," they can say "I'm not good at skateboarding yet."

Here are some tips to help foster growth mindset in your children:

#### Growth Mindset and the Power of "Yet"

- 1. Praise Effort, Not Just Results
  - Instead of saying "You're so smart," try: "I'm proud of how hard you worked on that."
- 2. Normalize Mistakes as Part of Learning
  - Talk openly about mistakes and what they teach us.
  - "What did you learn from that?" or "Mistakes help our brains grow."
- 3. Model Growth Mindset Language
  - Use phrases like:
    - "I haven't figured this out yet."
    - "This is hard, but I can keep trying."
    - "Let's find a new strategy."
