

Indigenous-Focused Graduation Requirement

- Beginning with the Grad class of 2024, all students will need to complete FOUR credits (one course) of Indigenous-Focused studies.
- In the English department, we are offering English First Peoples courses at grades, 10,11 and 12. You can fulfill your English Language arts requirement AND your Indigenous-Focused Grad requirement at the same time!

English First Peoples 10 Literary Studies + Writing

- The course surveys Indigenous literatures across a variety of genres including short stories, novels, poems, drama, films, and graphic texts, all created by Indigenous writers and artists across Canada. Students will develop their skills of close reading and analysis, as well as their written compositions.
- EFP 10 will explore themes such storytelling, oral traditions, identity, belonging, relationships, childhood, family, place, resilience and reconciliation.


English First Peoples 10

Both English Courses are Academically Similar!


Both options will focus on the English skills of

- Further developing high level thinking and writing skills





English First Peoples 11:


Literary Studies + Writing


- This course focuses on the experiences, values, beliefs and lived realities of First Peoples provincially, nationally, and internationally.
- Students delve deeply into Indigenous texts in a range of genres (novels, stories, poems, drama, films, graphic texts) to explore various themes, authors, and topics.
- Students will study and create a variety of written texts to strengthen their own personal and academic writing.
- EFP 11 themes may include: the history of colonization, identity, rites of passage, community, responsibility, sacred/traditional stories, connectedness, the history of residential schools, the relationship to the natural world and to the cosmos.

English Studies 12


In English Studies 12 students will study a variety of texts from Indigenous and non-Indigenous authors. These will include short fiction, poetry, novels, plays, films and other media texts.

Students will use critical thinking to analyze texts and create various demonstrations of their learning including written compositions, projects, debates, and presentations.

English Studies 12 Continued...

Course goals include:

- deepening the understanding of self and others in a changing world
- gaining insight into the diverse factors that shape identity
- appreciating the importance of self-representation through text
- contributing to Reconciliation by building greater understanding of the knowledge and perspectives of First Peoples
- expanding understanding of what it means to be an educated Canadian and a global citizen



English Studies 12

English First Peoples 12

- EFP 12 offers students the opportunity to engage with a wide variety of authentic Indigenous texts to explore the worlds of First Peoples both within and outside Canada.
- Oral story, speech, poetry, drama, songs, films and prose (fiction and non-fiction) will open students to the experiences, values, beliefs and lived realities of Canada's First Peoples. Students in EFP 12 will further develop their skills of close analysis, critical thinking and effective communication of ideas through increasingly sophisticated multi-genre texts and projects.
- By engaging with Indigenous texts, students will appreciate and understand how language constructs and reflects personal, social and cultural identities.

Psychology 11 (Open to interested students in grade 11 or 12)

Psychology 11 (not an English credit) will introduce students to the following topics:

Psychology 11 Cont.



- In Psychology 11, students will study a survey of topics designed to increase self-awareness and to develop a personal tool-kit to live a happier, healthier life.
- Students will have choice in assignments and projects. Unit tests come with study guides for easy preparation.

Provincial Assessments for Literacy

Students will write TWO provincial assessments of their literacy skills. <u>These assessments do not affect the student's mark in English classes</u>. These are separate items on the student's transcript.
