National Indigenous Peoples Day Celebration

On June 21st, National Indigenous Peoples Day in Canada, Strathcona had a school-wide assembly in the courtyard "to recognize and celebrate the unique heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding contributions of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples." Robin Roberts, our school's Indigenous Education Teacher, greeted the school with a Land Acknowledgement to recognize the xwməθkwəyəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), and səlilwətał (Tsleil-Waututh) Nations.

To help us celebrate and bring awareness to Indigenous cultures in BC and across Canada, Strathcona invited the Sayget Kuluumgot Dancers (pronounced: Sight Guluumgot) to perform for our school. Sayget Kuluumgot translates to People of One Heart in Sm'algyax, the language the Ts'msyen speak.

Led by Laura Rudland, a retired Vancouver School Board teacher, the dance group honoured our Grade 7's as they are transitioning to Grade 8 for their next stage of life, and our Kindergarten students as they are the future leaders of our school.



The Ts'msyen have four main clan crests. Every Ts'msyen person would belong to one of those crests. These crests are: Laxsgiik (the Eagle Clan), Ganhada (the Raven Clan), Gispwudwada (the Killer Whale Clan), and Laxgibuu (the Wolf Clan). Rudland separated the assembly of students into four quadrants and gave them a crest animal they'd have to dance. The Laxsgiik would soar with their arms spread out wide. The Ganhada danced with their arms to the sides of the back and dancing their fingers like feathers like how a Raven would hop. The Gispwudwada danced with their side fins (arms) making a diving motion into the water and then separating their arms as they came out of the water and making a gesture that looked like they were shooting water out of a Killer Whale blow hole. The Laxgibuu danced with one arm bent in front of the face to show their wolf snouts, with the other arm behind them as their tail, and they would alternate arms every third beat.

The Sayget Kuluumgot Dancers then performed a leaving song as they exited the crowd. Donna Lokhorst, Indigenous Education Worker, introduced two former Strathcona students, Vanaya Jobin and MJ Lavallee, to lead our school in PowWow dance performances. For their first song, they

danced for the school. In the second song, they invited students who wanted to try dancing up to the dance area. More than half of the school got up to try PowWow dancing!



To end our day, our Indigenous Team ordered Bannock from The Bannock Queen, Teresa Mark, for the whole school. The Bannock was separated for each classroom by class composition and every student in attendance got to have some Bannock. It was an amazing day!

A special thank you to our school's PAC for this year's support of Indigenous Education and projects, and a big thank you to Krista Sigurdson for supporting National Indigenous Peoples Day by applying to a grant to help us pay for our event. Without that help, we wouldn't be able to invite our performers to celebrate the day.

Weaving Project

Learners from our school participated in a weaving project over the past few months.

We learned from Robin Roberts and Donna Lokhorst. First, they taught us how to work with cedar bark, and we made cedar rope bracelets. Then it transformed into complete weaving.

We appreciated Robin and Donna's patience with all the students who participated in this weaving project.

Strathcona Pride Parade

This June was Strathcona's first ever pride parade! This was an excellent learning opportunity for every grade and for families in our community.

Some learning benefits in preparation:

- Visual Arts Colour theory, design choices
- For 3D floats, physics, tool knowledge, and constructions come into play
- Social Studies: Learning about pride history and human rights
- Social Emotional Learning: empathy for others, identity, building connection to school and community for self and others
- Communication: What is the message we want to convey? If the message doesn't align with my world view, how can I help others express themselves?

This was a whole-school initiative to tackle an intersectional barrier for our students. Being a queer, trans, of 2 spirited person can be very isolating, particularly when compounded with other facets of identity such as disability and race. By showing up for our queer, trans, and 2 Spirited students we are showing them that we celebrate and protect who they are. Time spent worrying about acceptance, identity, and safety can then be shifted to focussing on their learning and friendships. We are taking to the streets to show we are here for each other!
