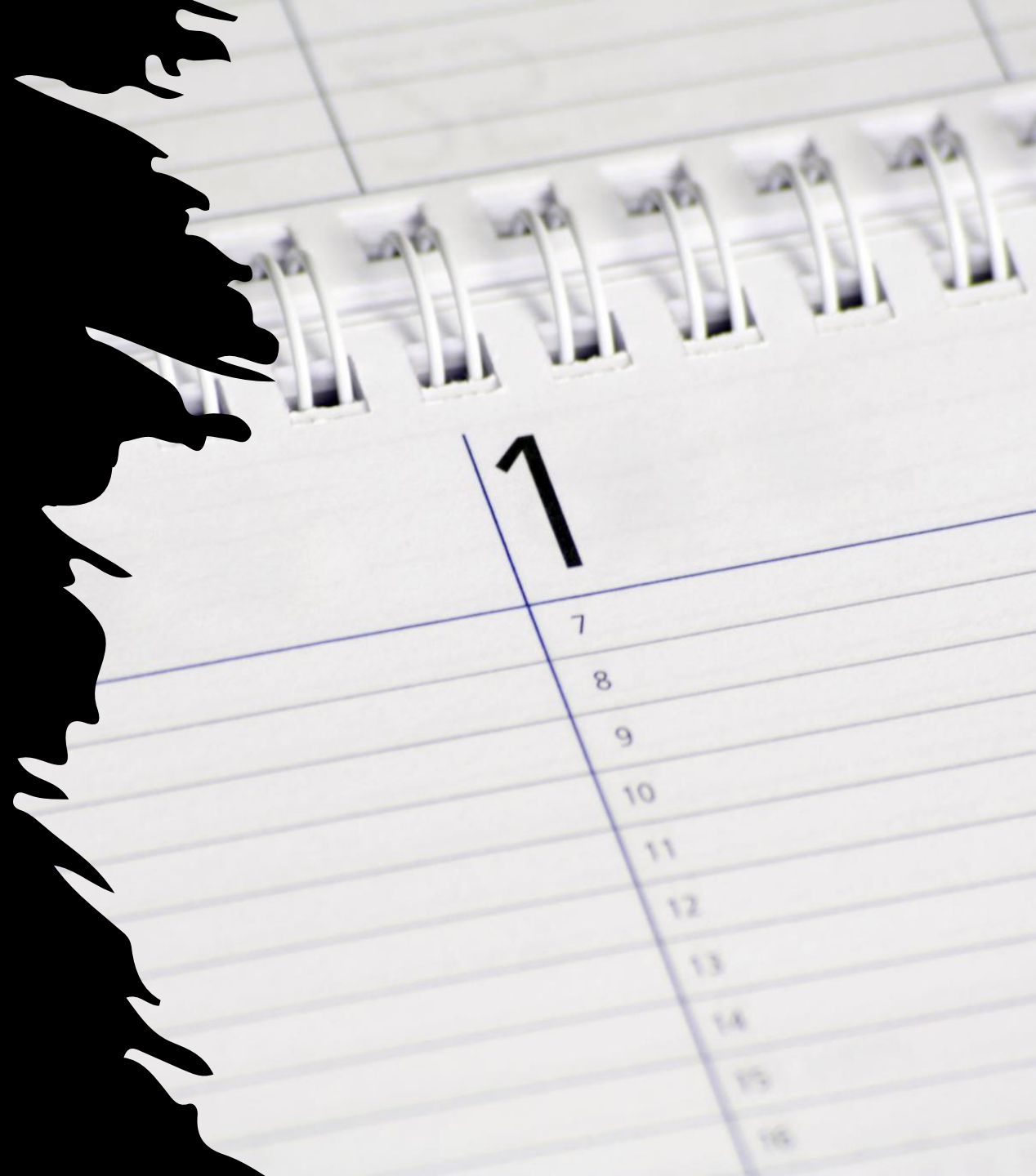

Course Selection Requirements for Students entering Grade 11

- **Eight (8) courses** will be selected for next year
 - a minimum of 7 on timetable at PG + 1 off-timetable and/or 1 online, for a total of 8 or more courses.
- Generally, students will have:
 - 4 core courses (Math, English, Science, Social Studies 12)
 - Optional- 1 Second Language or Learning Hub or ELL courses
 - 3-4 other Elective (note: this may vary)
- Students will enter course requests on-line, submit a signed (*student and parent*) Course Planning form to us by **Tuesday, February 17, 2026**

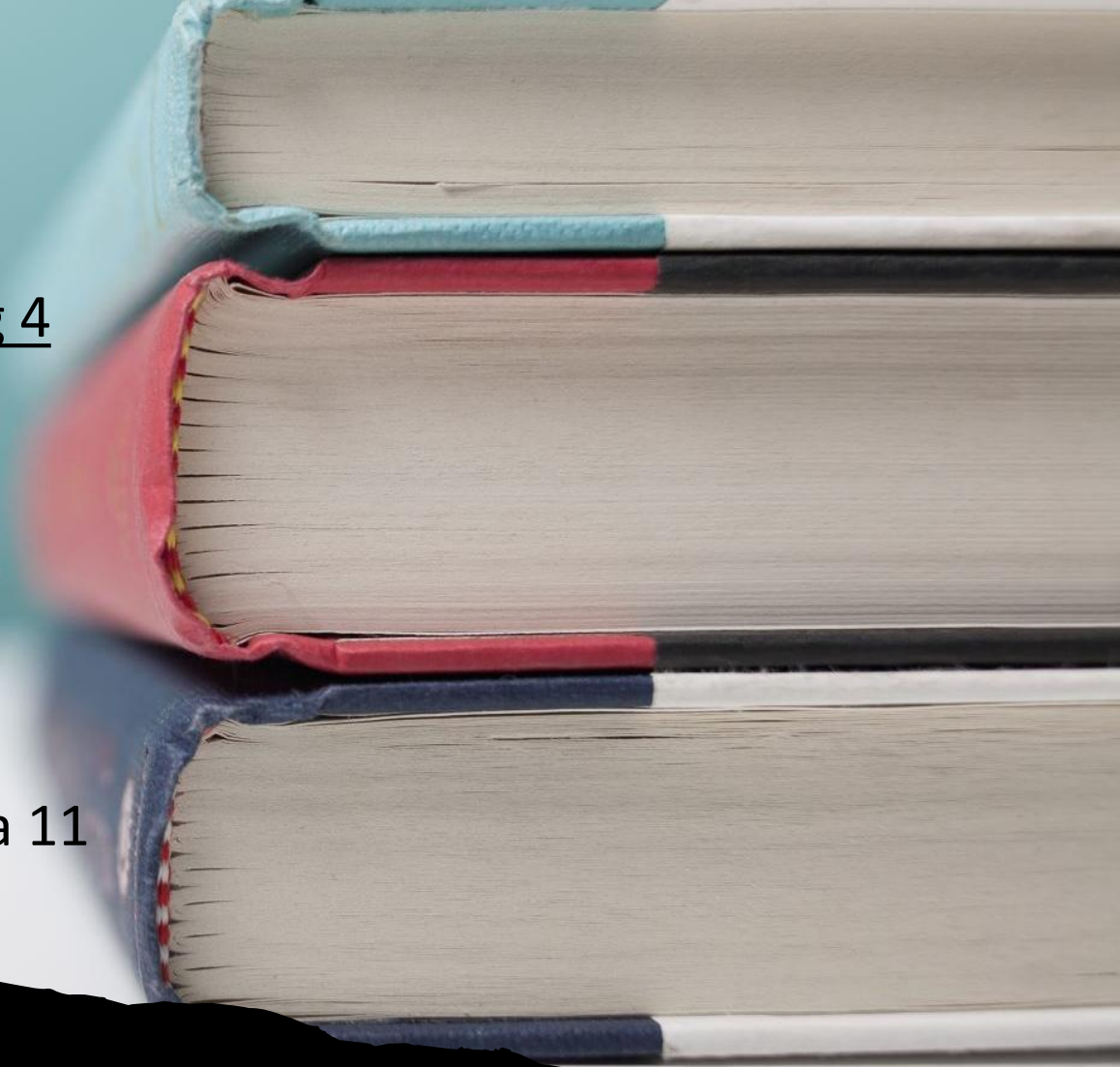

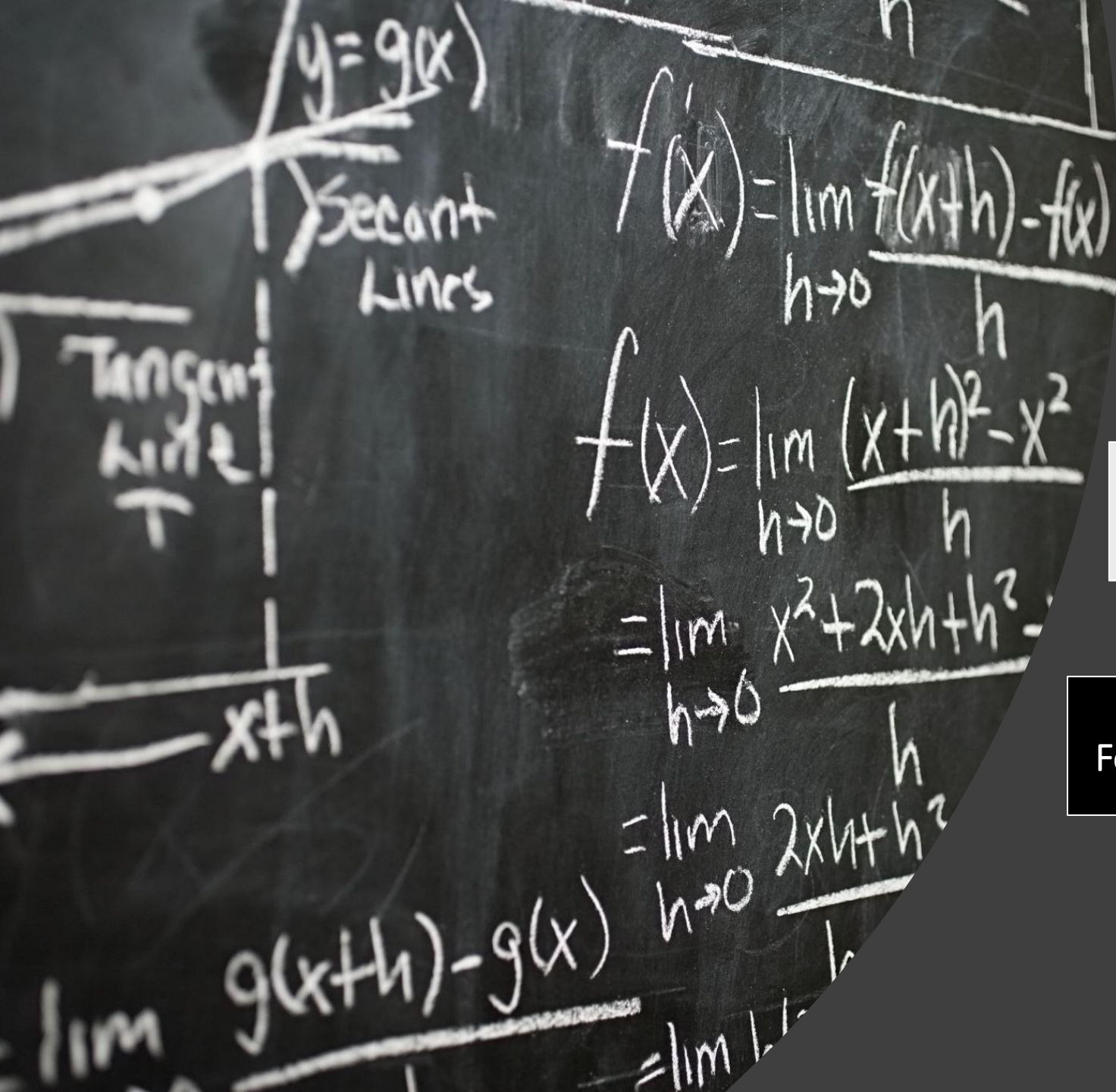
Grade 11 English Options

Pick 1 Language Arts 11 course from the following 4 options:

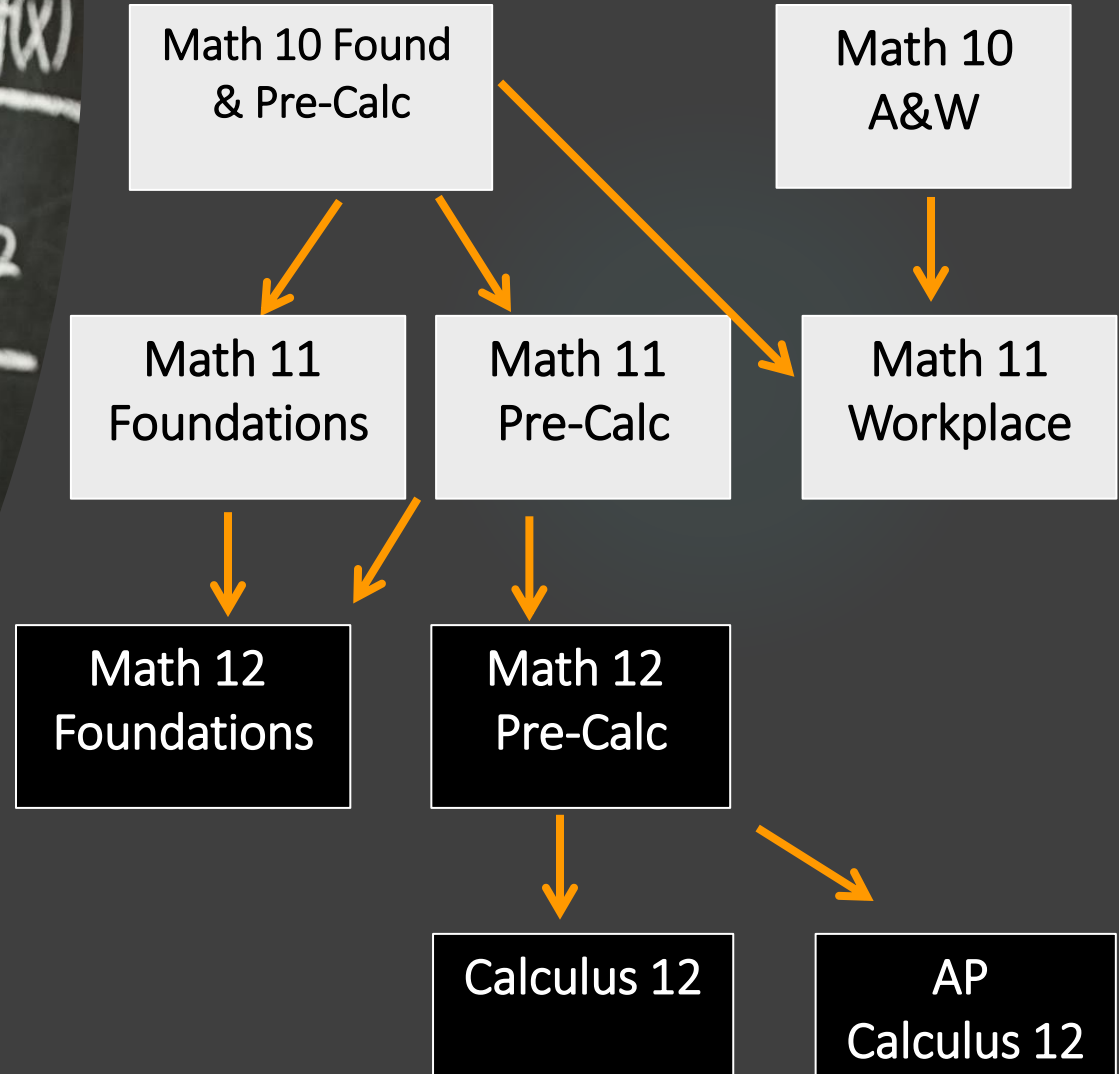
- Literary Studies 11

All courses satisfy the Language Arts 11 requirement and teach reading, writing and speaking skills. The main difference is the content being used to teach these skills.

Numeracy & Literacy Assessments

- All students must complete the numeracy 10 and literacy 10 assessments before graduation.
- They will not count towards your GPA.
- Another grade 10 numeracy write will be this year in April. If you did not write it in January, please see me.

Second Language Requirement

- A second language is not required for graduation
- It is no longer required for admission to Canadian universities

Humanities Programs – Some PSIs may recommend Language 11 or Language 12 (UBC). Not taking it does not impact admissibility but may require taking an additional language course at the university.

Requesting Grade 12 Courses



Some Gr. 11 students will request Gr. 12 academic courses during the Gr 11 year which we try to accommodate as a school.



When seats become limited, priority will be given to Gr. 12 students to be in those classes.



Making your requests early does help with our planning in determining the number of seats we need to provide, but it is not a guarantee that your request will be met.

***Possibility to take 2 math classes next year if needed, speak with us**

Work in Trades Program

Regardless of your career aspirations...

if you have/get a paying job in a trade you can receive credits toward high school graduation:

- 120 hrs working = 4 credits (up to 16 credits)
- 900+ hrs worked (before age of 20) could qualify student for a \$1,000 award... gave out 30+ scholarships last year
- if you later pursue that trade career, **those hours count towards certification**

Post-Secondary -Grade 11 Marks

Grade 11 academic course work can factor into admissions decisions universities in different ways depending on the school and program you are considering which is why it's important to do your research. Please consider the following:

- * Some PSI's will consider core Gr. 11 course marks as **general entry requirements** (eg: English 11, Pre-calculus 11) though they carry less weight than Gr. 12 required academic courses (eg: UBC, SFU, UVIC)
- * **Gr. 11 marks may be considered if a required Gr. 12 course mark is unavailable** (i.e. to be taken in Semester 2 of Gr. 12), the PSI may look at the mark you earned in the equivalent Gr. 11 course (eg: U of T)
- * An **overall average of Gr. 11 and 12 courses** is used, minus P.H.E. courses and the lowest mark among all others. Gr. 12 marks in the same subject area can be weighted more heavily (eg: UBC).

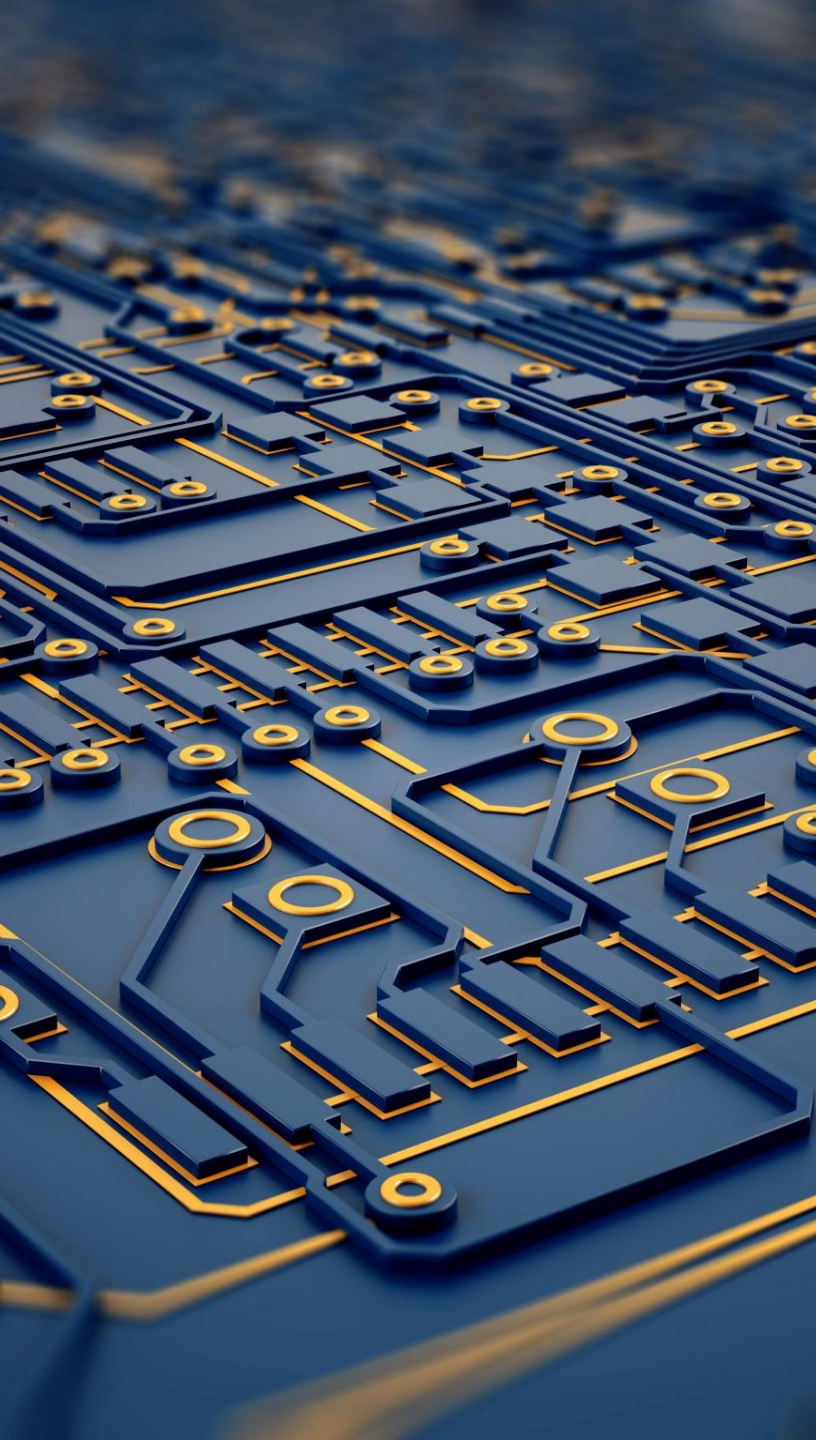
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University Planning

Science Degree Programs

Usually requires Chemistry 11, Physics 11, Pre-Calculus 11 & 12 and two Science 12 courses.

Engineering Programs

Usually requires Chemistry 11 & 12, Physics 11 & 12, Pre-Calculus 11 & 12, Calculus 12 recommended

Business Degree Programs

Usually require Pre-Calculus 11 & 12 + supplemental application materials. Some universities have minimum averages set in English and Pre-Calculus 12, Calculus 12 recommended

Ontario Universities

For Science, Engineering and Business programs, Calculus 12 is often required.



University Planning Cont.

Broad Based Admissions

This refers to additional considerations, beyond marks, that are taken into account for admission decisions. Here are some examples:

Fine Arts Programs — usually include a portfolio, audition or written submissions.

Business Degree Programs — often require information about leadership, volunteering, community work, references, and may have a video submission or video interview.

UBC — for all programs, students are required to complete the Personal Profile and to provide references.

SFU: Admission Details

- **Grade 11 Requirements:**
- They list “no specific grade 11 requirements” **BUT** Math 11/Math 12 (minimum 60%), English 11/12 (min of 70%), Admission is based on an evaluation of all approved academic Grade 11 and 12 courses, including any specific course requirements set by the faculty or program to which you are applying. *certain grade 11 courses are needed to prepare for the grade 12 level
- **Grade 12 Requirements:**
- Minimum final grade of 70% in English Studies 12
- Minimum of 5 Grade 12 courses from SFU’s approved course list (including English Studies 12).
- Two lists of approved grade 11 and grade 12 courses for each program/faculty:
- **Minimum of 5 approved grade 12 courses (including program-specific requirements)**
- Note: Very important to program specific required courses



UBC: Admission Details

- Breadth: UBC will look at your grades in nearly ALL your academic Gr.11 and Gr.12. They will drop your lowest Gr.11 or Gr.12 course so it is safe to experiment.
- Depth: UBC will look at “rigour” of course work and overall course load to ensure suitability and preparedness. They will pay particular attention to courses related to what you want to study. If you have the course at both the Gr.11 and Gr.12 level, more emphasis will be placed on the Gr.12 grade.
- Relevancy: Pre-requisites and program requirements are not changing. You do not have to take different or more courses than in the past. Take courses in secondary school that are related to what you want to study at UBC. Doing so will increase your chances of admission.
- Individual Context: Looking at student engagement, accomplishments, and personal circumstance through the Personal Profile. They want to hear the student’s genuine voice and are looking for substance.



UBC has expanded the ways in which they consider students for admission. When considering a prospective applicant, they consider the following:

- Overall Average calculated on marks from all courses in Grades 11 and 12 (excluding PE, Applied Skills, Skills, Community Service, CLC 12). Note: a maximum of 2 fine or performing arts courses can be included each year.
- Core average: calculated on relevant program related courses taken in grades 11 and 12. Note: this will always include English 11 and 12.
- Depth: Taking a challenging course, even if not required, or if marks are not exceptional, is recognized.
- Breadth: Taking diverse courses in different subject areas, even if marks are not exceptional, is recognized.
- Having the highest grades is not the only way to get in – challenging yourself or taking a well-rounded course load can also be beneficial. The Personal Profile can also tip the balance.

Associate Degrees & University Transfer Programs

- Take university courses transferable to other institutions in B.C. and beyond.
- Complete 1 or 2 years of university studies, then apply to continue elsewhere.
- Explore subjects and identify areas of interest and strength.
- This is a great first choice or back-up and there are several advantages compared to universities (transition, class size, instruction, cost, etc.).

Admissions:

Open Enrolment –Apply for these programs and you're in. Apply earlier to get the courses you need and want.

Limited Enrolment –Entry into these programs may be competitive or at least limited by the date of your application because they will fill.

Post-Secondary Planning: American Schools

Admission to many American colleges/universities can be very competitive, and they will consider a broad range of factors such as:

- Course Marks – they often look at your entire school record from Gr. 9 – 12.
- Standardized Assessments –usually require scores from SAT or ACT examinations.
- AP Examinations – AP exams -standardized assessments that allow institutions to compare applicants.
- Broad-based Factors –they want to know about your leadership and volunteer work, community involvement and activities at school.
- References – these provide information regarding performance, character and extra curricular activities. Reference usually completed by the counsellor and one subject teacher of your choosing.

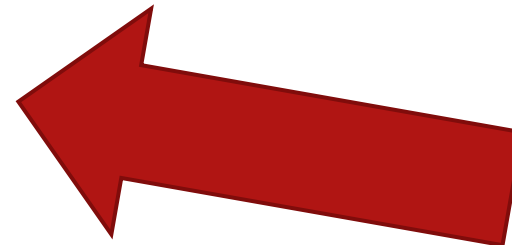

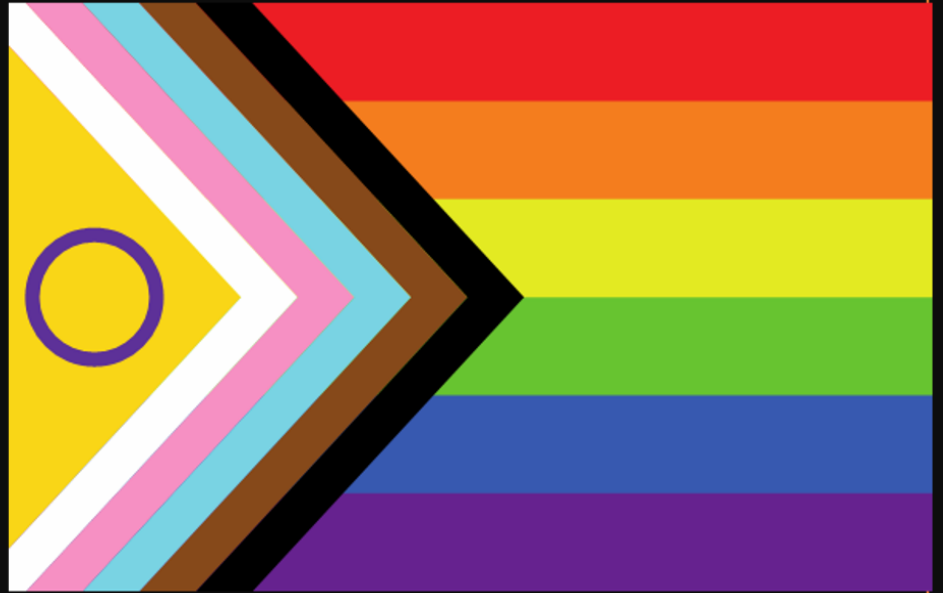

- Course Planning requests submitted into MyEd, and the Course Planning Form -signed and returned to counsellor by February 17, 2026
- Counsellor and discussions with students as needed February to April
- Student schedules randomly built based upon course requests May to June
- Timetabling conflicts resolved from June through to September
- Making changes to courses selected will be limited, and if requested late, may not be possible due to course conflicts or courses being full.



Course Changes

- Course changes will be considered in the spring
- We may not be able to accommodate course changes, please do your research and pick your courses wisely
- In September, course changes will be available on Teams as in past years but will be more challenging at this time
