
Lester Pearson, Mother Teresa, Martin Luther King, Nelson Mandela, the Dalai Lama and Malala. What do these people all have in common? They are all winners of the Nobel Peace Prize. They won the Nobel Peace Prize for helping the poor, for looking after the planet, for making a stand against injustice and for helping to STOP wars and negotiate peace treaties. If those people were out on our playground today, they would be solving problems peacefully and helping others to get along.

On Remembrance Day we remember those who died fighting in the World Wars and all the people who have ever died in wars. On November 10<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 am Dickens had its first ever Virtual Remembrance Day ceremony. Shelley Sunner, our VP, set up an online presentation which included a recording of O Canada, a Moment of Silence, and Taps and Reveille on the trumpet. Different classes presented art, poetry, historical reports on the Japanese Interment and the White Peace Poppies, and I shared the thoughts above. Shelley created a link to share the assembly with the Dickens community which was sent out afterwards.

This is a perfect time to consider our **Code of Conduct** at Dickens. Teachers have been reviewing it with their classes and I will be sending it home via email for parents to go over with their children. Our Code of Conduct is updated annually. It is a guide to establishing a safe, supportive learning environment. Students at Dickens are encouraged to take care of each other, take care of themselves and to take care of the school. Cooperation, Safety and Respect are the guiding words. The Code of Conduct outlines our school-wide expectations as well as the process for supporting positive behaviour. Dickens staff are here to help students learn strategies to make good choices when they have conflicts on the playground. I have been very impressed with the way students who need some adult help in sorting things out have taken ownership of their role in a situation and can list strategies to do things differently on a future occasion. Thanks for your help with this at home.

I'm sure you are aware of Antiracism in the media of late. All VSB Codes of Conduct have the statement: "Racism will not be tolerated in our school." On November 27<sup>th</sup> we attended a virtual Indigenous Focus Day titled 'Unmasking Racism Within Schools'. There were excellent keynote speakers Carolyn Roberts from SFU and Joe Truss from California. Our Primary and Intermediate staff had rich and powerful morning and afternoon discussions on TEAMS as we reflected on the presentations. At a time when COVID has taken over most of our school conversations it was refreshing to challenge ourselves to think about our personal biases, to reflect on the effects of colonization, to discuss how we can teach tolerance and empathy, and to honour Indigenous history and ways of learning through authentic sources.

Breathe in the cold scary breeze in the night.


Breathe out the warm beams of the sun shining down onto your face.

#### COMMUNICATING STUDENT LEARNING – THE NEW REPORT CARD

In BC there are a minimum of 5 communications to parents about student learning required each year:

- 2 written Report cards January 29th and June 29th
- 3 informal, ongoing, throughout year Fall and Spring Conferences
- Plus an additional communication or event such as calls, meetings, demonstrations of learning, interim reports, portfolios, digital communication (i.e., myBlueprint), etc.
- Each communication should include:
  - What is going well (Where am I now?) i.e STUDENT STRENGTHS
  - What is an area for growth/improvement (Where am I going?) i.e. AREAS FOR GROWTH
  - What is the plan for supporting that goal (What do I need to get there?) i.e. WAYS TO SUPPORT LEARNING

Reporting practices are changing to reflect the Redesigned Curriculum. It is focussed on *doing* rather than *knowing* and on *learning* rather than being *achievement based*. The learning process involves teachers creating rich learning tasks based on BC Curricular Competencies and student interests. Students work with teachers to set criteria. Powerful questioning and learning conversations allow for ongoing, timely descriptive feedback to the student. Metacognitive skills are developed through student reflection and self-assessment. Learning can be process, inquiry and project based.

There are no letter grades; instead the statements below are used. In fact, the Redesigned Curriculum is similar to the way Dickens' teachers have always taught and the new report card is similar to the traditional Dickens report cards. This year all VSB schools are using a new reporting tool to write their reports. There will be opening comments, student strengths, and areas for growth as well as ways to support learning. Students will be evaluated as:

- Beginning
- Developing
- Applying
- Extending their knowledge in each subject area.

The first report card will be sent home on January 29, 2021. They will report on: English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Arts Education, Core French (grades 5 – 7), and Physical and Health Education. Applied Design, Skills and Technology and Career Education will be reported on for Grade 6 and 7 students this term. Our teachers are already learning how to use the new online reporting tool. We are all life-long learners at Dickens!



## **Guiding Principles of Assessment**



#### Relational

Quality assessment is built on trusting, respectful relationships between student and teacher that create a culture where learning is the central purpose and shared goal.



#### Equitable & Inclusive

Quality assessment is equitable and differentiated to meet and include student's' diverse needs, interests, and learning goals.



#### **Clear & Transparent**

Quality assessment gives direction and sense of purpose to students through providing them with clearly articulated learning intentions and established and/or co-created success criteria that is understood by the students and aligned with essential curricular concepts and content and to the core competencies and learning standards.



#### Student-Centred



Quality assessment enables students to engage in and advocate for their learning through metacognitive strategies including self- and peer-assessment, self-reflection, personal goal-setting, co-construction of growth/success criteria, student voice and choice in what and how they learn.

#### Intentional



Quality assessment is planned intentionally and involves a thoughtful and purposeful use of formative and summative assessment approaches over a variety of assessments.

#### Flexible, Responsive, Reflective



Quality assessment is flexible, with teachers and students gathering and responding to evidence of student learning over time through meaningful questioning and descriptive feedback.

#### KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION REMINDER

A reminder that all kindergarten applicants are required to submit an application to their English catchment elementary school. This includes families who wish to apply for District programs (Early French Immersion, Montessori, Indigenous Focus School, Early Mandarin Bilingual, Nootka Fine Arts) and/or a cross boundary placement.

The priority registration period for kindergarten opens on **November 1 and closes at 4 pm on January 29**. Students who submit an application within this priority period will be accommodated <u>before</u> late applicants.

Charles Dickens Elementary School and Charles Dickens Annex share one common catchment area. Students who reside within this catchment area (in-catchment registrants) will receive priority for enrolment at one of the two school sites based upon available space.

When completing a registration form, parents will be asked if they prefer the annex or the main school. The District will attempt to accommodate parental preferences for placement, once available space has been determined.
