

# January Newsletter

With deep gratitude and respect, we are honoured to be learning and unlearning on the ancestral and unceded lands of the xʷməθkʷəy̓əm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation) & səliłwətał (Tsleil-Waututh Nation).

As we continue integrating technology into learning, both in our classrooms and at home, helping children become safe, responsible digital citizens is more important than ever. Our students are growing up in a world where communication, creativity, and play often take place online, and with these opportunities comes the need for awareness and guidance.

Understanding how to protect personal information, identify trustworthy websites, practice kindness online, and speak up when something feels uncomfortable are essential skills. Just as we teach students to be safe and respectful in our school hallways, we want them to feel confident and secure as they navigate the digital world.

To support families in this learning, here are some helpful digital safety tips:

## Digital Safety Tips for Families

- Talk openly about online experiences. Ask your child what apps they use, what games they enjoy, and who they communicate with. Regular conversations build trust and awareness.
- Set age-appropriate boundaries. Review ratings for apps, games, and videos. Many platforms offer easy-to-use parental controls that can support safe exploration.
- Keep personal information private. Remind children not to share their full name, school, address, photos, or passwords online without checking with an adult.
- Use strong, memorable passwords. A mix of words, numbers, and symbols works well. A simple password phrase can help children remember their login information.
- Model healthy tech habits. Children learn by watching us—show balance by unplugging during meals, conversations, and family time.
- Encourage kindness online. Digital interactions should reflect the same respect and empathy we expect in person.
- Let them know to speak up. If something online makes them uncomfortable—an ad, message, or video—they should tell a trusted adult right away.

We will also be hosting workshops for students in Grades 4–7 on February 23, led by Safer Schools Together, to help children build healthy, responsible digital habits they can use for years to come. 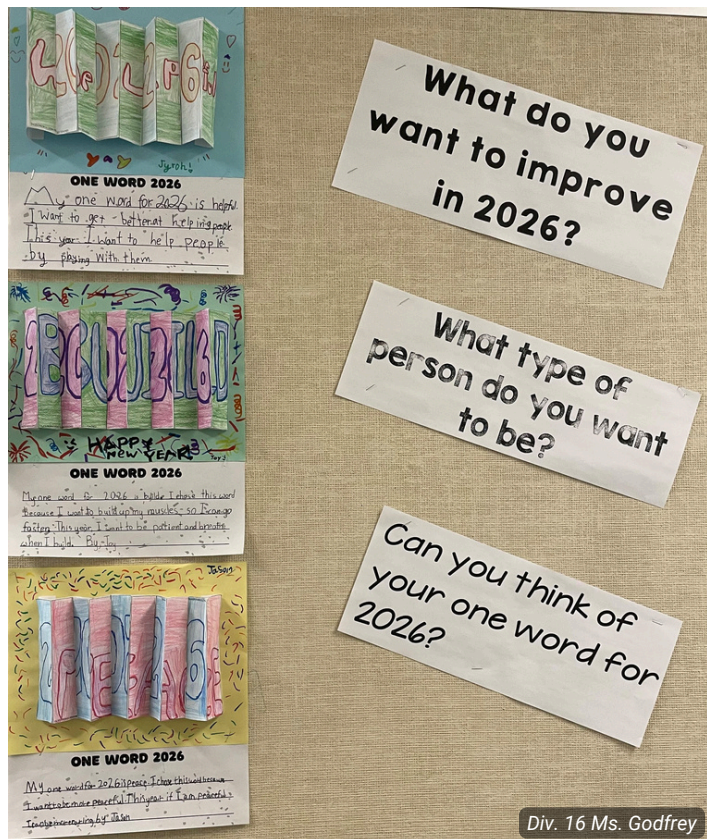


## FAMILY READ - FRIDAY, FEB 20

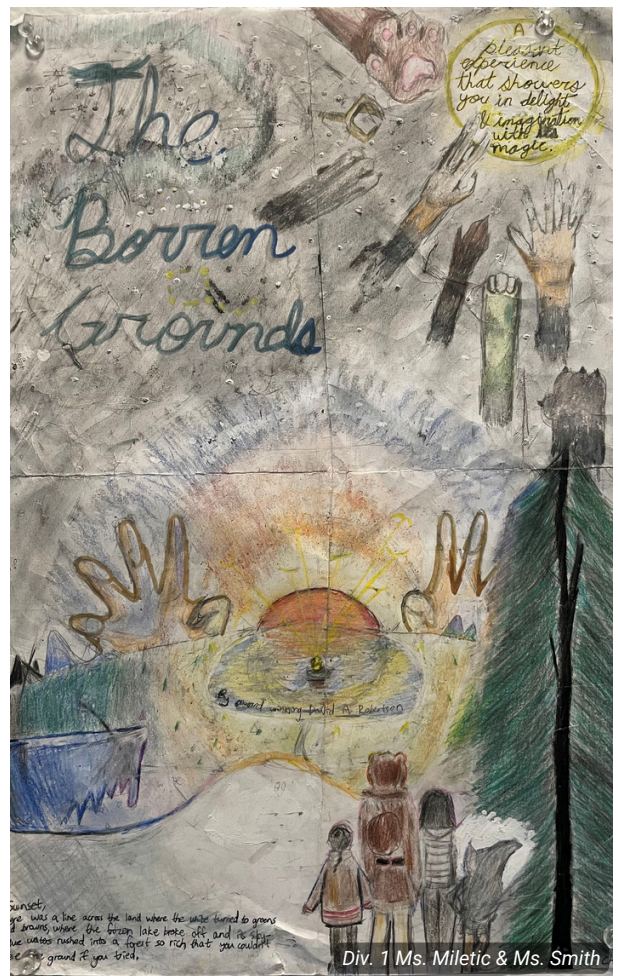






## BASKETBALL SEASON

## STAFF PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The staff at Norquay continue to be active, reflective learners committed to keeping their practice current and responding to present student needs. Throughout the year, teachers do their own research and learning as needed. In addition, this year, staff have engaged in a broad range of organized group learning, including:

- Participating in a Math Fluency Residency
- Deepening relational connections to support intentional collaboration and its impact on student learning and achievement
- Engaging in a Literacy Fluency Residency

In addition, our primary staff, resource teachers, and school administration attended District Literacy Days to further their understanding of literacy development in children and youth. We are also proud to highlight that several Norquay staff members will be sharing their expertise at a math workshop in February, presenting to their peers.

We also have a team currently planning a session on selecting classroom resources that are, representative, responsive, and reflective and another team preparing a lunch n learn on story workshop.

We are grateful for Norquay's ongoing dedication to strengthening practice in ways that directly support student learning and growth.

# KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION FOR CHILDREN BORN IN 2021 BEGINS NOVEMBER 1

All kindergarten applicants are required to complete an online application for their English catchment elementary school. This includes families who wish to apply for District Choice programs (Early French Immersion, Montessori, Indigenous Focus School, Early Mandarin Bilingual, Nootka Fine Arts) and/or make a cross boundary application to attend a non-catchment school.

The priority registration period for kindergarten opens on **November 1** and closes on **January 31**. Students who submit an online application within this priority period will be accommodated before late applicants.

Applying for kindergarten is a 2-step process:

**Step 1:** Online Application (ApplyNow)

- Completion of an online application form (<https://applynow.vsb.bc.ca/>) for the school year **2026-27**

**Step 2:** Verification of documentation

- After applying, you will receive instructions on how to schedule your in-person appointment
- Bring supporting documentation during your scheduled appointment for verification

Supporting documents needed:

1. Proof of residence in Vancouver
2. Child's birth certificate
3. Immigration documentation (if applicable)
4. Immunization records
5. Court orders/documents (if applicable)



If you want to apply for a District Choice Program or cross boundary, you must **first apply to your English catchment elementary school**. District Choice Programs and cross boundary applications will be accepted in early 2026. In the event there are more in-catchment applicants than available space\* at the school, the following process will be used to prioritize enrolment:

**Kindergarten Applications Received Between November 1 and January 31**

1. **In-catchment** kindergarten applicants with siblings in attendance at the school (and who will be attending next year) will be placed first.
2. The names of all other in-catchment registrants will be entered into a **random draw** for the remaining kindergarten spaces.
3. Students who cannot be accommodated will be placed on a waitlist in the order in which their name was drawn.
4. In the event there are more in-catchment registrants than can be accommodated at their catchment school, students will be placed at another school as close to the catchment as possible until space becomes available.

**Kindergarten Registrations Received AFTER January 31st**

In-catchment kindergarten students who apply **after** January 31 will be accommodated if there is space. If there is no space, their names will be added to the bottom of the existing waitlist.

**Note:** Sibling priority **does not** apply to registrations received after January 31.

In the event there are more in-catchment registrants than can be accommodated at their catchment school, students will be placed at another school as close to the catchment as possible until space becomes available.

\* Available Space includes physical capacity, resources, staffing, or educational programs available or planned for a school as defined by the District (Administrative Procedure 300).
