This year, we celebrated numerous student achievements that underscore the excellence within our schools. From improvements in literacy and numeracy consistently above provincial rates, to the inspiring participation in events like the District Science Fair and the Indigenous Graduation Ceremony, VSB students have demonstrated remarkable growth and resilience.

Governance excellence has also been a cornerstone of our success. In addition to participating in committee and Board meetings, as well as reviewing reports and information to guide our responsibilities as a Board, trustees also attend gatherings and sessions with various education partners and stakeholder groups at the local, regional, and provincial levels. Their leadership and dedication are instrumental to students and our education system.

On behalf of the Board, we are deeply grateful for the invaluable insights rights holders shared with us. Their advice is a bright and guiding light on our continued reconciliation journey.

To staff, our deep appreciation for their support to us as a Board and for their tireless dedication to students and families. And we also appreciate the contributions and input by representatives of the VSB's formal stakeholder groups, which are informative to our Board's decisions. Together, we are building a future where every student can feel a deep sense of belonging and is empowered to pursue their unique pathways of learning.

Reconciliation, equity and inclusion

The Board's equity statement is central to its service to students. In its considerations and activities this past year, the Board maintained a focus on creating an equitable learning environment where every child can experience a deep sense of belonging and is free to pursue pathways of learning in ways that are authentic to themselves. Reconciliation through relationship building

Indigenous ways of learning and being are deeply respected and embraced by the Board which leads the education system that operates on the unceded and ancestral lands of the x^wməθk^wəỷəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation) & səlilwətal (Tsleil-Waututh Nation).

To learn more about the histories, traditions and cultures of Indigenous people, trustees gathered with staff in the Indigenous Education department to partake in a drum making session in December 2023. Trustees learned drum teachings of various Nations and the benefits that drum making and drumming bring to education.



Furthering the school district's reconciliation journey is fundamental to the Board and its work. As such the Board gathers with the three Host Nations to increase knowledge, awareness, appreciation of and respect for Indigenous histories, traditions, cultures and contributions. In May, trustees joined VSB's Red Dress honour ceremony hosted by the Indigenous Education Department. The ceremony was solemn, sacred and poignant. And, on June 21, 2024, trustees joined with staff and students at the Education Centre in celebration of National Indigenous Peoples' Day. Activities celebrated Indigenous peoples and heritages with speeches, performances and cultural workshops. Throughout the year, trustees also attended several events honouring Indigenous ways of being and learning including house post unveilings and community gatherings.

Additionally, engaging with members of the Host Nations for guidance to the education system is also fundamental to the Board's work. This past year, much of that guidance was received during meetings of the Indigenous Education Council (IEC) and the language and governance sub-committees. The IEC met four times; once at VSB's Education Centre and three times within each of the communities of Musqueam, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh Nations. Some topics discussed and advanced this year included:

- Revised Land Acknowledgement and communications roll out
- Discussed hiring process and Indigenous staff mentorship
- Three host nations actively participated in Indigenous leadership hiring processes.

Building equity

The Board's equity building efforts extend beyond learning activities and formal events. The Board believes in creating a school system where students can see themselves in their curriculum and their learning spaces. To further enable this, it adopted a motion for submission at the B.C. School Trustees Association (BCSTA) 2024 AGM to help address workforce planning for the education system. The resulting motion was adopted at the AGM held in the spring.

"That the BCSTA request that the Ministry of Education and child Care in collaboration with the Parliamentary Secretary for Anti Racism Initiatives conduct a voluntary census of all K-12 employees to provide data on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion in the workforce." Trustees also attended several school-based events throughout the year that focus on student voice, diversity, equity and inclusion. Among many included were:

- Pink Shirt Day
- The annual Diversity, Equity + Inclusion Conference
- International Women's Day
- Vancouver Pride Parade

At school events and during monthly public meetings the Board also marked other commemorative occasions including heritage months, Chanukah, Christmas, Lunar New Year, Black History Month, Vaisakhi, Pride Month, Orange Shirt Day/National Day for Truth & Reconciliation and Diwali to note a few.

Improving student achievement and well-being

Through its work, the Board enables improvements in student achievement, physical and mental well-being, and belonging. Several student achievement and well-being events highlight advancements this past year.

Improving conditions for students

In September, as the new school year began, trustees attended the opening of the new seismically safe Eric Hamber Secondary School. The new school, with capacity for 1,700 students, was built to LEED gold standards that include energy-saving measures to reduce greenhousegas emissions. The school integrates Indigenous designs, including a five-metre (16 foot) female welcome figure and weaving creations thanks to the talents and skills of x^wməθk^wəỷəm (Musqueam) artists. This reflects the VSB's commitment to reconciliation and to honour the rich cultural traditions and history of the x^wməθk^wəýəm (Musqueam) people. The new Eric Hamber is also the first secondary school in Vancouver to feature a dedicated child care centre for children under age five.

In June, Deputy Prime Minister Freeland visited Roberts Elementary's LunchLAB program to announce a national school food program. At the event, students and staff heard Deputy Prime Minister Freeland speak about the importance of food programs in schools. Along with the Deputy Prime Minister, Minister Beech, B.C. Education Minister Singh, federal Minister Sajjan and VSB chair Jung served food to students and enjoyed lunch.



Another foundational component to student achievement and well-being is their classroom environments. In June 2023, the Board passed a motion, "Promoting Focused Learning Environments and Online Safety." As a result, and in alignment with the provincial government's direction to all B.C. school boards, all VSB school code of conducts were updated to include restrictions to student use of personal devices at schools ahead of the 2024-2025 school year. Additionally, within the financial planning process, the Board allocated funding to promote student online safety – essential skills also needed beyond the classroom environment.

Advancing outcomes for students

At its first public meeting of the 2024-2025 school year, the Board reviewed and approved VSB's Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (FESL) Annual Report for submission to the Ministry. This year's report indicates that student achievement results show continued proficiency in all areas of overall student achievement and well-being. Literacy and numeracy results are consistently above provincial rates for all grades. This year's FESL report also reveals that inequities remain for priority learners: students who are Indigenous, students with diverse needs and students who are in-care. Elimination of gaps in outcomes for these students requires strategic supports. As such, this year's report details further focus on literacy and numeracy supports, instruction and assessments as well as enhancing student well-being and connections to their school communities to improve outcomes

for students this school year, with particular emphasis on supports for those students.

Celebrating student learning and accomplishments

Each month, numerous activities and events at schools showcase student learning. This year, trustees attended many, including the:

- District Science Fair
- AIRS Opening Ceremony
- District Applied Design, Skills & Technology Celebration
- VSB Cross Country event



Trustees also joined staff, students and their families at the Grade 7 Moving Ahead Ceremony as well as the Indigenous Graduation Ceremony and secondary school graduations.

Governance and stewardship

The Board's role is to provide strategic direction and leadership to ensure the success of students through effective resource management and alignment with district goals, while being accountable for delivering appropriate educational programs and services

Advancing Policy

The Board created a four-year policy review plan with input from the Policy & Governance Committee to ensure regular policy reviews and compliance with legislation, regulations, and mandate directions. As part of this work, the Board updated several policies this past year.

- Policy 3: Role of the Trustee
- Policy 4: Trustee Code of Conduct
- Policy 8: Board Committees
- Policy 10: Policy Development

The Board approves Board/Authority Authorized (BAA) courses under policy and the B.C. School Act to meet local school and community needs, offering students choice and flexibility. This year, the Board approved two courses developed by VSB educators for 2024-2025 school year:

- Application of Artificial Intelligence (AI) Grade 12
- Queer and Trans History of B.C. Grade 12

One of the Board's objectives within the Education Plan is to align its policies and practices in a manner consistent with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the calls-to-action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. The update to policy 8 including adding representation to rights holders of the three Host Nations (x^wməθk^wəỳəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation) & səlilwəta1 (Tsleil-Waututh Nation) to participate in all of the Board's standing committees.

There are four trustee members of each Board standing committee. Representatives of the District's formal stakeholder groups (unions/ labour and associations, plus the Vancouver District Student Council and the District Parent Advisory Committee) are also invited to attend committee meetings. Standing committees act in an advisory capacity to the Board and support good governance and informed decision making by the Board. In addition to expanding the invitation to include perspectives of Host Nations, the Board also streamlined its committee structure to reflect effective practices and efficiency. There are now four Board standing committees:

- Policy and Governance Committee
- Facilities Planning Committee
- Education Plan Committee
- Finance and Personnel Committee

Financial Planning

Annually, under legislation the Board is required to approve a balanced budget for the upcoming school year. Once again, the Board's financial decisions were informed with input and feedback from rights holders, representatives of the formal stakeholder groups, members of the public and staff. The Board approved 2024-2025 financial plan includes spending of nearly \$785 million next school year, and provides:

- Additional staffing to support students with key literacy, numeracy as well as critical and creative thinking skills
- More support for arts education focusing on the fine arts, drama, dance and music
- Funding to expand student access to technology/devices
- Support dedicated to digital literacy and students' safety online.

The 2024-2025 financial plan also includes supports for improvements through process simplification, digital infrastructure upgrades, staff training and user-centric service delivery, and to advance the District's recruitment and retention initiatives.

Capital Planning

In April, the Board received funding approval from the Ministry of Education and Child Care to build a new school in Olympic Village and expand Henry Hudson Elementary. The government will provide \$150 million for a new four-story school in Olympic Village to serve 630 students. It will include a neighbourhood learning centre, providing space for 60 school-age children in need of before- and after-school child care. The school will also feature an active rooftop, providing space for students to engage in various active or outdoor activities. The expansion project at Henry Hudson, with a funding approval of \$15 million, will add another six classrooms, more library space, additional resource rooms and a covered outdoor area for the recently completed seismically safe school. Through the expansion works, the school will have a capacity of 535 student seats.

The Board also approved capital plans for submission to the Ministry. This year, this Ministry approved several minor capital projects at six schools to provide for window replacement, roofing work, HVAC system projects, accessible playground equipment and kitchen upgrades.

In addition, the Board approved a five-year major capital plan includes several seismic mitigation program (SMP) requests and new school and school addition requests for consideration by the Ministry. Minor capital plan priorities were submitted to the Ministry in September and requests funding approval for accessible equipment (elevators, lifts and playground equipment), safety systems, heating and cooling upgrades, window replacement and roof upgrades as well as kitchen upgrades and equipment at 13 schools.

Advocacy

School boards in BC have a pivotal role as advocates for public education. Through work with elected officials at the local and provincial level, the Board highlighted key areas to enhance the education system, so it better serves students and society at large.

Leadership at the provincial level

One of the primary advocacy avenues for the Board is through the BCSTA through trustee academy, leadership sessions and its annual advocacy day.

In addition to the motion requesting baseline education workforce data (noted above), the Board also approved a second motion for submission to the BCSTA AGM seeking collective advocacy for inclusive education funding and for more support for early childhood educators (ECEs) and education assistants. This motion was also adopted at the provincial AGM in the spring. This BCSTA adopted motion was a key part of the provincial advocacy efforts by all school trustees and was included in BCSTA's advocacy plan ahead of the 2024 provincial election.This plan underscores BCSTA's commitment to improving public education across British Columbia through strategic advocacy on pivotal issues.

Advocating for Vancouver students, their families and communities

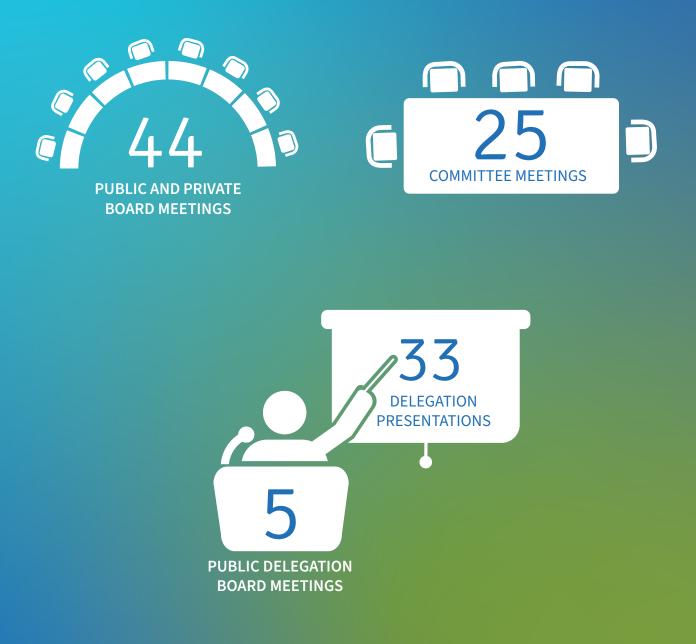
The Board also advocated for enhanced child care services in Vancouver, recognizing the important role these services play in the Vancouver community. The Board also developed an advocacy plan to guide VSB's advocacy efforts aimed at federal, provincial and local governments, as well as other outside organizations. Through targeted advocacy, the Board aims to ensure equitable and sufficient funding, enhance recruitment and retention, improve facilities and promote inclusive education.

The Board further worked with the Minister of Education and Child Care, members of the legislative assembly, City of Vancouver Mayor and Council and Board of Parks and Recreation to align our work thereby benefiting students, their families and school communities.

INTRODUCTION

Prior to the commencement of the election, the process for the election of the Board Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson will be approved at the public Board meeting by Board Resolution.

CHAIRPERSON AND VICE-CHAIRPERSON NOMINATION AND ELECTION PROCEDURE

The Secretary Treasurer will chair the meeting during the nomination and election process for Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson.

Upon completion of the nomination and election process for Board Chairperson, the Secretary Treasurer as Chairperson will proceed with the process for the nomination and election of Board Vice-Chairperson.

1. APPOINTMENT OF SCRUTINEERS

The Chairperson will call for a motion to appoint scrutineers. The motion will read as follows:

THAT ______and _____ be appointed scrutineers for the election of Board Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson.

2. NOMINATION PROCEDURE

The scrutineers will provide each trustee with **one** nomination ballot for Chairperson and **one** nomination ballot for Vice-Chairperson.

2.1 CHAIRPERSON NOMINATION

- i. The Chairperson will call for nominations by ballot, for Board Chairperson for a one-year term. Any trustee may be nominated for Board Chairperson.
 "I now call for nominations by ballot for the office of Board Chairperson for a one (1) year period ended November 2025."
- ii. Ballots will be collected by the scrutineers and the names of the trustees nominated for Board Chairperson shall be communicated to the Chairperson.



- iii. The Chairperson will ask each nominee whether they agree to let their name stand for election and if they want to speak to the nomination. Nominee speeches shall be brief with a maximum allotted time of 3 minutes per nominee.
- If there is only one nominee for the office, and that nominee accepts the nomination, the Chairperson declares that person the duly elected Chairperson of the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver), for a one (1) year period ended November 2025.

"I declare that trustee _______is the duly elected Chairperson of the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver), for a one (1) year period ended November 2025."

2.2 VICE-CHAIRPERSON NOMINATION

- The Chairperson will call for nominations by ballot, for Board Vice-Chairperson for a one-year term. Any trustee other than the elected Board Chairperson may be nominated for Board Vice-Chairperson.
 "I now call for nominations by ballot for the office of Board Vice-Chairperson for a one (1) year period ended November 2025."
- ii. Ballots will be collected by the scrutineers and the names of the trustees nominated for Board Vice-Chairperson shall be communicated to the Chairperson.
- iii. The Chairperson will ask each nominee whether they agree to let their name stand for election and if they want to speak to the nomination. Nominee speeches shall be brief with a maximum allotted time of 3 minutes per nominee.
- iv. If there is only one nominee for the office, and that nominee accepts the nomination, the Chairperson declares that person the duly elected Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver), for a one (1) year period ended November 2025.

"I declare that trustee _______is the duly elected Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver), for a one (1) year period ended November 2025."

3. ELECTION PROCEDURE - IN PERSON BOARD MEETING

This procedure is used if all trustees are present in person.

- (a) If more than one person is nominated, the Chairperson will call on scrutineers to distribute, collect and count the election ballots.
- (b) All trustees present at the meeting shall vote by secret ballot.
- (c) Scrutineers will report the results of each ballot only to the Chairperson of the meeting, who shall announce the Trustee who has received a clear majority of the votes cast.
- (d) The Trustee receiving the majority of votes cast shall be declared elected.

"I declare that trustee ________is the duly elected Chairperson [or Vice-Chairperson] of the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver), for a one (1) year period ended November 2025."

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- (e) If on the first ballot a nominee does not receive a clear majority the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes on the first ballot shall be dropped from the list and a second ballot, shall be held in like manner to the first ballot. If by reason of an equality of votes it is not possible to determine which name shall be dropped, then a special ballot shall be taken for that purpose.
- (f) If at the completion of the third ballot the results of the election cannot be declared because there is an equality of valid votes for 2 or more nominees and all nominees continue to let their name stand for election, the Chairperson will ask for a motion that election results be determined by lot.

THAT the results for the election of Chairperson [or Vice-Chairperson] will be determined by lot in accordance with the following:

- i. the name of each nominee is to be written on a separate piece of paper, as similar as possible to all other pieces prepared for the determination;
- ii. the pieces of paper are to be folded in a uniform manner in such a way that the names of the nominees are not visible;
- iii. the pieces of paper are to be placed in a container that is sufficiently large to allow them to be shaken for the purpose of making their distribution random, and the container is to be shaken for this purpose;
- iv. the Chairperson will direct a scrutineer to withdraw one paper;
- v. the Chairperson will declare elected the nominee whose name is on the paper that was drawn.
- (g) Upon completion of the nomination and election process for Board Chairperson and Board Vice-Chairperson the Chairperson will call for the following motion:

THAT the scrutineers destroy the ballots for the nomination of Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson and election of Chairperson [or Vice-Chairperson] [or Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson], and that the scrutineers are discharged.

- (h) The newly elected Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson will be invited to provide brief remarks.
- (i) The newly elected Chairperson will preside over the balance of the meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Board proceed to elect a new Board Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson following the nomination and election procedure.

1.2. Opening Remarks

STUDENT TRUSTEE REPORT

In this report, I will provide an update about the CANley Cup fundraiser, the annual VDSC leadership retreat, and other initiatives supporting student leadership and enhancing student engagement.

With the Canley Cup launching on November 1st, each participating school has begun promotional and fundraising efforts. Donation drives will be open until November 29th, and we look forward to reviewing the collective efforts of the students as a district in supporting the school communities and announcing the Canley Cup winners on December 10th.

At the beginning of the month, VDSC also released a video on our Instagram page (@vdscouncil) to summarise and promote the VSB Student Leadership Fund. The video has accumulated over 9,800 views to date, and VDSC is excited to continue raising awareness of this valuable opportunity for student initiatives.

On Tuesday, November 19th, VDSC held our annual retreat, during which council members engaged in a teambuilding and leadership workshop. The activities focused on enhancing collaboration, understanding the role and responsibility of student voice, and setting intentions to guide our efforts for the remainder of the school year.

INTRODUCTION

The Vancouver School Board (VSB) offers the International Baccalaureate (IB) Middle Years Programme (MYP) at three schools: Elsie Roy and Lord Roberts Elementary schools (grades 6-7), and King George Secondary school (grades 8-10). These schools provide both MYP and the B.C. curriculum.

Currently, MYP is not in compliance with IB requirements. An evaluation report by IB World identified several areas where significant investments in resources, staff training and program development are required to bring the program into compliance with IB standards. This includes an immediate investment of up to \$286,000 and ongoing annual funding of at least \$246,000 in each of the next three years.

At the same time, there has been a shift in the B.C. curriculum since 2016 where it now aligns more closely with the principles and philosophy of IB programs. As a result, there is now considerable overlap between the goals and teaching methodologies of the IB programs and the B.C. curriculum, reducing the distinctiveness that IB once offered.



At the Nov. 6, 2024, <u>Education Plan meeting</u>, staff presented a report about MYP. The report included information regarding the IB World MYP review and outlined the financial and logistical requirements for maintaining or closing MYP. It also provided detailed budget estimates, scheduling needs and engagement strategies to inform the Board's decision on the future of the MYP. The full report can be found on the <u>District's website</u>.

ENGAGEMENT TIMELINE

A Board decision about the future of MYP is required by December 1, 2024. There are three reasons for this.

- 1. To ensure families and students maintain the opportunity to participate in the cross-boundary and mini-school application process in December and January.
- 2. This timeline ensures minimal scheduling, staffing and budget disruptions.
- 3. The Board needs to decide the future of MYP by December 1, 2024, as IB World mandated that the District begin implementing the recommendations outlined in its evaluation report by this date to retain its IB accreditation. For the Board to decide by December 1, 2024, this engagement report must be presented at the November 25, 2024, public Board meeting.

It is important to note the 2024 IB evaluation report was shared with VSB in the summer of 2024 and mandated implementation of the recommendations begin by December 1, 2024. Recognizing the summer break and the focus on back-to-school in September, the earliest the District could begin engaging with impacted community members was in October.

The following timeline was established to structure the engagement process with impacted community members, ensuring their feedback helps inform the Board's decision.

PARTICIPANT OUTREACH

Before the Board makes a decision, staff gathered feedback from impacted community members. To ensure an inclusive process, VSB reached out to a diverse range of participants, focusing on those most impacted by the potential changes to MYP. Engagement efforts included:

 - Vancouver Elementary Principal and Vice-Principal Association (VEPVPA)
 - Vancouver Secondary Teachers' Association (VSTA)
- MYP educators at Elsie Roy, Lord Roberts and King George schools (including principals, viceprincipals, teachers and support staff)
- PAC Executives from Elsie Roy, Lord Roberts and King George schools

ENGAGEMENT RESULTS

Before the engagement activities began, District staff shared information about MYP, the evaluation report by IB World, details of the necessary investment to keep the program, a comparison of curricular differences and overlaps between MYP and the B.C. curriculum and outlined options for the future of MYP. The MYP presentation was grounded in the expertise and experience of VSB educators with both MYP and B.C. curricula. This step made sure participants were well-informed and equipped to engage meaningfully. After the presentation, the engagement commenced, with activities and questions tailored to suit the specific participant group, ensuring relevance and meaningful discussions.

The following details a high-level summary of what we heard. See the full engagement summary report here.

The engagement process for evaluating the future of MYP highlighted significant alignment and notable differences among various groups. The majority of educators and stakeholders, as well as some families and PAC executives, shared concerns about MYP including its overlap with the B.C. curriculum, the strain on teacher workloads, compliance costs and challenges in maintaining equitable access for all students,



particularly those with disabilities and diverse abilities. A significant proportion of students did not fully understand the purpose or impact of MYP. A significant number of families highlighted MYP's potential for academic rigour and international recognition, widely recognizing this as a benefit for student learning and development. There was widespread agreement that the program requires significant financial and resource investments to meet IB compliance, with many stakeholders questioning if these costs are justified given the perceived redundancy with the B.C. curriculum.

RECOMMENDATIONS

While MYP has operated as a school-based program since its inception in the early 2000s, a Board motion from September 19, 2011, states *"That the International Baccalaureate (IB) Middle Years Program in the King George Family of Schools and the Primary Years Program at Southlands, be designated District Programs."* A review of Board minutes shows this decision was intended to secure ongoing District financial support for these IB programs, in addition to the standard school-based budget allocated to each school. As a result of this motion, MYP is subject to <u>Administrative Procedure - 220 District Programs</u>. (Choice) which requires Board approval should there be a decision to discontinue a program.

The following options were considered during the engagement period.

Option 1: Maintain MYP

To maintain MYP, an additional budget allocation of up to \$286,040 will need to be made for this school year. This additional allocation will fund the required staff training, policy updates, collaboration time, curriculum planning and the creation of the Programme Development Plan. Additional budget allocations will need to be made for future years to ensure compliance with training requirements and program fidelity. These cost estimates may need to be adjusted in future years based on actual costs.

Currently, MYP is designated as a District program as per the Board motion in 2011 and has run as a schoolbased program. These schools are operating over capacity, and this means MYP is only available to incatchment students and is not able to operate as a District program.

Under this option the recommendation to the Board would be that the Board allocate additional funds of up to \$286,040 for the 2024-2025 school year, up to \$264,920 for the 2025-2026 school year, up to \$538,740 for the 2026-2027 school year and up to \$264,920 for the 2027-2028 school year, and designate the Middle Years Programme as a school-based program.

Option 2: Close MYP

Given the substantial overlap between the B.C. curriculum and MYP, closing MYP will not significantly impact student learning outcomes. Both the B.C. curriculum and MYP focus on inquiry-based learning, critical thinking and personalized learning approaches, ensuring that students continue to receive a high-quality education aligned with these principles. The B.C. curriculum has been designed to foster similar skills and competencies as the IB framework: both emphasize self-awareness, critical thinking and responsible citizenship.

The most noticeable change for students and families will be a shift from the IB 7-point grading scale to a 4-point scale for report cards. This change aligns with what families are already familiar with in grades k-5.

VSB Vancouver School Board

MYP is not a pre-requisite for the IB Diploma Programme and is not given any preferred consideration in mini school program applications, therefore closing it will not have any negative impacts for students wishing to apply to these programs.

Closing the program will also help address current challenges related to staffing, scheduling, recruitment, retention and on-going specialized IB required training. Funds that are currently allocated to MYP can be re-distributed to other learning priorities in the District in alignment with the <u>Education Plan</u>.

As MYP was designated a District program in the September 19, 2011, Board motion, closing the program will require a Board motion as per <u>Policy 2 Role of the Board</u>.

Under this option the recommendation to the Board would be that the Board close the Middle Years Programme effective June 27, 2025, and direct staff to develop a closure plan.

During the engagement most stakeholders and educators expressed support for the discontinuation of MYP while most families expressed a desire for the program to continue.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Board close the Middle Years Programme effective June 27, 2025, and direct staff to develop a closure plan.

A master PowerPoint presentation detailing the flow of the agenda was shown throughout the meeting, a copy of which is on file with the meeting agenda.

1. <u>Statement of Financial Information (SOFI)</u>

The Executive Director of Finance presented a report dated November 13, 2024, entitled, **Statement of Financial Information.** The report includes information on the Statement of Financial Information (SOFI) for School District No. 39 (Vancouver) for the period of July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024. He outlined the items included in the SOFI as required by Section 2 of the *Financial Information Act,* including audited financial statements, schedule of debts, guarantee and indemnity agreements, severance agreements, renumeration for employees earning greater than \$75,000, and identification of suppliers of goods and services greater than \$25,000.

Committee members, trustees and stakeholder representatives provided feedback and staff answered questions and provided clarification on various points.

There was consensus from committee trustees to forward the following recommendation to the Board for approval:

That the Board approve the Statement of Financial Information for the period July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024, for the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver).

2 Financial Planning Process

The Secretary Treasurer presented a report dated November 13, 2024, entitled **2025-2026 Financial Planning Process.** She provided background information on provincial policy and legislative requirements that must be considered when the District's financial planning process is created. She noted that a balanced budget must adopted by bylaw and submitted to the Ministry

of Education and Child Care by June 30 each year for the next fiscal year. Lastly, she reviewed the goals of the engagement process, and the financial plan engagement timeline.

Committee members, trustees, rights holder representatives and stakeholder representatives provided feedback and staff answered questions and provided clarification on various points.

There was consensus from committee trustees to forward the following recommendation to the Board for approval:

That the Board of Education approve the 2025-2026 Financial Planning Process.

3. 2024-25 First Quarter Financial Update

The Executive Director of Finance presented a report dated November 13, 2024, entitled **2024-25** *First Quarter Financial Update.* The report includes information on the financial results of the operating fund for the three months ended September 30, 2024, compared to the budget for the same period.

He reviewed the year-to-date results compared to budget amounts and provided background information on variances identified. The District reported an operating fund deficit of \$9.65M compared to a budgeted deficit of \$8.47M, these financial results are due primarily to timing differences between when the operating grant received and when expenses are incurred throughout the fiscal year.

Committee members, trustees, rights holder representatives and stakeholder representatives provided feedback and staff answered questions and provided clarification on various points.

INTRODUCTION

In accordance with Section 2(3) of the *Financial Information Act* a school district must, within six months after the end of each fiscal year, prepare a statement of financial information (SOFI) for that fiscal year. Section 2(1) of the *Financial Information Act* directs that the statement of financial information be prepared in a form and containing information prescribed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. This requirement is detailed in *Financial Information Regulation 371/93*.

This report contains a recommendation from the Finance and Personnel Committee.

BACKGROUND

Financial Information Regulation 371/93 provides that the statements of financial information required by Section 2 of the *Financial Information Act* must be prepared in the form set out in Schedule 1 of the regulation. In addition to the audited financial statements the following additional schedules are also included, as stipulated in the Regulation:

- Schedule of debts
- Schedule of guarantee and indemnity agreements
- Schedule of employees earning greater than \$75,000, the total remuneration paid to the employee and the total amount paid for the employee's expenses and a consolidated total of remuneration paid to all other employees
- Schedule of severance agreement
- Schedule identifying suppliers of goods and services greater than \$25,000 and a consolidated total of all other payments made to suppliers of goods and services during the year

The financial statements contained in the SOFI report have been prepared by management in accordance with the accounting requirements of British Columbia Treasury Board Regulations 257/2010 and 198/2011 as directed by Section 23.1 of the *Budget Transparency and Accountability Act of British Columbia*. The financial statements are management's responsibility and have been prepared objectively and with integrity. Management is also responsible for implementing and maintaining a system of internal controls.

VSB Vancouver School Board

The external auditors, KPMG LLP, conducted an independent examination, in accordance with generally accepted Canadian auditing standards, and expressed their opinion on the financial statements that are included in the SOFI Report. As stated, the *Financial Information Act* requires additional schedules be included as part of the SOFI Report. However, the external auditors' examination does not extend to these other schedules.

DISCUSSION

Financial Information Regulation 371/93 prescribes the following definitions for the information included in the SOFI Report:

<u>Debt</u>

Long term debts secured by debt instruments such as debentures, mortgages, and bonds.

Guarantee and Indemnity Agreements

Any financial guarantee and indemnity agreements in force which required government approval prior to being given under the *Indemnities and Guarantees Regulation*.

<u>Severance</u>

An agreement made in lieu of a notice period, between an employee and employer, that may provide for one or more of the following:

- 1. A lump sum payment or periodic payments.
- 2. Payment based on the employee's base salary, benefits, and length of service.
- 3. Compensation, except compensation in the form of an early retirement incentive plan.

Remuneration

The amounts listed under the column "remuneration" are defined as follows:

compensation means the sum of gross salary plus the value of benefits, where the employee's remuneration exceeds \$75,000.

remuneration includes any form of salary, wages, bonuses, gratuities, taxable benefits, payment into trust or any form of income deferral paid by the corporation to the employee or on behalf of the employee during the fiscal year being reported upon, whether or not such remuneration is reported under the Income Tax Act (Canada) and does not include anything payable under a severance agreement.

Employee Expenses

The amount reported under expenses includes travel expenses, memberships, tuition, relocation, vehicle leases, extraordinary hiring expenses, registration fees and similar amounts paid directly to an employee, or to a third party on behalf of the employee, and which has not been included in remuneration and is not limited to expenses that are generally perceived as perquisites, or bestowing personal benefit, and may include expenditures required for employees to perform their job functions.

It is important to note that the report does not include any recovery of expenses. If an employee reimburses the District for any portion of an expenditure, the reimbursed amount is not deducted in the

SOFI report. If an external grant reimburses the District for a portion (or all) of the costs, the gross amount of the expenditure is reported, and the recovery is not offset.

Supplier Payments

The Act defines the amounts to be included for payments made for the provision of goods or services as follows:

The schedule of payments for the provision of goods and services must list the aggregate amount paid by the corporation during the fiscal year for the supply of goods or services rendered if the aggregate amount paid to each individual supplier exceeds \$25,000.

A significant portion of the supplier payments represents contributions to pension and employee benefit plans and contractors for capital projects. Payments for employer contributions for statutory deductions (EI, CPP etc.) and employee benefit plans are included in this schedule.

CONCLUSION

Financial Information Regulation 371/93 requires that a statement of financial information prepared by a corporation, must be approved by its Board. The attached report complies with the disclosure requirements of the *Financial Information Act* and upon approval by the Board, it will be filed with the Ministry of Education and Child Care as required.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Board approve the Statement of Financial Information for the period July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024, for the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver).

1 Authority and Purpose

The School District, established on April 12, 1946, operates under authority of the *School Act* of British Columbia as a corporation under the name of "The Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver)", and operates as "School District No. 39 (Vancouver)." A Board of Education (Board) elected for a four-year term governs the School District. The School District provides educational programs to students enrolled in schools in the District, and is principally funded by the Province of British Columbia through the Ministry of Education and Child Care ("MECC"). School District No. 39 (Vancouver) is exempt from federal and provincial income taxes.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Section 23.1 of the *Budget Transparency and Accountability Act of the Province of British Columbia*. This Section requires that the financial statements be prepared in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards except in regard to the accounting for government transfers as set out in Notes 2(f) and 2(n).

In November 2011, Treasury Board provided a directive through Restricted Contributions Regulation 198/2011 providing direction for the reporting of restricted contributions whether they are received or receivable by the School District before or after this regulation was in effect.

As noted in Notes 2(f) and 2(n), Section 23.1 of the *Budget Transparency and Accountability Act* and its related regulations require the School District to recognize government transfers for the acquisition of capital assets into revenue on the same basis as the related amortization expense. As these transfers do not contain stipulations that create a liability, Canadian public sector accounting standards would require these grants to be fully recognized into revenue.

b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and securities that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and that are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. These cash equivalents generally have a maturity of three months or less at acquisition and are held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments rather than for investing.

c) Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are measured at amortized cost and shown net of allowance for doubtful accounts.

d) Portfolio Investments

The School District has investments in Guaranteed Investment Certificates (GIC's), Short-term Investment Certificate and bonds that have a period to maturity of greater than three months at the time of acquisition. These investments are not quoted in an active market and are reported at amortized cost, and the associated transaction costs are added to the carrying value of these investments upon initial recognition. Transaction costs are incremental costs directly attributable to the acquisition or issuance of a financial asset.

e) Unearned Revenue

Unearned revenue includes tuition fees received for courses to be delivered in future periods, receipt of proceeds for services or products to be delivered in a future period and the remaining balance of a 99-year ground lease. For tuition fees and the receipt of proceeds for services or products to be delivered, revenue will be recognized in that future period when the courses, services, or products are provided. For the ground lease, revenue will be recognized on a straight-line basis over the remaining term of the lease.

f) Deferred Revenue and Deferred Capital Revenue

Deferred revenue includes contributions received with stipulations that meet the description of restricted contributions in the Restricted Contributions Regulation 198/2011 issued by Treasury Board. When restrictions are met, deferred revenue is recognized as revenue in the fiscal year in a manner consistent with the circumstances and evidence used to support the initial recognition of the contributions received as a liability, as detailed in Note 2(n).

Funding received for the acquisition of depreciable tangible capital assets is recorded as deferred capital revenue and amortized over the life of the asset acquired as revenue in the statement of operations. This accounting treatment is not consistent with the requirements of Canadian public sector accounting standards which require that government transfers be recognized as revenue when approved by the transferor and eligibility criteria have been met, unless the transfer contains a stipulation that creates a liability, in which case the transfer is recognized as revenue over the period that the liability is extinguished.

g) Employee Future Benefits

i) Post-employment benefits

The School District provides certain post-employment benefits, including vested and non-vested benefits, for certain employees pursuant to certain contracts and union agreements. The School District accrues its obligations and related costs, including both vested and non-vested benefits under employee future benefit plans. Benefits include vested sick leave, accumulating non-vested sick leave, early retirement, retirement/severance, vacation, overtime and death benefits.

The benefits cost is actuarially determined using the projected unit credit method pro-rated on service and using management's best estimate of expected salary escalation, termination rates, retirement rates and mortality.

The discount rate used to measure obligations is based on the cost of borrowing. The cumulative unrecognized actuarial gains and losses are amortized over the expected average remaining service lifetime of active employees covered under the plan.

The most recent valuation of the obligation was performed at March 31, 2022 and projected to March 31, 2025. The next valuation will be performed at March 31, 2025 for use at June 30, 2025. For the purposes of determining the financial position of the plans and the employee future benefit costs, a measurement date of March 31 was adopted for all periods subsequent to July 1, 2004.

i) Pension Plans

The School District and its employees make contributions to the Teachers' Pension Plan and Municipal Pension Plan. The plans are multi-employer plans where assets and obligations are not separated. The costs are expensed as incurred.

- h) Tangible Capital Assets
- Tangible capital assets acquired or constructed are recorded at cost which includes amounts that are directly related to the acquisition, design, construction, development, improvement or betterment of the assets. Cost also includes overhead directly attributable to construction, as well as interest costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of the asset.
- Donated tangible capital assets are recorded at their fair market value on the date of donation, except in circumstances where fair value cannot be reasonably determined in which case the assets are recognized at nominal value. Transfers of capital assets from related parties are recorded at carrying value.
- Work-in-progress is recorded as an acquisition to the applicable asset class at substantial completion.
- Amortization of tangible capital assets commences when the asset is available for productive use.
- Tangible capital assets are written down to residual value when conditions indicate they no longer contribute to the ability of the School District to provide services or when the value of future economic benefits associated with the sites and buildings are less than their net book value. The write-downs are accounted for as expenses in the Statement of Operations.
- Buildings that are demolished or destroyed are written-off.
- Works of art, historic assets and other intangible assets are not recorded as assets in these financial statements.
- The cost, less residual value, of tangible capital assets (excluding sites), is amortized on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the asset. It is management's responsibility to determine the appropriate useful lives for tangible capital assets. These useful lives are reviewed on a regular basis or if significant events indicate the need to revise.

Estimated useful life is as follows:

Buildings	40 years
Furniture & Equipment	10 years
Vehicles	10 years
Computer Software	5 years
Computer Hardware	5 years

i) Asset Retirement Obligations

A liability is recognized when, as at the financial reporting date:

- (a) there is a legal obligation to incur retirement costs in relation to a tangible capital asset;
- (b) the past transaction or event giving rise to the liability has occurred;
- (c) it is expected that future economic benefits will be given up; and
- (d) a reasonable estimate of the amount can be made.

The liability for the removal of asbestos and other hazardous material in several of the buildings owned by the School District has been initially recognized using the modified retroactive method. The liability has been measured at current cost as the timing and amounts of future cash flows cannot be estimated. The resulting costs have been capitalized into the carrying amount of tangible capital assets and are being amortized on the same basis as the related tangible capital asset (see Note 2h). Assumptions used in the calculations are reviewed annually.

j) Capital Leases

Leases that, from the point of view of the lessee, transfer substantially all the benefits and risks incident to ownership of the property to the School District are considered capital leases. These are accounted for as an asset and an obligation. Capital lease obligations are recorded at the present value of the minimum lease payments excluding executory costs, e.g., insurance or maintenance costs. The discount rate used to determine the present value of the lease payments is the lower of the School District's rate for incremental borrowing or the interest rate implicit in the lease.

All other leases are accounted for as operating leases and the related payments are charged to expenses as incurred.

k) Prepaid Expenses

Prepaid annual maintenance contracts, prepaid rent and membership dues are included as a prepaid expense and stated at acquisition cost, and are charged to expense over the periods expected to benefit from it.

I) Supplies Inventory

Supplies inventory held for consumption or use are recorded at the lower of historical cost and replacement cost.

m) Funds and Reserves

Certain amounts, as approved by the Board, are set aside in accumulated surplus for future operating and capital purposes. Transfers to and from funds and reserves are an adjustment to the respective fund when approved.

n) Revenue Recognition

Revenues are recorded on an accrual basis in the period in which the transactions or events occurred that gave rise to the revenues, the amounts are considered to be collectible and can be reasonably estimated.

Contributions received, or where eligibility criteria have been met, are recognized as revenue except where the contribution meets the criteria for deferral as described below. Eligibility criteria are the criteria that the School District has to meet in order to receive the contributions, including authorization by the transferring government.

For contributions subject to a legislative or contractual stipulation or restriction as to their use, revenue is recognized as follows:

- non-capital contributions for specific purposes are recorded as deferred revenue and recognized as revenue in the year related expenses are incurred;
- contributions restricted for site acquisitions are recorded as revenue when the sites are purchased; and
- contributions restricted for tangible capital assets acquisitions other than sites are recorded as deferred capital revenue and amortized over the useful life of the related assets.

Donated tangible capital assets other than sites are recorded at fair market value and amortized over the useful lives of the assets. Donated sites are recorded as revenue at fair market value when received or receivable.

The accounting treatment for restricted contributions that are government transfers is not consistent with the requirements of Canadian public sector accounting standards which require that governments transfers be recognized as revenue when approved by the transferor and eligibility criteria have been met, unless the transfer contains a stipulation that meets the criteria for liability recognition, in which case the transfer is recognized over the period that the liability is extinguished.

Revenue from transactions with performance obligations is recognized when (or as) the performance obligation is satisfied (by providing the promised goods or services to a payer).

Revenue from transactions with no performance obligations is recognized when the School District:

- (a) has the authority to claim or retain an inflow of economic resources; and
- (b) identifies a past transaction or event that gives rise to the asset.

Investment income is reported in the period earned. When required by the funding party or related Act, investment income earned on deferred revenue is added to the deferred revenue balance.

o) Expenditures

Expenses are reported on an accrual basis. The cost of all goods consumed and services received during the year is expensed.

Categories of Salaries

- Principals, Vice-Principals, and Directors of Instruction employed under an administrative officer contract are categorized as Principals and Vice-Principals.
- The Superintendent, Deputy Superintendent, Associate Superintendents, Secretary-Treasurer, Directors, Trustees and other employees excluded from union contracts are categorized as Other Professionals.

Allocation of Costs

- Operating expenses are reported by function, program, and object. Whenever possible expenditures are determined by actual identification. Additional costs pertaining to specific instructional programs, such as special and aboriginal education, are allocated to these programs. All other costs are allocated to related programs.
- Actual salaries of personnel assigned to two or more functions or programs are allocated based on the time spent in each function and program. School-based clerical salaries are allocated to school administration and partially to other programs to which they may be assigned. Principals' and Vice-Principals' salaries are allocated to school administration and may be partially allocated to other programs to recognize their other responsibilities.
- Employee benefits and allowances are allocated to the same programs, and in the same proportions, as the individual's salary.
- Supplies and services are allocated based on actual program identification.
- p) Financial Instruments

A contract establishing a financial instrument creates, at its inception, rights and obligations to receive or deliver economic benefits. The financial assets and financial liabilities portray these rights and obligations in the financial statements. The School District recognizes a financial instrument when it becomes a party to a financial instrument contract.

Financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, portfolio investments, accounts receivable, accounts payable and other current liabilities.

Except for portfolio investments in equity instruments quoted in an active market, or items designated by management, that are recorded at fair value, all financial assets and liabilities are recorded at cost or amortized cost and the associated transaction costs are added to the carrying value of these investments upon initial recognition. Transaction costs are incremental costs directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of a financial asset or a financial liability.

The School District has not invested in any equity instruments that are actively quoted in the market and has not designated any financial instruments to be recorded at fair value. The School District has no instruments in the fair value category.

For financial instruments measured using amortized cost, the effective interest rate method is used to determine interest revenue or expense. Interest and dividends attributable to financial instruments are reported in the statement of operations.

p) Financial Instruments (continued)

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the School District is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from its financial instruments. The fair values of these financial instruments approximate their carrying value, unless otherwise noted.

All financial assets except derivatives are tested annually for impairment. When financial assets are impaired, impairment losses are recorded in the statement of operations. A write-down of a portfolio investment to reflect a loss in value is not reversed for a subsequent increase in value.

q) Liability for Contaminated Sites

Contaminated sites are a result of contamination being introduced into air, soil, water or sediment of a chemical, organic or radioactive material or live organism that exceeds an environmental standard. The liability is recorded net of any expected recoveries. A liability for remediation of contaminated sites is recognized when a site is not in productive use and all the following criteria are met:

- an environmental standard exists;
- contamination exceeds the environmental standard;
- the School District:
 - \circ is directly responsible; or
 - accepts responsibility;
- it is expected that future economic benefits will be given up; and
- a reasonable estimate of the amount can be made.

The liability is recognized as management's estimate of the cost of post-remediation including operation, maintenance and monitoring that are an integral part of the remediation strategy for a contaminated site.

r) Measurement Uncertainty

Preparation of financial statements in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note 2(a) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that impact reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates relate to the potential impairment of assets, liabilities for contaminated sites, rates for amortization and estimated employee future benefits. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

- s) Adoption of New Accounting Standards
 - On July 1, 2023, the School District adopted Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standard PS 3400, *Revenue* ("PS 3400"). The new accounting standard establishes a single framework to categorize revenue to enhance the consistency of revenue recognition and its measurement. Under the new accounting standard, there are two categories of revenue – exchange and non-exchange. If the transaction gives rise to one or more performance obligations, it is an exchange transaction. If no performance obligations are present, it is a non-exchange transaction. Management has assessed the impact of adopting PS 3400 on the financial statements of the School District and has found no adjustments based on the requirements of the standard.

s) Adoption of New Accounting Standards (continued)

- On July 1, 2023, the School District adopted Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standard PS 3160, *Public Private Partnerships* ("PS 3160"). The new accounting standard addresses the recognition, measurement, presentation, and disclosure of infrastructure procured by public sector entities through certain types of public private partnership arrangements. Management has assessed the impact of adopting PS 3160 on the financial statements of the School District and has found that at present no such items meet the criteria to be recognized as a public private partnership.
- On July 1, 2023, the School District adopted Public Sector Guideline PSG-8, Purchased Intangibles, applied on a prospective basis ("PSG-8"). PSG-8 defines purchased intangibles as identifiable non-monetary economic resources without physical substance acquired through an arm's length exchange transaction between knowledgeable, willing parties who are under no compulsion to act. Intangibles acquired through a transfer, contribution, or inter-entity transaction, are not purchased intangibles. Management has assessed the impact of adopting PSG-8 and found that at present no such items meet the criteria to be recognized as a purchased intangible.

3 Other Receivables

Other Receivables include an amount for unpaid ground lease revenue. Included in Rentals and Leases is \$56.36 million which is reported under Allowance for Doubtful Accounts due to uncertainty surrounding the collectability of this amount (refer to Note 18, Contingent Assets for additional information).

As at June 30, 2024 there was work in progress of \$71,270,110 (2023 – \$130,074,654) included in Buildings and Furniture & Equipment and not being amortized.

Included within tangible capital assets purchases is \$359,517 (2023 – \$342,510) of assets acquired through capital lease.

13 Employee Pension Plans

The School District and its employees contribute to the Teachers' Pension Plan and Municipal Pension Plan (jointly trusteed pension plans). The boards of trustees for these plans, representing plan members and employers, are responsible for administering the pension plans, including investing assets and administering benefits. The plans are multi-employer defined benefit pension plans. Basic pension benefits are based on a formula. As at December 31, 2023, the Teachers' Pension Plan has about 51,000 active members and approximately 42,000 retired members. As of December 31, 2023, the Municipal Pension Plan has about 256,000 active members, including approximately 31,000 from School Districts.

Every three years, an actuarial valuation is performed to assess the financial position of the plans and adequacy of plan funding. The actuary determines an appropriate combined employer and member contribution rate to fund the plans. The actuary's calculated contribution rate is based on the entry-age normal cost method, which produces the long-term rate of member and employer contributions sufficient to provide benefits for average future entrants to the plans. This rate may be adjusted for the amortization of any actuarial funding surplus and will be adjusted for the amortization of any unfunded actuarial liability.

The most recent actuarial valuation of the Teachers' Pension Plan as at December 31, 2020, indicated a \$1,584 million surplus for basic pension benefits on a going concern basis.

The most recent actuarial valuation for the Municipal Pension Plan as at December 31, 2021, indicated a \$3,761 million funding surplus for basic pension benefits on a going concern basis.

The School District paid \$51,103,565 (2023 – \$46,976,307) for employer contributions to these plans in the year ended June 30, 2024.

The next valuation for the Teachers' Pension Plan will be as at December 31, 2023 with results available in late 2024. The next valuation for the Municipal Pension Plan will be as at December 31, 2024, with results available in 2025.

Employers participating in the plans record their pension expense as the amount of employer contributions made during the fiscal year (defined contribution pension plan accounting). This is because the plans record accrued liabilities and accrued assets for each plan in aggregate, resulting in no consistent and reliable basis for allocating the obligation, assets and cost to individual employers participating in the plans.

The School District has entered into a number of multiple-year contracts for the delivery of services and the construction of tangible capital assets. These contractual obligations will become liabilities in the future when the terms of the contracts are met.

16 Contingent Assets

In fiscal year ended June 30, 2019, the School District entered into an agreement with BC Hydro for the sale of an underground air parcel at Lord Roberts Annex for the construction of an electrical substation. As a result of that sale, a contingent contractual right exists in the form of a construction lease. The issuance of the construction lease is dependent on BC Hydro receiving a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity from the British Columbia Utilities Commission for the construction of the substation.

In January 2022, the School District received an arbitration award regarding the annual ground lease rent for the site on which Kingsgate Mall occupies. The School District has invoiced the tenant annual rent based on the arbitration ruling. The tenant has appealed the arbitration decision and is paying a lower amount of rent. The collectability of the amount invoiced is dependent on the outcome of the appeal.

Contingent assets are not recorded in the financial statements.

17 Contingent Liabilities

In the ordinary course of operations, the School District has legal proceedings brought against it. It is the opinion of management that final determination of these claims will not have a material effect on the financial position or operations of the School District.

The School District is involved in ongoing legal proceedings initiated by the Conseil Scolaire Francophone de la Colombie-Britannique (the "Conseil") against His Majesty the King in Right of the Province of British Columbia, the MECC, and the School District. The proceedings are related, in part, to the Conseil's claim that it is entitled to the transfer of specific school sites from the School District to the Conseil. The Conseil has also claimed that there should be court orders overriding the School District's school closure and surplus disposal policies and compelling MECC to exercise powers under the School Act to require the transfer of such school sites.

The Conseil filed a Notice of Civil Claim on December 22, 2020, initiating the lawsuit and seeking the transfer of the Queen Elizabeth Annex (QEA) to the Conseil. The Conseil filed its Third Amended Notice of Civil Claim on August 26, 2022, expanding the relief sought to include additional sites in Vancouver and other communities. On July 28, 2023, the Conseil filed its Fourth Amended Notice of Civil Claim, seeking the transfer of the QEA site, the Laurier Annex site, and the Dr. A.R. Lord site.

An estimate of the costs to defend the legal case are reported under Accumulated Operating Appropriated Surplus as Unfunded Litigation Expenses. The outcome of these legal proceedings is uncertain, and the financial impact on the School District cannot be determined at this time. 17 Contingent Liabilities (continued)

According to a directive from MECC, funding remedies through the CEF require an agreement with the school district's teachers' associations. As of June 30, 2024, VSB had not secured agreements with the teachers' associations, making both the amount and likelihood of a payout indeterminable.

18 Budget Figures

Budget figures reflect the amended annual budget approved by the Board on February 28, 2024. The School District has elected to present the amended annual budget as it reflects a budget based on funding as a result of final enrollment numbers versus estimated annual projections. 21 Economic Dependence

The operations of the School District are dependent on continued funding from MECC and various governmental agencies to carry out its programs. These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

22 Related Party Transactions

The School District is related through common ownership to all Province of British Columbia ministries, agencies, school districts, health authorities, colleges, universities and crown corporations. The School District is also related to key management personnel who have the authority and responsibility for planning, directing and controlling the activities of the School District. The key management personnel are the Board of Education, Superintendent of Schools and the Secretary Treasurer. All transactions with these entities, unless disclosed separately, are considered to be in the normal course of operations and are recorded at the exchange amount.

23 Risk Management

The School District has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments: credit risk, market risk and liquidity risk.

The Board ensures that the School District has identified its risks and ensures that management monitors and controls them.

23 Risk Management (continued)

a) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to an institution if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. Such risks arise principally from certain financial assets held consisting of cash, amounts receivable and investments.

It is management's opinion that the School District is not exposed to significant credit risk associated with its cash deposits and investments as they are held by recognized British Columbia institutions and the School District invests solely in guaranteed investment certificates, term deposits, Senior Government Bonds and the Central Deposit Program of BC.

b) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk is comprised of currency risk and interest rate risk.

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the foreign exchange rates.

It is management's opinion that the School District is not exposed to significant currency risk, as amounts held and purchases made in foreign currency are insignificant.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the market interest rates. The School District is exposed to interest rate risk through its investments. It is management's opinion that the School District is not exposed to significant interest rate risk because it invests solely in guaranteed investment certificates, term deposits, and Senior Government Bonds.

c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the School District will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they become due.

The School District manages liquidity risk by continually monitoring actual and forecasted cash flows from operations and anticipated investing activities to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the School District's reputation.

Risk management and insurance services for all School Districts in British Columbia are provided by the Risk Management Branch of the Ministry of Finance. There have been no changes to risk exposure from 2023 related to credit, market or liquidity risks.

School District Statement of Financial Information (SOFI)

EXPLANATION OF DIFFERENCES TO AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

As the SOFI is reported on a cash basis and the audited financial statements of the Board of Education of School District No. 39 (Vancouver) are prepared on an accrual basis, differences may exist between these separate sets of statements.

The salaries paid to employees as well as the payments disbursed to suppliers for goods and services and employee benefit premiums are disclosed on the audited financial statements as expenses, net revenues, capitalized costs, or changes in accounts receivable and accounts payable.

Differences between the audited financial statements (Statement 2 – Statement of Operations) and the combined totals of the Schedule of Remuneration and Expenses are primarily as follows:

- Remuneration includes any form of salary, wages, taxable benefits, payment into trust or any form of income deferral paid by the Board to an employee but does not include anything payable under a severance agreement.
- Remuneration for individual employees can include payouts for vacation, retirement allowances, and compensatory time not taken in addition to regular salary and taxable benefits for auto allowances for employees who regularly use their personal vehicles for school district business.
- Salary and benefits amounts recovered from third parties are not deducted from remuneration for SOFI purposes.
- Expenses include travel expenses, memberships, tuition, relocation, vehicle leases, registration fees and similar amounts paid directly to an employee, or to a third party on behalf of an employee, and which have not been included in remuneration.
- Employee benefits and overhead costs are allocated to the same programs, and in the same proportions as the individual's salary, but are not included in remuneration for SOFI purposes.
- The taxable benefits are included in the Remuneration column of the Schedule of Remuneration and Expenses. The same amount is included in the Schedule of Payments Made for the Provision of Goods or Services for payments made to benefit carriers.

Differences between the audited financial statements (Statement 2 – Statement of Operations and the Schedule of Payments Made for the Provision of Goods or Services are primarily as follows:

- Payments made for the provision of goods and services include all payments made from operating, special purpose, and capital funds for the supply of goods and services.
- Supplier payments include amounts deducted from employees' pay for tax remittances, contributions to pension and employee benefit plans (including the employees' share of contributions), union dues, and contractors for capital projects.
- The list of payments to suppliers may include 100% of sales taxes paid, whereas the expenditures in the financial statements are shown net of the GST rebate.
- Payments to suppliers may be reported on the financial statements as Prepaid Expenses, Tangible Capital Assets, or Services and Supplies, as appropriate.
- The schedule may include expenditures which are wholly or partially recovered or reimbursed from other organizations, thereby reducing the amount reported in the operating expenditures within the financial statements.

INTRODUCTION

The Board of Education is responsible, through the Superintendent of Schools, for overseeing the educational and operational activities of the District and for all statutory requirements of provincial legislation to implement educational standards and policies. The approval of the Annual Budget is one of those responsibilities under the *School Act*, specifically school districts must annually approve, by bylaw, a balanced budget for the next fiscal year and submit it to the Ministry of Education and Child Care by June 30 of the current fiscal year. In addition, under Section 9.1 of Board Policy 2, the Board must approve the budget process and timeline at the outset of the budget process.

On November 13, 2024, the Finance and Personnel Committee reviewed the financial plan development process and timeline document and recommended that the 2025-2026 Financial Planning Process be approved by the Board at the November 25, 2024 Board meeting.

This report contains a recommendation from the Finance and Personnel Committee.

BACKGROUND

The school district is required to prepare and submit budgets to the Minister of Education and Child Care, in the form, with the information, and at the time required by the Minister (see Appendix A). The annual budget must be prepared in accordance with the <u>Accounting Practices Order</u>, Section 23.1 of the <u>Budget Transparency and Accountability Act</u>, Regulations <u>257/2010</u> and <u>198/2011</u> issued by the Province of BC Treasury Board the <u>Financial Planning and Reporting Policy</u> and the <u>K-12 Accumulated</u> <u>Operating Surplus Policy</u>.

The school district reports revenues and expenses under three separate funds as described below.

OPERATING FUND: The operating fund includes operating grants and other revenue used to fund instructional programs, school and district administration, facilities operations, maintenance and transportation.

SPECIAL PURPOSE FUND: The special purpose fund is comprised of separate funds established to track revenue and expenditures received from the Ministry of Education and Child Care and other sources that have restrictions on how they may be spent (e.g. Classroom Enhancement Fund, Annual Facilities Grant,



Feeding Futures School Food Programs Fund, Community LINK, Ready Set Learn and School Generated Funds).

CAPITAL FUND: The capital fund includes capital expenditures related to facilities (purchases and enhancements) and equipment (purchases) that are funded by Ministry of Education and Child Care capital grants, operating funds and special purpose funds. An annual deficit in the capital fund that is a result of amortization expense and budgeted capital assets purchased from operating and special purpose funds exceeding the amortization of deferred capital revenue plus budgeted local capital revenue is permitted under the Accounting Practices Order of the Ministry of Education and Child Care.

FINANCIAL PLAN DEVELOPMENT

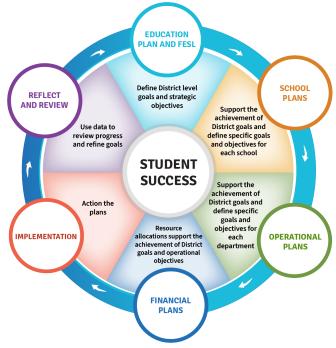
GUIDING PRINCIPLES

All operating and financial decisions at VSB are informed by the <u>Education Plan 2026</u> and the priorities outlined in the <u>Framework for Enhancing</u> <u>Student Learning report</u>. The Education Plan presents the District's values and its commitment to creating an equitable learning environment.

EDUCATION PLAN

Values Statement

The Vancouver School Board believes an effective public education system will prepare students to be active, productive, and socially responsible citizens. Students who complete their education with the Vancouver School Board should possess a strong educational foundation; be disposed to treat others with respect and work cooperatively with them; act upon the values and principles that make us human; care for themselves, for others, and for the planet; and exercise a critical intelligence adaptable to new situations.



VSB will foster school communities where students can learn, see themselves, feel supported and connected so that they develop a love of learning and become lifelong learners.

Equity Statement

The Vancouver School Board – a large, urban school district located on the unceded, traditional lands of the x^wməθk^wəýəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation) and səlilwətał (Tsleil-Waututh Nation) – respects and supports Indigenous ways of knowing and learning.

VSB will create an equitable learning environment where every child can experience a deep sense of belonging and is free to pursue pathways of learning in ways that are authentic to themselves. The VSB will achieve this by:

• having students see themselves and their communities in the curriculum and in the staff throughout the District;

- prioritizing student needs by making informed decisions and engaging in open communication with rights holders and stakeholders; and
- actively fighting systems of oppression through relationship building, ongoing communication and transparency.

Goals and Priorities

The Education Plan provides direction for the financial planning process as Goal 2 indicates that "improving stewardship of the District's resources by focusing on effectiveness, efficiency and sustainability" is essential for VSB to achieve its goal of increasing equity.

The Framework for Enhancing Student Learning identifies the link between effective planning and enhanced student learning and success. The document includes a commitment to Indigenous rights holders and Indigenous peoples, education partners and communities to work together to continuously improve student learning.

FRAMEWORK FOR ENHANCING STUDENT LEARNING

VSB provides an annual comprehensive update on its progress toward the goals outlined in the Education Plan. These goals are closely aligned with the <u>Framework for Enhancing Student Learning</u>. The most recent update was presented in the <u>2023-2024 Framework for Enhancing Student Learning Report</u>. Ongoing updates are provided regularly at the Education Plan committee.

The report centers around student success across three key areas: Intellectual Development, Human and Social Development and Career Development. To assess progress, VSB collects data from various sources, including the Foundation Skills Assessment, Graduation (Literacy and Numeracy) Assessments, Student Learning Surveys, report card information and Completion Rates.

Overall, VSB remains committed to enhancing student learning outcomes and addressing any disparities to ensure equitable education for all students.

FINANCIAL PLAN ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

VSB's financial planning process is guided by the Education Plan, the 2023-2024 Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (FESL) report and applicable Board and provincial policies. Engagement activities follow best practice standards set by the International Association of Public Participation (IAP2) and in alignment with the District's administrative procedures.

Our goal is to actively seek and incorporate feedback from the x^wmə θ k^wəýəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation) and səlilwəta+ (Tsleil-Waututh Nation), District leaders and the District's formal stakeholder groups, as well as feedback from students, their families, staff and the broader public in the annual budget and financial plan. We aim to provide clear information, ensure every voice is valued and make financial decisions that align with our community's values and our District's educational goals. All feedback will be considered by the Board. Any decisions regarding financial planning and engagement, will be made by the Board of Education.

A detailed engagement plan will be developed to ensure that the financial plan engagement goals are achieved.

A summary of key engagement timelines is provided below.



BUDGET ESTIMATES DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

In developing the balanced budget for the operating fund for 2025-2026 the overall goal is to provide, to the extent possible, a comparable level of programs and services as provided in 2024-2025. Priority will be given to initiatives that support the goals in the Education Plan, while also ensuring that VSB maintains a balanced budget. VSB is exposed to potential cost pressures due to numerous factors such as inflation, collective agreement wages lifts and costs of maintaining older buildings which may not be offset by additional funding. The development of the annual budget for 2025-2026 will include:

- development and approval of the 2024-2025 amended annual budget;
- development and submission to MECC of three-year enrolment projections;
- development of base budget which includes revenue and expense estimates and budget assumptions
 validation through a zero-based budget review process, estimated enrolment driven changes to
 revenue and expenditures, estimated changes to employee salaries and benefits; estimated changes
 to services, supplies, and utilities due to contractual rate changes; and adjustments for one-time
 revenue or expenditures included in the prior year budget;
- the creation of the balanced status quo budget;
- inclusion of structural deficit reduction strategies and additional costs included in multi-year plans consideration of using prior years' surpluses to balance the budget.

It is important to note that due to the provincial election held on October 19, 2024, the timeline for presenting the provincial budget in 2025 will differ from the usual schedule which would require the Minister of Finance to do so on or before the fourth Tuesday in February. According to the <u>Budget</u> <u>Transparency and Accountability Act</u>, when a general election occurs on the third Saturday in October, the minister must present the main estimates for the following fiscal year by April 30, 2025. However, if new appointments for the Premier and minister are made following the election, the deadline extends to no later than 150 days after the designated date of these appointments. This adjustment ensures that a new government has adequate time to prepare and present the budget, reflecting any changes in leadership and policy direction.

CONCLUSION

The financial planning process detailed in this document represents a transparent and accountable approach to developing the annual budget for the Vancouver School Board. This process may be challenging due to the structural deficit and anticipated cost pressures, particularly those related to inflation and rising utility costs. In developing the budget, the focus should align with Goal 2 of the Education Plan, which addresses "increasing equity" by "improving stewardship of the District's resources through effectiveness, efficiency, and sustainability."

The Board is expected to carefully examine how the limited resources are allocated within the system so that the cost structure, primarily based on staffing and building operational costs, more closely aligns with the funding received. This examination should structurally review the budget and identify strategies where programs can be delivered more cost-effectively, where the costs of maintaining buildings can be reduced, where the cost of delivering educational programming per student can be lowered, and where unnecessary costs can be eliminated. Failure to do so may prevent the District from creating a balanced budget, as required by the School Act.

We believe that the budget development process outlined in this document provides a foundation for looking at resource allocation from a district perspective, striving for equity for students, and fostering cost consciousness; all of which aim to enhance learning experiences for Vancouver students.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Board of Education approve the 2025-2026 Financial Planning Process.

Committee Report to the Board, November 25, 2024

The Chairperson of the Committee called the meeting to order and acknowledged with deep gratitude and respect, we are honoured to be learning and unlearning on the ancestral and unceded lands of the x^wməθk^wəỷəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation) & səlilwəta+ (Tsleil-Waututh Nation).

This meeting was live-streamed, and both the audio and visual recordings were also available to the public for viewing after the meeting. Footage from this meeting may be viewed from Canada or anywhere else in the world.

A master PowerPoint presentation detailing the flow of the agenda was shown throughout the meeting, a copy of which is on file with the meeting agenda.

1. <u>Receipt of Advocacy Plan Report:</u>

Trustee Mah, Chair of the Advocacy Subcommittee presented a report entitled **Advocacy Subcommittee**, a copy of which is on file with the meeting agenda. She noted that the Advocacy Subcommittee meeting was held at 2:30pm on October 30, 2024 in Room 180 at the Education Centre. She highlighted that at the meeting with trustees and stakeholder engaged in facilitated group workshops, touching on objectives, priorities and strategic actions regarding the Board's Advocacy Plan.

The report for the October 30, 2024 Advocacy Subcommittee meeting was received by consensus.

2. <u>Policies Review:</u>

The Secretary Treasurer presented a report dated November 13, 2024 entitled **Policies Review.** She noted that the Board policies are reviewed at least once in a four-year term to ensure that compliance with legislation, regulations, and legislative mandate is maintained.

The live broadcast ended as Committee members, trustees and stakeholder representatives engaged in small group discussion and dialogue to gather feedback for the update of Policy 2 – Role of the Board, and Policy 11 – Board Delegation of Authority.

RATIONALE

Whereas:

As a part of the publicly elected Vancouver School Board, Trustees must understand issues that impact students, families, staff and community.

At every meeting, Trustees make decisions on important issues, such as infrastructure, staff, student well-being, food programs, school supplies, working conditions and more.

In order to make those decisions, Trustees need to hear from those impacted by those decisions: rights holders, stakeholders, students, families, staff, and community.



Instead of decreasing public engagement, Trustees need more opportunities to hear from the public on decisions in front of them. When Trustees make decisions in an open meeting, with opportunities to hear from the public, it increases transparency and accountability.

In their June 11 2024 letter, the District Parent Advisory Council (DPAC) asks for the

"VSB to take meaningful steps to rebuild trust with parents and caregivers. Vancouver DPAC urges the VSB to prioritize genuine collaboration and transparency."

Further, in the May 2024 survey by Unions representing VSB employee groups it is found that,

"a significant portion of employees have expressed intentions to leave the district within the next five years, citing dissatisfaction with working conditions and a lack of appreciation."

And that,

"75% of Vancouver teachers feel undervalued and unrecognized by their employer." A reduction of classroom supports and complex student needs are taking a profound toll on mental health and stress levels.

Trustees should improve opportunities for public engagement and participation in decision-making to address the issues of all our stakeholders including students, families, staff, and community.

Context

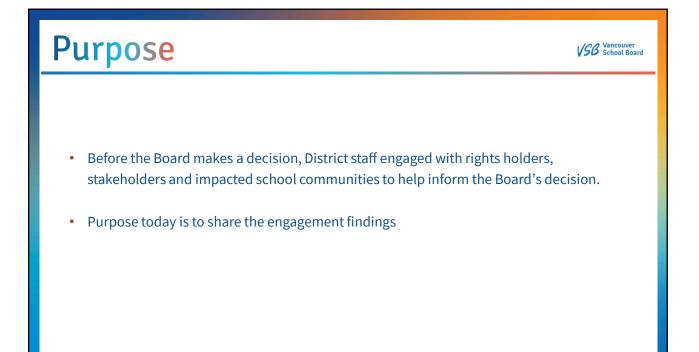
- The Vancouver School Board has to make a decision about the future of the Middle Years Programme (MYP) – International Baccalaureate (IB) program for grades 6 to 10 students.
- An evaluation report from IB World, determined the program is not in compliance with IB World standards.
- A shift in the BC curriculum = considerable overlap between the goals and teaching methodologies between IB and BC curricula, reducing the distinctiveness that IB once offered.
- A detailed report was presented at the November 6 Education Plan committee meeting.

Why now?

VSB Vancouver School Board

A Board decision about the future of MYP is required by Dec. 1, 2024 because...

- 1. Cross-boundary and mini-school application process in December and January.
- 2. Minimal scheduling, staffing and budget disruptions.
- 3. IB World mandated that recommendations begin implementation by Dec. 1.
 - This means the latest the Board can make a decision is at the Nov. 25, 2024, public Board meeting.
