Arriving to School On Time!



Arriving to school on time sets the tone for a successful day of learning. When students are late, they miss valuable instructional time, disrupt the flow of the classroom, and often feel rushed or unsettled. These missed moments—whether it's morning routines, announcements, or the introduction of new concepts—can add up and impact a child's academic progress and confidence. Being punctual helps students start the day with a sense of calm and readiness, reinforcing responsibility and respect for learning. Let's work together to ensure every child begins their day on the right foot!

Concern at School?

Your child's teacher is your first point of contact. If parents have any questions or concerns regarding activities occurring in their child(ren)'s classroom, please discuss these concerns directly with the classroom teacher. Please contact the school via telephone, email or by putting a note in your child(ren)'s agenda requesting an appointment. Most concerns are resolved at this point of contact.

After having spoken to the classroom teacher, if the issue is unresolved, an appointment with the Principal is the second step. Again, please contact the office to book an appointment in order to speak about matters privately.

If you have a concern about a child other than your own, please reach out to school staff. Only VSB STAFF are allowed to speak to that child. You may only speak to your own child.



Our school offers various programs to teach children diverse strategies for conflict resolution. We request that you allow our staff to guide and support your child in these matters.

Terry Fox Run

We were fortunate to have the weather cooperate for the 45th Terry Fox Run. The primary students ran around the school following our first Be Your Best Assembly; some completing as many as 10 laps around the school! The intermediate students took part in the Terry Fox run at Central Park later in the afternoon. Together, we raised \$590 for cancer research, supporting this important cause.



Student Safety



Student safety is always our top priority. To help us maintain a secure environment, we ask that parents and guardians come directly to the school office if they need to drop off items for their child or if they need to speak with their child during the school day. For safety reasons, adults should not approach or attempt to communicate with students through the schoolyard fence or on the playground. Unknown adults doing so may lead us to contact the police. Thank you for supporting a safe and caring environment for all students.

We would like to remind families that our school is a nut-aware environment. For the safety of students with severe allergies, please do not send any food items containing nuts in your child's lunch or snacks. Thank you for helping us keep our school safe for everyone.



Pets on School Grounds

We love seeing our school grounds enjoyed by families outside of school hours, and we welcome you to continue using the space for play, gathering, and exercise. If you are bringing your pets in the evenings, please remember that dogs <u>must remain on a leash at all times</u> while on school property. It is also very important to clean up after your pets, as children are constantly playing on our fields and playgrounds. Halloween

As Halloween approaches, many students are excited about choosing costumes. While dressing up is meant to be fun, it's important to remember that some costumes can be hurtful or offensive, especially those that imitate or stereotype cultures. We encourage families to talk with children about making thoughtful costume choices. (Please see the attached poster from the Indigenous Education Department on cultural appropriation.)

On Friday, October 31st, we look forward to celebrating Halloween together! Parents are invited to watch our Halloween parade in the gym, beginning at 9:15 a.m.

A few reminders about costumes:

- Costumes are optional, but many students (and staff!) enjoy dressing up.
- Costumes must follow our Code of Conduct: they should not promote discrimination or include culturally insensitive themes.
- No weapons (real or pretend) are allowed at school. Please keep items such as toy guns, swords, knives, or axes at home for evening festivities.
- Leave fragile or delicate costume parts at home so they're ready for Halloween night.
- Extra-scary costumes may frighten our youngest students (some are only 4 years old), so please keep this in mind.
- Students go outside for all breaks. If costumes aren't weather-appropriate, please ensure your child has rain gear or is prepared to change out of their costume before heading outdoors.

Everyday is an OUTSIDE day!



A friendly reminder that <u>every day</u> is an outside day; so please ensure your child(ren) comes to school dressed for the weather, whether it's rain or shine. We also recommend sending an extra change of clothes in case your child needs to change during the day. Thank you for helping to keep our students comfortable and ready for outdoor activities!

Student safety is of paramount importance. Ensuring student safety is a shared responsibility. In order to assist the school, we ask parents to notify us of student absences. Messages are checked in the morning. If you are coming in late, please report to the office to sign-in to receive a late slip before sending your child(ren) to class.



CULTURE IS NOT A COSTUME

HOW NOT TO CULTURALLY A PPROPRIATE HALLOWEEN

The autumn season is upon us, and soon it will be Halloween. This time of year brings with it decisions on costume choice. While dressing up is meant to be fun and exciting, it also runs the risk of offending others with costumes that are offensive to other cultures. Halloween offers the opportunity to discuss costume choices with both colleagues and students. It is important not to inadvertently mimic culture by culturally appropriating racial or ethnic groups.

CULTURAL APPROPRIATION


- 1) The taking from a culture that is not one's own of intellectual property, cultural expressions or artifacts, history and ways of knowledge (Ziff & Rao, 1997).
- Any Instance which means commonly associated with and/or perceived as belonging to another are used to further one's own ends (Shugart, 1997).
- 3) To take parts (symbols, artifacts, dress, words, practices, etc.) from a culture that is not your own. This can happen in a variety of forms but often around Halloween it involves wearing 'costumes' that may have some significance to other cultures.
- 4) A particular power dynamic in which members of a dominant culture take elements from a culture of people who have been systematically oppressed by that dominant group.

Engage in dialogue

Bring up subjects like cultural appropriation with your colleagues and students. See what their views are and share your own knowledge and experiences. Dialogue is collaborative and about people working together to find a common understanding. It is about exploring, listening, and re-examining your positions, values, and assumptions.

Examine your own practices

Are you wearing a costume during Halloween? Ask yourself some critical questions about your costume. Is my costume based on someone's race,





If you see a costume that doesn't sit right with you, start a conversation with that person. Begin a respectful dialogue with that person at an appropriate time and place. Ask them about their costume choice. Your conversation should be about having the person think through their choice, not about right and wrong.
