J.O. SCHOLARSHIP TIPS

Get Organized.

- Make a list of scholarships you plan to apply for (* NOTE DEADLINES)
- Consider using a calendar/graphic organizer to help you visualize and plan your time-management for scholarship applications while making note of the scholarship deadlines.
 - This is helpful as scholarship opportunities are available year-round!

Apply Early.

- Do not wait until the last minute to apply! O Remember: Scholarships are competitive! You want to give yourself lots of time to prepare an excellent application
 - Many external organizations short-list applications as they come in.
 - Note that scholarships that require you to physically mail in your application will require an extra 3-5 business days for your application to arrive, so factor in the possibility of postal delays
 - Scholarship deadlines are firm! O Submitting your application even a minute late can disqualify you
 - o Remember: Scholarships are awarded to outstanding students who demonstrate that they are capable and responsible. (Submitting a late application reflects poorly on you)

Read the instructions and eligibility carefully.

- Different scholarships will have different eligibility requirements.
 - Read and understand the instructions before you begin your application

Proofread your application before you submit.

- Again, scholarships are competitive! Spelling and grammar are important!
- Double check to ensure that you have included all the necessary information and any additional documentation that is required (i.e. reference letters, academic resume, etc.) O Your ability to follow instructions for the scholarship is important!



Start building connections.

- If you haven't already done so, you need to start making and building connections with teachers, supervisors, employers, etc. who can act as a reference for some of your scholarship applications.
 - This is your responsibility. No one can make/build these connections for you so get going on this ASAP! Do not put this off until the last minute because relationships take time.
- References (Also see Reference Letter Etiquette Guide in MS Teams Scholarship Channel) o The rule of thumb is to ask individuals who know you well and who have known you for an extended period
 - o Some scholarships may ask for a reference from particular people, so check the requirements o Recent references are always better (i.e. asking your Gr.11 teacher for reference will be better than asking your Gr. 3 teacher)
 - Don't make the selection committee question why your letter is several years old and out of context for what you are applying for.

Apply, apply, apply!

- There is no limit to the number of external scholarships you can apply for.
- Applying to lots of scholarships gives you a better chance of winning a scholarship (and many external scholarships are not given out each year ... so look around for them)

"You can't win if you don't apply"
