COMMUNICATING STUDENT LEARNING PILOT PROJECT YEAR 2

REPORTING ALIGNED WITH THE NEW CURRICULUM

Many Vancouver Public Schools, along with schools throughout British Columbia, have been moving from a model of 'reporting to parents' on a regular and pre-determined schedule to 'communicating student learning with parents' on an on-going basis throughout the school year.

Last year, the teaching staff at Laurier participated in a Vancouver School District pilot project designed to align reporting practices with the redesigned BC curriculum. This resulted in three significant changes to reporting in your child's class, as described below. We are pleased to participate in the Year 2 of this pilot project along with many schools in Vancouver.

1. A shift from primarily focussing on summative assessment to a primarily focussing on formative assessment

These changes in communicating with parents are part of the redesigned BC Curriculum. Based on current assessment research, ongoing personal feedback which is embedded in daily instruction, along with examples of student work are more beneficial in supporting student learning than simply reporting on student results. Thus, the shift in practice. The communication of student learning to parents is based on clear standards and expectations and is intended to make learning visible. Students are encouraged to think of the questions:

- Where am I now?
- Where am I going?
- What do I need to do to get there?

2. 5 required communications with parents within a calendar year:

- a minimum of three ongoing communications of student learning throughout the school year
- one written progress report at the end of January
- one written summative report at the end of June

A. Ongoing Communication with Parents (a minimum of three times a year, timing at the teacher's discretion)

- based on authentic evidence of student learning from a variety of sources (examples of student work, photographs, audio, video, portfolios)
- based on clear standards and expectations with the intention of making learning visible
- can occur in different ways (three-way conferences, electronic portfolio reviews, parent-teacher meetings, reflections on student work, Fresh Grade or other on-line platforms, telephone conversations, interim written reports)
- B. Written Progress Reports end of January and end of June
 - a written progress report will be sent to parents by the end of January. This report will indicate where the child is in relation to the age/grade expectations at the mid-year point
 - a written summative report will be sent to parents by the end of June. This report will indicate where the child is in relation to the age/grade expectations and a student self-assessment of the Core Competencies (Communication, Thinking and Personal and Social)
 - where applicable, a summary of the progress toward the goals in the child's Individual Education Plan (IEP) will be provided
 - letter grades will not be included on the written reports
 - All 5 communications with parents can include:
 - descriptive information about the child's learning
 - the learning goals the child is working towards
 - ways to further support the child's learning at school and at home
 - the child's contributions to the classroom, school and community
 - how the child interacts with others

3. Student Self-Assessment of the Core Competencies with the written summative report in June

• began June 2017

By participating in this process, students are provided with meaningful information about their learning so that they can monitor their progress towards the learning goals they have set. Parents are involved as partners in a dialogue about their child's progress and the best ways to support and improve learning.

The staff at Laurier look forward to working with you as we continue to focus on your child's learning.

Kindergarten registration for children born in 2014 begins on November 1st.

All Kindergarten applicants are required to submit an application to their English catchment elementary school. This includes families who wish to apply for choice programs (French Immersion, Montessori, etc.) and/or a cross boundary placement.

The priority registration period for Kindergarten opens on **Thursday November 1st and closes at 4 pm on Thursday January 31st**. Students who submit an application within this priority period will be accommodated <u>before</u> late applicants.

Applying for Kindergarten is a <u>2-Step process</u>: <u>Step 1</u>: Completion of an online application form. <u>Step 2</u>: Bringing supporting documentation, along with your child, to your neighbourhood English catchment school. <u>Supporting Documents Needed:</u>

- 1. Proof of residence in Vancouver
- 2. Child's birth certificate
- 3. Immigration documentation (if applicable)
- 4. Immunization records
- 5. Court Orders/Documents (if applicable)

If you want to apply for a Choice program or cross-boundary, you must <u>first apply to your English catchment elementary</u> <u>school</u>. Applications for Choice programs and cross boundary placements will begin to be accepted in early 2019.



In the event there are more in-catchment applicants than available space* at the school, the following process will be used to prioritize enrolment:

Kindergarten Applications Received Between November 1st and January 31st

- 1. **In-catchment** Kindergarten applicants with siblings in attendance at the school (and who will be attending next year) will be placed first.
- 2. The names of all other in-catchment registrants will be entered into a **random draw** for the remaining Kindergarten spaces.
- 3. Students who cannot be accommodated will be placed on a waitlist in the order in which their name was drawn.
- **4.** Between January 31st and the second Friday in June students on the ordered waitlist will be accommodated as space becomes available.

Kindergarten Registrations Received AFTER January 31st

In-catchment Kindergarten students who apply **after** January 31st will be accommodated if there is space. If there is no space their names will be added to the bottom of the existing waitlist. **Note**: There will be **no priority** given to registrants with siblings if they register after January 31st.

* Available Space includes physical capacity, resources, staffing, or educational programs available or planned for a school as defined by the district. (Administrative Procedure 300)

DIGITAL RESPONSIBILITY

At Laurier, we teach the students using the 4 C's of 21st Century Learning. We place a great emphasis on teaching around creativity, collaboration, communication, and community. The world we live in also requires that we teach our students the skills that will help them be good digital citizens. As part of the applied design, skills, and technology curriculum, we teach the students the knowledge of how to be good digital citizens.

We expect students to practice social responsibility and good digital citizenship when using technology. As Laurier students, they are expected to S.O.A.R. online, at school, at home, and within the community. In order to support responsible online citizenship at home, it is important that parents also reinforce these expectations by monitoring their children's online behaviour when students are using technology. It is important that we help students with the choices they make while gaming and/or participating in social media sites. We would like to take this opportunity to remind parents how they can support their children at home with safe and responsible digital citizenship:

- Be aware of what your child is doing online with regards to both gaming and social media
- Be aware of who your children are communicating with in the digital world by making yourself aware of what your son or daughter is doing online, and who they are talking to.
- Only allow your son or daughter to join/participate in sites that they are willing to have you participate in as well.
- Limit the amount screen of time your son or daughter has in a day. Consider having Wi-Fi-free hours where the Wi-Fi is switched off or unplugged at night.

MORNING/AFTERNOON SUPERVISION

School is in session from 9:00am to 3:00pm, with the first warning bell at 8:55am. The outside supervision takes place from **8:45am to 9:00am in the mornings** and **3:00 to 3:15pm in the afternoons**. There is no supervision outside these hours for students who are dropped off too early at school. The safety of our students is our first priority, and we need your support to do our job well with the only resources we have available to us at this time. Thank you for your consideration and for ensuring that your children are not dropped off or picked up from school outside of the supervision hours.

If your child will be absent from school, please call **604-713-5159** to report this absence as early as possible. Parents should leave a message at the dedicated answering service by calling the number provided. You will be prompted to provide the two-digit extension for your child's school to access the school's voicemail box for reporting an absence. The two-digit extension for Laurier Elementary is **44**.

It is important to report your child's absence prior to 9:00 a.m. each day of the absence.

If your child is late for school they must sign in at the office before they make their way to the classroom. School offices are busy places: consistently notifying the school in advance of your child's absence will significantly improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the Safe Arrival Morning Routine.




