- Establishment of a feedback loop. Feedback loops reinforce the importance of receiving feedback through a two-way street of communication and dialogue. The feedback-loop process enhances collaborative skills and offers space for self-reflection, identifying specific goals or measures for improved learning outcomes.



Library Monitors are signing up for shifts and getting training this month for a year of leadership, Library skills, and community.



Did you know that Saturday, October 5th was World Educator's Day? This is a yearly celebration of all the amazing things staff do at schools. We know staff work hard to plan and prep lessons for students to engage in from 9AM to 3PM, but did you know that so many staff VOLUNTEER after those hours (morning, lunch, and after school) to help run amazing clubs, sports, and activities for students. A few clubs and sports happening this fall:

DRILLS AND PRACTICES

We regularly practice different scenarios so in the event of a real emergency staff and students are prepared. You can also practice these at home:

- Fire drill: In the event of a fire or smoke from a fire, schools are expected to follow the fire evacuation procedure.
- Lockdown drill: A lockdown procedure protects staff and students from a threat inside the building such as an intruder. Activating lockdown quickly will potentially save lives, reduce injuries, and will assist police and other emergency responders in dealing with the situation effectively. The VPD may also call a lockdown procedure if an incident is occurring within the direct vicinity of the school and it is unsafe to release the students.
- Earthquake drill: An opportunity for schools to practice essential earthquake safety measures such as "Drop, Cover, and Hold On." Beyond the drill, the school will critically review and update their emergency preparedness plans and supplies, while also taking proactive measures to secure their spaces and prevent potential damage and injuries.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Thank you to the families that joined us at the last PAC meeting to talk about traffic and safety around the Norquay community. It is important that we work together. Some important initiatives we are taking:

- Recruiting for the adult crossing guard program (more information in the PAC corner)
- Booking pedestrian talks for K to 7
- Continuing with the Walking School Bus program
- Regular reminders to students of pedestrian safety tips
 - Always look both ways before stepping into the street, even at a crosswalk.
 - Make eye contact with drivers to ensure they see you before crossing.
 - Avoid distractions like phones or headphones while crossing.
 - Never assume that vehicles will stop—be cautious and aware at all times.

With less daylight we ask that you go over these safety precautions with your children. Together we will continue to work together to keep the community safer.

We recently learned that BC Hydro and Telus are completing a job in the lane north of Ward St. between Duchess St. and Earles St. Construction vehicles will be parked on the east side of Duchess St. between Horley St. and the lane south of Horley St. Work is scheduled to take place October 15 – 28. There will be 'Temporary No-Stopping 7:00am to 8:00pm' to install underground duct and structures for BC Hydro and Telus:

- Both sides of the lane north of Ward St. between 150 meters and 210 meters east of Duchess St.
- East side of Duchess St. between Horley St. and the lane south of Horley St., for parking


