Laurier Code of Conduct

(Please review this code with your child regularly.)

At Sir Wilfrid Laurier we encourage all student to S.O.A.R. with success. (Supportive -Open Minded-Awesome - Respectful)

Purpose:

Laurier's Code of Conduct has been created to help maintain a safe, caring and orderly school environment. The Purpose of the Code of Conduct is:

- 1. To encourage the development of socially responsible behaviour resulting in a positive reputation for students and the school community.
- 2. To foster a safe, respectful and welcoming learning environment for all students, staff and parents.
- 3. To clearly communicate behavioural expectations to the school community.

The Code of Conduct applies to all members of the school community at school, traveling to and from the school, at any school-related activity at any location, or any circumstance/activity that will have an impact on the school environment. At Sir Wilfrid Laurier Elementary School we believe that character development through the proactive teaching of positive social skills is paramount to the success of any student. At Laurier the staff have adopted a School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (S.W.P.B.S) approach to supporting behaviour. The staff explicitly teach and model what it means to S.O.A.R in all locations in the school and at home.

Supportive means:

- we welcome everyone
- we include others
- we are helpful
- we are kind

Open Minded means:

- we are flexible
- we try new things
- we make new friends
- we are brave

Awesome means:

- we try our best
- we are cool (we know how to self-regulate)
- we have fun
- we are proud to be ourselves

Respectful means:

- we respect ourselves
- we respect others
- we respect the environment
- we respect our school

Minor Misbehavior:

- staff member will speak directly to the student to review appropriate behaviour
- the student will be reminded of the school Code of Conduct and prompted to identify his or her breach of the Code. The expectation will be retaught, role-modeled and positively reinforced.

Serious or Repeated Misbehavior:

- reported to teacher/principal
- discussion and reflection with the student, reminding student of our Code of Conduct
- alternative choices the student could have made
- record of the incident and action taken
- parents will be contacted to review the Code of Conduct with their child
- may include loss of privileges (playground, classroom or school privileges)
- may include some type of restorative justice

Very Serious Misbehaviour:

- reflection on past behaviour
- discussion with staff involved
- parents contacted
- officials or other agencies contacted as needed
- School Board Officials, the Police, MCFD or other community agencies may be contacted if deemed necessary.

Unacceptable Conduct:

The following are examples of conduct that must be reported as soon as possible to a staff member or supervising adult:

- Bullying, harassment, intimidation or exclusion
- interfering with an orderly environment
- interfering with the learning of others

School Emergency Procedures

School emergency procedures are consistent with Vancouver Board of Education policies and guidelines and are reviewed regularly with staff and with students. Each school year, we conduct 2 Earthquake drills [October 18, 2018 (Great BC Shakeout, 10:18 am) and May 2, 2019 (Big One @ 2:00 pm)], 6 Fire drills and 2 Lockdown Drills. Classroom Teachers review the procedures with students on a regular basis to ensure they keep themselves safe in case of real emergency. The following terminology and procedures are used and explained when teaching students:

Evacuation Procedures:

- In case of an emergency requiring evacuation such as Fire or Earthquake, staff and students are trained to assemble at the gravel field in the back field. Visitors to the school should also evacuate the school.
- The school has equipment and provisions to adequately care for children until their parents can pick them up. In such an emergency, parents are directed to carefully follow the instructions of staff so we can ensure the proper accounting and safe dismissal of children to their parents or emergency designates.
- In case of a real emergency, we can anticipate that children and parents both will be worried about their family members' health and safety. The school has specific student release procedures in place to ensure that families are re-united as quickly and safely as possible, and to ensure accountability and tracking of each student's safe release.
- During an Earthquake, students are asked to follow the following steps before evacuation:

Drop, Cover, and Hold On

Use if an earthquake or explosion occurs or anytime a building or its materials shake and fall **Drop** - get down on the ground/floor

Cover - take cover under heavy furniture or millwork

Hold On – hold on to the furniture/millwork as the shaking may cause even large items to move about After the shaking stops and possible falling debris settles, wait 60 seconds, then Evacuate the building

Other Procedures:

Lockdown

Staff and students also rehearse what to do in the unlikely event of a dangerous intruder either on the school grounds or within the school. During a "LOCKDOWN" drill, we lockdown the school: "Lockdown, lockdown, lockdown" is announced over the school PA system in the unlikely event that there is a dangerous intruder in the school. All students gather in their classroom (or closest room), lock the doors, turn off lights and remain quietly with their teacher until they are directed that it is safe to come out.

In the unlikely event of a lockdown situation, we will be turning off and collecting cell phones from students, as using them at such a time poses potential additional risks: we do not want phones to sound at times when quiet is essential. Additionally, texting, tweeting, etc. risks sending out inaccurate information that could hamper police efforts to resolve the incident. Parents are asked not to attempt to contact the school or their children directly.

Hold & Secure

Use if there is a security concern in the neighborhood

Everyone is to come into the school and remain in the school; Exterior doors are secured Exterior windows secured and blinds closed; No one may enter or exit the school

Shelter in Place

Use if an environmental hazard is in the vicinity of school (including coyotes)

Everyone is to come into the school and remain in the school; Exterior doors are secured Exterior windows are closed and secured plus blinds/drapes closed; All ventilation systems may be turned off; Principal will monitor access to the school

Room Clear

Use to move students away from a hazard contained in one room/area

Students directed to go directly to a previously agreed-upon alternate location

Default: school library

Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) residential school commemoration event held in Williams Lake, BC, Canada, in May 2013. It grew out of Phyllis Webstad's story of having her shiny new orange shirt taken away on her first day of school at the Mission, and it has become an opportunity to keep the discussion on all aspects of residential schools happening annually.



Orange Shirt - Design by Robin Roberts, Haida/Tsimshian/Squamish and as an affirmation of our commitment to ensure that everyone around us matters. The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for anti-racism and anti-bullying policies for the EVERY CHILD MATTERS

In Preparation for Halloween October 31st

Wednesday, October 31st is our fun Halloween day at Laurier, and many of our students are looking forward to the related activities in their classrooms and school-wide. Our staff members are working hard to make this day a special one for our students, organizing educational and fun activities.

This is also a special time of the year with Halloween followed by Remembrance Day, and is a time to pay much attention to our most vulnerable children, and the fact that Halloween may tend to draw out undesirable behavior. Please let us know in advance if we can be of any support and assistance and/or if you notice anything unusual.

Student Halloween Costume Expectations

In an effort to enjoy and celebrate Halloween at Laurier appropriately and respectfully, please use the following guidelines when helping your child(ren) selecting a costume:

1. Costumes that are provocative, revealing, sexual in nature, or employ questionable props are not permitted.

2. Costumes that depict violence, alcohol, or drugs are not permitted. Fake weapons are not allowed.

3. Costumes that could be offensive or perpetuate a stereotype of someone's culture, gender, heritage, or religion are not permitted.

4. Costumes should not hinder student ability to participate in classes, including P.E. Costumes may not disrupt or impede traffic, or present issues of safety in the hallway. No masks in school.

Talking points for Parents to assist in this teachable moment:

- Remind your child(ren) of their audience in the building (students, teachers, parents, community members).
- This is a school—what may be appropriate in pop culture or the media may not be appropriate for a place of learning.
- We are a community, and we want students to think about how their costume choice may impact others within this community.

Safety recommendations when going out trick-or-treating:

- Wear costumes that are short enough so that you do not trip.
- Decorate costumes with reflective tape.
- Shoes should fit well so you do not fall.
- Costumes should be "flame resistant."
- When you go out, carry a glow stick or flashlight with new batteries.
- It can be hard to see out of a mask, so use makeup or face paint instead.
- Trick or treat in groups with a trusted adult It's safer and more fun.
- Carry a cellular phone with you, if possible.
- Visit only houses with the lights on.
- Don't eat any treats unless they are checked by a parent, or the adult looking after you.
- Always remember to keep yourself safe.

Our school is in partnership with EarthBites, which is a program that is sponsored by our PAC, and supports our school in managing our school garden and by holding engaging workshops where teachers and students discover how to grow plants and eat with the seasons.

The workshops are integrated with the evolved BC curriculum allowing students and teachers to explore how to:

-Grow and harvest spring, summer and fall vegetables, fruits and herbs -Forage edible plants to create teas, salads, salves and soaps -Create seasonal nutritional snacks featuring produce from the school garden

-Lead seasonal school markets

This month, EarthBites explored ways on how we can preserve the harvest. Students made Kale chip using a dehydrator. On Wednesday **October 17**, the program will be hosting their **After-school Fall Market**. We encourage students and families to bring change if they wish to purchase any items for sale. Proceeds will go to the purchase of garden supplies (soil amender).





MORNING/AFTERNOON SUPERVISION

School is in session from 8:55am to 3:00pm. The outside supervision takes place from 8:45am to 9:00am in the mornings and 3:00 to 3:15pm in the afternoons. There is no supervision outside these hours for students who are dropped off too early at school. The safety of our students is our first priority, and we need your support to do our job well with the only resources we have available to us at this time. Thank you for your consideration and for ensuring that your children are not dropped off or picked up from school outside of the supervision hours.

If your child will be absent from school, please call **604-713-5159** to report this absence as early as possible. Parents should leave a message at the dedicated answering service by calling the number provided. You will be prompted to provide the two-digit extension for your child's school to access the school's voicemail box for reporting an absence. The two-digit extension for Laurier Elementary is **44**.

It is important to report your child's absence prior to 9:00 a.m. each day of the absence.

If your child is late for school they must sign in at the office before they make their way to the classroom.

School offices are busy places: consistently notifying the school in advance of your child's absence will significantly improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the Safe Arrival Morning Routine.
