


Spring break will soon be upon us and, with that will come all the beautiful spring flowers. Students are already seeing signs of spring in our garden and we look forward to planting season.

Nightingale is raising 55 coho salmon once again this year. In early January we had Bev Bowler

from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada come by Division 8's classroom to deliver the salmon eggs. The eggs have been carefully placed in our chilly 5-degree Celsius aquarium and will remain with us until our release date sometime in early May. The children will be raising the salmon through three phases of their life cycle, eyed egg, alevin, and fry. Once the salmon reach the fry

stage of life, they will need time in their home stream to imprint the sounds, smells and taste of their new home before making their way to the ocean. At the end of their life cycle they will make their way back upstream to the very place they were released to lay eggs once again and continue the circle of life. We are now releasing in Renfrew Ravine Park in East Vancouver. The stream flowing through the ravine is a part of Still Creek which leads to Burnaby Lake and Deer Lake and eventually empties into the ocean. Still Creek has had returning salmon for a number of years now in

large part due to the efforts of children releasing salmon in local streams. Nightingale has been part of this exciting effort for over 20 years now and by Mr. Canning's estimates we must have released over 1250 salmon. Mr. Canning received recognition for running this program at the school for *so many years*. Well done!

### **Black-Capped Chickadees**

Spring is in the air and you will soon be hearing the distinctive call of the Black-capped Chickadee. If you

have a bird feeder and haven't done so already, please take a moment to remove last year's nesting material and give your birdhouse a good cleaning. Rehang your birdhouse at a height of between 5 and 15 feet. If you didn't have success last year don't fret, we may have been a little late getting them up. We had four successful mating couples around the school last season and I had two reports from families that their birdhouses had mating couples as well. I'd love to hear from other families if they had any success last year. Black-capped Chickadees can nest as early as April and as late as July, but the couple will be looking for a suitable site to lay their eggs as early as mid-February. I just put mine up today, February 22, and as I'm writing this article I can hear the chickadees calling. You may recall that I gave you some wood chips to put in the birdhouses last year. This is not a requirement, but it can be helpful. None of the birdhouses on the school grounds had wood chips and we had success but if you would like to get some, I'm sure you could find them at your local pet store. I am experimenting with suet as a feed for the birds this year. I picked up a suet mix, which is essentially lard with seeds mixed into it, and it really seems to be attracting the songbirds. I will leave a link to the Bird Nerd on YouTube. This short 4 minute video has some close ups of the Black-capped Chickadee and the calls they make. Happy birding—Mr. Canning


